

the Bar, viz. John Gordon, Esq. to be Viscount Kerr; William Nairn; to be Viscount Nairn; and James Drummond, Esq. N. P. to be Viscount Strathallan; Mr. Erskine, to be Earl of Mar, was absent from extreme old age.

The Russian Navy, now consists of 70 ships of the line, 18 frigates, 26 cutters, 7 brigs, 54 schooners, 20 galleys, 23 floating batteries, 121 Boats, and 143 other armed vessels. 464 sail, carrying 5000 guns, 33,000 seamen, 9000 marines, and 3000 artillery—a most formidable force should it ever be brought into action with an power but Great Britain!

The question of the recognition of South American Independence continues most anxiously to occupy public attention, particularly in the city. We can venture to state that previously to the close of the present Session of Parliament, a communication will be made on this question to the House of Commons, by Mr. Canning. It is not for us to anticipate what the nature of this communication may be. The course of our own Government is already marked out sufficiently strong and clear, as we shewed in a recent article on this subject.

In the House of Commons, Mr. Secretary Canning placed on the table of the House, by command of the King, copies of Commercial Treaties entered into between his Majesty and the Kings of Prussia and Sweden.

Mr. Plunkett presented a petition from the Catholics, praying for Catholic Emancipation.

The Report of the Select Committee on the state of Ireland was brought up by Lord Palmerston; and Mr. Goulburn gave notice, that he should this evening submit a motion for the renewal of the Insurrection Act.

It is expected the prorogation of Parliament will take place about the 20th inst.

The official value of the Exports for the year 1823, was £40,415,248, and of the Imports £36,234,683.

DIED On Friday the 19th instant, at Kingsclear, York County, in the 52d year of his age, Mr. THEOPHILUS RING. Having been in a poor state of health for two years, he made manifest an entire resignation to the will of God, and would often rejoice in the glorious prospect of a better inheritance beyond the Grave: His loss will be sincerely regretted by his family and numerous circle of relatives and friends.

AN Improvement in the Breed of Horses being very desirable, and only to be obtained by the introduction of good Horses into the Province, it is proposed to raise an annual Subscription for the purpose of giving Plates, to be run for at Fredericton.

The Committee of Management of the Fredericton Races, in appealing to the Public for an annual Subscription to insure that permanent advantage to the Province, which was the sole object in establishing the late Races, think it necessary thus early to state the views of the Committee, that in the event of meeting with general approbation, the application of the funds may conduce as much as possible to an object so desirable to the Community at large, as improving the Breed of Horses.

Although the Committee has every reason to be satisfied with the result of its first efforts, it cannot flatter itself that any permanent benefit will be derived from them, unless the plan be continued: It is therefore proposed to encourage the importation of well bred Horses, and at the same time hold out a proportionate reward to those who already possess young Horses of merit.

To this end it is proposed to give next year, a Plate of equal value to the one given at the late Races, with an additional sum to the Winner, provided he be a Stallion, and security be given that he shall cover, for at least one Season, in the Province. With respect to the second object, the Committee is disposed to give a Purse for three and four year olds, bona fide the property of persons resident in the Province.

The Committee think it proper to add, that encouraged by the liberal Subscription which was raised within a few days for the late Races, it has been induced to open a list for annual Subscribers, not less than Four Dollars each, to which about 40 of the most respectable persons have already placed their names: And as it is desirable that the numbers so disposed should be ascertained as soon as possible to enable the Committee to make the necessary arrangements, it is requested that those persons wishing to promote this laudable purpose will subscribe as soon as possible, for which purpose Subscription Lists are open with the undermentioned Gentlemen:
