The Right Hon. George Canning to Don Bernardino Revadavia.

Foreign Office, Dec. 15, 1823.

SIR, The King, my master, having determined to take measures for the effectual protection of the commerce of his Majesty's subjects at Buenos Ayres, and to obtain accurate information of the state of affairs in that country, for the purpose of adopting such (measures) as may eventually lead to the establishment of friendly relations with the Government of Buenos Ayres, and to nominate and appoint M. Woodbine Parish to the office of His Majesty's Consul General in that State.

Mr. Parish will deliver this letter to your Excellency and I must request you to be pleased to grant what is necessary, that as being duly qualified he may enter on the exercise of his functions.

Fredericton, 28th August, 1824.

HIS Excellency Major-General SIR HOWARD DOUGLAS, having been appointed Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, arrived last night at Fredericton, and came this day at twelve o'clock to the Council Chamber, where his Commission being read, he took the usual Oaths and assumed the Administration of the Government.

Immediately upon His EXCELLENCY'S inauguration, the following Address, from the Magistrates and principal Inhabitants in the Town of Fredericton and its vicinity, was presented:—

To His Excellency Major-General Sir HOWARD S. DOUGLAS, Baronet, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c.

The humble Address of the Magistrates and Principal Inhabitants in the Town of Fredericton and its Vicinity.

May it please your Excellency,

WITH great and sincere respect, we beg permission to approach your Excellency, with a tender of our heartfelt congratulations, on your safe arrival with your Lady and Family, into the Province, over which, our most gracious Sovereign has been pleased to appoint your Excellency to rule.

With the utmost gratitude to His Majesty, for the numerous favors conferred on this distant part of His Empire, we cannot help expressing our high sense of this additional, and particular instance of His Majesty's regard for this Province, in selecting, as His Royal Representative, a Gentleman, whose very high character, leads us to expect with confidence, the greatest benefits from his wise and prudent administration.

In this sentiment, from the opportunities afforded us, since your Excellency's appointment has been announced, we have no hesitation in saying, we express the united opinion of the Province.

We beg leave to add our ardent wishes that your Excellency may long continue in the possession of your high office, and prove to be a real blessing to a People, whom we trust your Excellency will ever find truly grateful for benefits conferred; and who will never yield to any part of His Majesty's widely extended Dominions, in Loyalty to their beloved Sovereign, and the strongest attachment to the British Constitution.

To which His EXCELLENCY was most graciously pleased to make the following reply:—

To the Magistrates and principal Inhabitants in the Town of Fredericton, and its Vicinity,

GENTLEMEN, I RECEIVE with much satisfaction your congratulations on my arrival, with my Family, into this Province, over which it has pleased our most Gracious Sovereign to appoint me to rule.

The terms in which you are pleased to express your satisfaction at this appointment, and the expectations which you appear to entertain as to the effect of my administration, seem, to my inward consciousness of inability to realize the hopes which partial report has induced you to form, to make more formidable the obligations which I have just, with constitutional solemnity, contracted. But, in a straight-forward, conscientious, independent course, confiding in the able advice and counsel of those Honorable Gentlemen in whose presence I have contracted that obligation; and relying on the support of all ranks of this excellent and loyal people, I proceed, fearlessly, to do my best to redeem those obligations, and to disappoint as little as possible your hopes.

We are informed by a stranger who lately visited the upper part of the river, that the Military Settlement in the Parish of Kent, York County, promises a most abundant harvest. The Wheat, Millet, Rye, Oats, and Potatoes, are of most luxuriant growth. The Indian Corn is rather diminutive—the Hay has not been a weighty crop, but Barned in excellent preservation.

The above Parish is scarcely known to our Southern counties, and settled by men trained to warfare. In five years these individuals by industry and perseverance have rendered their abodes comfortable.

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor and Suite, the Hon. J. Coffin, the Hon. W. Black, the Hon. J. Robinson, and the Hon. Wm. Botsford, left this place this morning in the Steam Boat for the City.

Extract from the Inverness Journal, dated 2d July, 1824.

Died in Mortimer Street, Cavendish Square, London, Lieutenant-General JOHN SIMON FRASER, aged 78.

At Edinburgh on the 20th ult. Lieut. JOHN FRASER, formerly of the 71st thereafter of the 87th Regt. of Foot. Lieutenant Fraser entered the 71st Regiment at the youthful age of 16—He passed with approbation through the grades from Private to officer in the short space of eight years. His signal bravery at the taking of the Cape of Good Hope, induced the commanding Officer to report him for an Officer's commission, for he was one of a party of thirty who on that occasion volunteered to storm a battery, and the only one of the party who survived (but not unscathed) the capture of it. The regiment went from the Cape upon the expedition to Buenos Ayres, in which Mr. Fraser did good service although in the condition of a prisoner. This was reported by the then Colonel of the Regiment, Col. afterward Lt. Gen. Sir Dennis Pack, to the Secretary of the Commander in Chief in the following very handsome terms:—"By his exemplary behaviour when far in the interior of South America, he acquired such an ascendancy over a number of men as to be acknowledged by them as their commanding officer; and by his manner throughout, materially tended to uphold the allegiance they have shown; and was such as to induce the Spaniards to offer him a large sum and a Commission in their service." Mr. Fraser was with the same distinguished Corps and was again wounded when it formed part of the army under General Sir John Moore, and at the glorious epoch of Vimeira and Waterloo. When the peace came, he was put upon half pay, and had engaged successfully in business. But the need of just praise of perilous attainment. His arduous military duties had planted the seeds of early dissolution in a frame both originally robust and fortified by sober habits.—His premature death at the age of 42, is to be traced to that cause, while it will long be deplored by all those who knew him in civil life as having deprived society of a valuable man, and his wife and numerous infant family of a most affectionate and exemplary husband and father.

DIED] On the 29th inst. at his residence in Mauderville, after a short illness, Mr. WILLIAM PERLEY, aged 59. He has left a wife and three children, with a large circle of acquaintance to lament his loss.

On Saturday last in the 86th year of her age, Mrs. MERCY SEGBE, wife of the late JACOB SEGBE. She came to this country in the year 1783 with a family of four Sons, and she died leaving three of them and upward of sixty grand children and great grand children to lament her loss. Her remains were interred yesterday respectably attended.
