

favor of this bloody tribunal. Small bands of guerillas, yet exist in many parts of Spain, and interrupt the intercourse. FRANCE.—The Paris dates are to the 24th of Dec. but the London Editors remark that they possess but little interest. The King of France has granted an amnesty to the French soldiers who deserted during the campaign of Spain.

The small pox is spreading rapidly in several provinces of France. Letters from Paris say, that the King of Saxonia, Victor Emmanuel is dangerously ill. This Prince is brother-in-law of his Majesty Louis XVIII., and of Monsieur the Count d'Artois.

The first detachment of the Royal Guard, returning from Spain, halted upon touching the French soil. The officer commanding, made them kneel down. After a short prayer to the God of Arms, they rose again and made the air resound with the cries of "Long live the King!" and "Long live France!"

It is stated that there are many French officers in the army of the Pacha of Egypt, who have introduced the European tactics. A medal has been struck to commemorate the triumphant entry of the Duke of Angoulême into Paris.

Portugal.—There are above 7000 persons confined in Prison at Lisbon, for Political offences.

Rome.—A census of Rome has recently been taken, from which it appears the population amounted to 236,269. The Jews, who are about 7,000, are not included in this number.

Austria.—Vienna letters mention the resolution of the two Emperors to restore the Order of the Knights of Jerusalem, to their former power, and that Syria and Cyprus would in all probability, be purchased for their future residence.

A gentleman from Germany states that he saw young Napoleon at the Vienna theatre, full of vivacity and confidence. His title is Duke of Genoa. Orders are given never to mention the name of Napoleon.

Russia.—By the last advices from St. Petersburg (says the London Sun) the relations between that Court and the Dutch government, seem to be more closely united, and that the two governments are committed to each other to aid and support Ferdinand against the possession of South America.

Treaty.—Lord Strongford signed on the 23rd of Oct. at the Palace of the Reis Effendi, in Constantinople, a treaty of friendship and commerce for the Court of Sardina, by which the Genoese vessels will have the free navigation of the Black Sea. The Treaty has not yet ratified this Treaty in the usual form; a Sardinian vessel was preparing to sail in a few days for the Black Sea.

On Thursday last, the 26th ult. agreeably to a Resolution made at a meeting of the Magistrates and Inhabitants of Fredericton, the following ADDRESS was presented to His HONOR the PRESIDENT:—
To the Honorable JOHN MURRAY BLISS, Esquire, President and Commander in Chief of the Province, &c. &c. &c.
THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE MAGISTRATES AND PRINCIPAL INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF FREDERICTON, AND ITS VICINITY.

WE, the Magistrates and principal Inhabitants of the Town of Fredericton and its Vicinity, congratulate your HONOR on your accession to the Administration of the Government of this Province, in consequence of the death of the late President, the much lamented WARD CHERMAN, Esquire, whose Administration has met general approbation. We have always entertained a high sense of your HONOR'S public and private character; and we feel satisfied that the same industry, integrity, and independence, which so distinguished your HONOR at the Bar, on the Bench and in the Senate, will still continue to direct your HONOR in discharging the duties of the high and important Office you now fill.

To which His HONOR was pleased to make the following Reply:—
TO THE MAGISTRATES AND PRINCIPAL INHABITANTS OF FREDERICTON AND ITS VICINITY, Gentlemen,

AFTER a residence among my Fellow-Subjects in the County of York, for the space of thirty-three years in the active discharge of many public duties, I beg leave to assure you, Gentlemen, that no one event could have more effectually gratified my pride or excited my gratitude, than the assurance you have this day honored me with, of your approbation of my conduct; and I most sincerely hope that, whatever may be my future situation in life, I may continue to merit your good opinion.

Extracts from the Journal of the House of Assembly.

Tuesday, 24th February, 1824.

Mr. Smith, from the standing Committee appointed to examine, liquidate, and report on public and private accounts, further reported, as follows:—

No. 26. Is William P. Sayre's account, with affidavit and vouchers for £19 13 6, which with the vouchers furnished last year, satisfactorily account for the amount of the two grants of money, one on the road from New-Horton to Cape Enrage, and the other on the road from Dorchester Island to the Main.

No. 27. Is Daniel Morehouse's account, with affidavit and vouchers, as Commissioner for laying out £25 for the improvement of the road from the river St. John to the Caverhill back settlement, in the Parish of Queensbury. He credits £25 received from the Province Treasury.

No. 28. This is an account of Wm. J. Drummond and J. White, Commissioners for the new Shepody road. This account amounts to the sum of £41 8 3. Of the above sum, vouchers were produced last year, for the sum of £103 19 10; and vouchers are now produced for £46 9 2.

There is a charge in the account for supplies had of Mr. Jonah Dyer, to the amount of £60 16 10, and for freight of supplies, £3 6. No voucher are produced for the supplies had of Jonah Dyer, nor is there any account from the said Dyer, for the amount of supplies.

There is no affidavit to this account, and consequently the whole is unsatisfactory.

No. 29. Is Allan M'Lean's account and vouchers, as Supervisor of the Great Road from Fredericton to the river Ristigouche, for the expenditure of £487 9 6.

He charges for Commissions, 49 5 5
Ditto for exploring road from Miramichi to the great Bateboque, 5 5 4

He credits £550 received from the Province Treasury, which leaves a balance due the Province, £7 19 8 1/2. A report accompanies the account, but no affidavit, for which reason it is unsatisfactory.

No. 30. Is Nathaniel H. De Veber's account with affidavit and vouchers, as Supervisor of the Great Road from Fredericton to the Fork of the Great Marsh, for the expenditure of £586 4 0.

He charges his Commissions, 60 0 0
Do. for extra charges and Printing, 7 6 8

He credits £600 received from the Province Treasury, which leaves a balance due him of £53 10 8. A report accompanies the account.

No. 31. Is Nathaniel H. De Veber's account, with affidavit and vouchers, as Commissioner for expending £43 6 8, on the Road between Daniel Currie's and Dingle's Mill, in Queens County. He charges commissions at 10 per cent. £5. He credits

£250 from the Province Treasury, which leaves a balance in his hands £1 13 4.

On motion of Mr. Johnston—Resolved unanimously, that the thanks of this House be given to Thomas Bonnor, Esquire, for his services as Agent of this Province, in Great-Britain; and that Mr. Speaker be requested to communicate the same to Mr. Bonnor. And whereas it is thought that it would be attended with greater advantage to the interests of the Province, if persons more intimately acquainted with its commercial and local concerns were appointed its Agents in Great-Britain: Therefore resolved unanimously, that John Bainbridge, Esquire, a Merchant of London, well acquainted with the commercial interests of this Province, which he has been for many years very zealous in promoting, and Henry Bliss, Esquire, a native of this Province, and now residing in London, and possessing from personal observation and experience, an intimate knowledge of its local circumstances and concerns, be appointed joint Agents of this Province, in Great-Britain, in the room of the said Thomas Bonnor, Esquire.

On motion of Mr. Allen—Ordered that a Committee of this House, inform His Majesty's Council, of the appointment of John Bainbridge and Henry Bliss, Esquires, as joint Agents of this Province, in Great-Britain, and request their concurrence. And further ordered, that Mr. Allen and Mr. Johnston, be the Committee for that purpose.

Mr. Fraser, from the Committee appointed (in pursuance of a resolution of the 26th ultimo), to inquire and ascertain what sums are necessary for the further improvement of the Great Roads of communication throughout the Province—Reported that they had attended to that duty, and that in their opinion the sum of £7000, should be granted for that purpose, in the following manner: From Fredericton to St. John, by the Nepepis, £1000

"The increase of Trade, Commerce, and Population, and the prosperous state of the Province, having augmented in a proportionate degree the business both Civil and Criminal in the Courts of Law, and it being advisable in order to the more regular administration of Justice in the several Counties, that fixed Terms should be appointed for holding the Courts of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery and Nisi Prius, annually in the same—The President informs the House of Assembly, that he proposes, with the advice of His Majesty's Council, to establish two Terms for the City and County of St. John, on the second Tuesday in January, and the fourth Tuesday in August—For Kings County, on the fourth Tuesday in July—For Charlotte County, on the second Tuesday in August—For Westmorland, on the second Tuesday in September—For Northumberland, on the fourth Tuesday in September—For Sunbury, on the third Tuesday in October—For Queens County, on the fourth Tuesday in October—upon suitable provision for the same being made by the House, which he therefore recommends to their consideration."
