

for foreign service. The *Ganges* was towed out of the harbour yesterday by the King's steam vessel *Comet*. Orders for their sailing are expected this morning, in which case they will depart in the afternoon.

The Diamond and *Undaunted* frigates, at Chatham, are ready for commission.

A party of 250 royal marines are ordered to embark in the *Antelope*, for Bermuda. A party of convicts, &c. are going out in this ship to be employed on the public works at Bermuda.

The *Menai*, of 28 guns, is fitting out to relieve the *Athol* on the Halifax station.

It is said that the King of Spain has dismissed above 200 persons belonging to the palace, because they had some constitutional ideas which he would not tolerate.

A mercantile friend has furnished us with Gibraltar papers to the 14 ult. containing Madaid dates to the 7th, five days later than those received by the London.

Madrid, Nov. 5.—The second Hall of the Alcalde de la Real Casca Corte has pronounced the following sentence:

"D. Rafael del Riego, is condemned to the ordinary punishment of hanging, and he shall be drawn on a hurdle to the place of execution—his property shall be confiscated, and he shall pay the costs of suit."

By virtue of this sentence, the prisoner was placed in *capilla* (seclusion) at ten o'clock this morning.

Nov. 6.—This day at noon the ordinary punishment of hanging was inflicted on the person of D. Rafael del Riego. The public that held his crimes in such detestation, has shown on this occasion, that it can distinguish between the crime and the criminal; for not the least insult was offered to him, by the immense concourse that filled the streets through which he passed; and it was only at the moment of execution that the cry of long live the absolute King was heard.—*Madrid Gazette*.

Halifax R. Gaz.

The Papers received by the George Henry, contain London dates to the 11th Nov. and our files from Jamaica are to the 2d. inst. In Europe every thing was doubt and uncertainty; but the ambitious designs of France were beginning to develop themselves, and England as usual, at the eleventh hour is making preparations to defeat them.

The situation of the West Indies is truly deplorable; all manner of confidence between the white and black inhabitants is daily decreasing. The slave thinks his master is unjustly withholding from him a freedom, which however valueless it will be found upon examination, has been described as essential to his welfare and happiness; and the Free People of Colour, who have hitherto lived cheerful and contented under the just distribution of wholesome laws, now fancy they are deprived of privileges, that are the birthright of every Englishman!—*Hal. Free Press*.

The Niemen brought large sums in gold and dollars, on public account, for Quebec, Halifax, and New-Brunswick, and about £20,000 for Merchants in this town—amounting altogether to nearly £125,000 currency.—*Ac. Recorder*.

DEMERARA.

The most important trial of the Jesuitical missionary, the Rev. John Smith (of the London Missionary Society, officiating at Bethel Chapel) commenced on the 23d of October. He is to be tried by a Court Martial. To ensure him even handed justice, no person interested in colonial property will set on his trial. Lt. Col. S. A. Goodman, 48th Regt. is to be President. The case on behalf of the prosecution, closed. After the expiration of some days, only half the evidence being heard, and a week having been allowed the Missionary to make his defence, he replied to the charges, but was found guilty, and is now under sentence of death.

Numerous fires have lately occurred at Demerara, all appearing the defect of accident.

SAINT JOHN, JANUARY 8.

FIRE—On Friday evening last a distressing fire originated in the House of Mr. BALLANDINE, Princes Street, and notwithstanding all the exertions that could be made by the civil and military, was not got under until the Houses of Mr. BALLANDINE and Mr. ANSLEY adjoining, were entirely consumed.

We are sorry to state that a gentleman by the name of AUSTIN, lately from England, was burnt to death at the early stage of the fire, and is supposed to have fallen in a fit and thus to have been the cause of her own death, as well as the destruction of the two Buildings.

In consequence of the excessive cold, and scarcity of water, it was with some difficulty that the fire was prevented from communicating to the neighbouring buildings.

LONDON, Nov. 13.

Private letters from Paris state that the inquiries among the Parisians, as to the state of the King's health and the probability of his speedy dissolution, had become the general subject of conversation, and it was reported that the return of Duke d'Angouleme from Spain has been hastened on account of the very uncertain state of the French Monarch. It was likewise current in that capital that the Ministry had determined to aid, with arms, money and officers, the expedition which it was expected would sail shortly from some of the Spanish ports to assist in recovering South America. As the Spanish Navy is incompetent to the task of recovering these provinces, it was generally supposed Ferdinand would hire the vessels of some other power, and Russia is rumoured to have already proffered her assistance to convey the troops of the expedition to their destination. The vessels of war which have already sailed under the French flag, are stated in these advices to convey some instructions, as well as certain promises, to Cantarac, in Peru, upon whose defence against Boliver the Royalist cause in South America is dependent.

The 37th Regiment, now at Quebec, and the 70th at Montreal, are to come to Ireland next year. The 68th are at Quebec, 60th at Kingston, Upper Canada, and 76th at Fort St. George. His Excellency Sir Francis Burton, and his Government, are exceedingly well liked. He is very kind to his countrymen. *Dublin paper*.
