

who are immediately replaced by the natives of the Country. It appears that it was English Agents who succeeded in effecting a strict alliance between the Albanians and the Greeks. Letters from Blazitz of the 7th of March even give the particulars.

TRIESTE, MARCH 24.—A vessel which has arrived from Alexandretta, in Syria, in 20 days, brings the news of the declaration of independence by the Viceroy of Egypt.—*Augsburg Gazette.*

PARIS, APRIL 7.—Letters from Odessa, of March 16, say, "We received some days ago, news from Constantinople of the 6th of this month. The revolt of the Pacha was still talked of. To day we have letters of the 10th, which report and confirm this great event. The vessels which the Porte sent to Alexandria for grain, have returned empty. The news of the surrender of Patras to the Greeks which was spread at the same moment, completed the consternation of the Divan. The Grand Visier is so dangerously ill, that the Sultan visits him every day."

MADRID, March 28.—Much is said of the answer which our Government should give to the memorandum of the English Minister respecting the Americas. It seems the Spanish Government will adopt no resolution which shall not be approved of by the other Powers, composing the Holy Alliance, which does not appear at all likely to meet the views of England.

NUREMBERG, March 31.—There is a general conviction in Greece among all classes, that the evil suffered by that country cannot cease, either under a Government Republican, nor under a Federal Constitution, and that a happy future state cannot be procured for the people except under a Monarchical Government, and under a Prince, a stranger to all parties in the country, and who is not indebted for his elevation to any party.—*Austrian Observer.*

Letters from Malta have this day been received to the 2d of March. These state that the premium of insurance on flags subject to capture by the Algerines, were, to the eastward with convoy, 50 per cent, and without it 100 per cent. To the westward the charge was 100 per cent with convoy, and 200 per cent without it.

FROM DEMERARA.

The Editor of the Norfolk Beacon has received Demerara papers to the 16th of April. Intelligence had been received from the East Coast of the Island, that the Slaves had shown signs of revolt, and the Governor had ordered out the militia; they are to parade every afternoon as a measure of safety.

Private letters from Martinique, received at Demerara mention that the coloured people of that Island are shipped away with as much despatch as possible. No distinction we understand, is made amongst them.—Whether high or low, rich or poor, whether guilty or innocent—whether implicated or not in the late premeditated insurrection, the sentence of banishment is the same. The hue of the skin is quite sufficient, and a passport is politely handed to every one whose name and residence is known, as well as to those who are only known abroad, in the public streets and highways.

A considerable number of these people had already arrived at Trinidad, where we are informed they have met with an un molested refuge.
