

Letters Patent for the same, and has exercised jurisdiction by executing legal process therein.

3.—That Barnhart's Island extends to within one hundred and thirty yards of the British shore, and that, by its having been yielded to the United States, the whole navigable channel of the Saint Lawrence have been ceded to that Government, whose jurisdiction is thereby extended to within thirty yards of the Canadian shore, and His Majesty's Canadian subjects have been deprived of all access to Lower-Canada by water, unless passing through the territories of a Foreign State.

4.—Barnhart's Island is much nearer the main Canadian shore than to that of the United States, and that the only safe channel for navigation is on the south side of the said Island and between it and the main shore of the United States, while it is wholly impracticable for rafts of timber, staves and other lumber, which are among the principal exports of Upper-Canada, to descend by the intricate and shallow channel on the north side thereof, were it ceded exclusively to His Majesty.

5.—That it is evident from the decision of the Committee that the Commissioner lately appointed on behalf of His Majesty's Government, was either unacquainted with the local situation of Barnhart's Island, and the great disadvantages which would result to the inhabitants of Upper-Canada from its being yielded to the United States, or unwisely considered them too unimportant in a national point of view to justify him in insisting on its remaining under His Majesty's dominions.

6.—That it appears by a message recently sent by the President to the Congress of the United-States of America that a negotiation is now pending with His Majesty's Govt. for the free navigation by the Subjects of that power of the River Saint Lawrence to the ocean.

7.—That, in our opinion, such a measure, if acceded to by His Majesty, would have a direct tendency to destroy the connexion between these Colonies and the Parent State, would injure to an incalculable extent their commerce and revenues, and would, by admitting a direct trade under a foreign flag not allowed to British subjects, facilitate the illicit introduction of foreign merchandise, & afford advantages to the subjects of a foreign state not enjoyed by those of His Majesty in this Province, for which the restitution of Barnhart's Island and the free navigation of the south channel of the Saint Lawrence valuable as the subjects are, would not be an adequate compensation.

8.—That an humble Address be presented to His Majesty, founded on the preceding Resolutions, and imploring his Majesty to take into his most gracious consideration the unhappy situation in which His Majesty's faithful subjects in Upper-Canada have been placed by the unfortunate determination of the Commission under the Treaty of Ghent, respecting the boundary line on the St. Lawrence as well as the certain ruin which must ensue to British interest, within the Provinces, if the claims of the government of the U. States to the free navigation of the St. Lawrence to the ocean shall be recognised, and earnestly entreating His Majesty to direct the attention of His Majesty's Ministers, during the negotiation said to be pending, to such measure as may effectually secure the present and future interest of His Majesty's Canadian Subjects.

Extract from the Journal of the House of Assembly. THURSDAY, 11th MARCH, 1824.

A Message from His Honor the President, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, as follows:—

“Mr. Speaker,—His Honor the President commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House, in the Council Chamber.”

The House attended in obedience to His Honor's command, and being returned, Mr. Speaker reported to the House, that he had addressed His Honor, as follows:—

“May it please your Honor,

“The House of Assembly have made very liberal grants for the Roads and other Branches of the Public Service. They now tender for your Honor's acceptance, the several Bills of Appropriation, together with a Bill for continuing the existing Revenue; and pray your Honor's assent to the same. They entertain a full confidence that the grants they have thus made, will under your Honor's direction, be rendered effectual for the beneficial purposes which they are intended to promote.”

And that His Honor was then pleased to give his assent to the following Bills:—

A Bill to continue an Act, intitled, “An Act to prevent Desertion from His Majesty's Forces, and to prevent unlawful dealings with Soldiers or Deserters.”

A Bill to continue an Act, intitled, “An Act to regulate the Herring Fisheries in the Parishes of West Isles, Campo Bello, Pennfield, and St. George, in the County of Charlotte,” and “An Act to extend the provisions of the said Act to the Parish of Grand Manan.”

A Bill for erecting and maintaining a Light-House upon one of the Islands or Rocks near the South-East Coast of the Island of Grand Manan.

A Bill to continue an Act, intitled, “An Act for the more effectual punishment of persons who shall be guilty of the Trespasses therein mentioned, in the City of Saint John.”

A Bill to repeal the Laws now in force for appointing Firewards and the better extinguishing of Fires, so far as the same relate to the Town of Fredericton, and to make regulations more suitable to the said Town.

An Act for confirming Public Acts.

A Bill to continue an Act, intitled, “An Act in amendment of the Act for making further provision for preventing the importation and spreading of contagious Distempers in the City of St. John.”

A Bill to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the County of Charlotte, to make regulations for the Market Wharf at St. Andrews.

A Bill for the safe keeping of Lunatics whom it may be dangerous to permit to go at large within the Province.

A Bill to provide for making rules and regulations for the management of the Poor-House in the Parish of St. Andrews.

A Bill to extend the provisions of an Act, to encourage the Inhabitants of this Province who are engaged in prosecuting the Cod and Scale Fisheries, by granting bounties on the same.

A Bill to provide for the permanent Interment of the Remains of the late Lieutenant-Governor Smyth, within the walls of the Parish Church of Fredericton.

A Bill to provide for the erection of Fences with Gates across the Highway leading through Deer Island, in the Parish of West Isles and County of Charlotte.

A Bill to continue the Acts for regulating, laying out and repairing Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways within the several Towns and Parishes in this Province.

A Bill to amend the Acts for imposing a duty on certain articles imported into this Province.

A Bill to authorize the Justices of the General Sessions of the Peace for the City and County of St. John, to make an assessment for building a Court-House within the City of St. John.

A Bill to continue and amend an Act, intitled, “An Act for raising a Revenue in this Province.”

A Bill to repeal an Act, intitled, “An Act to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the Counties of York and Charlotte respectively, to repress the Assize of Bread in the Towns of Fredericton and Saint Andrews,” so far as relates to the Town of Fredericton, and to make for effectual provision for the same.

A Bill for erecting a separate Parish in the City of St. John.

A Bill to alter the division line between the Parishes of New-Castle and Northesk, in the County of Northumberland.

A Bill for taking an account of the Population of this Province.

A Bill to continue an Act to provide for and maintain an armed Cutter, for the protection of the Revenue of the Province.

A Bill to provide for the better support of the Poor in certain Parishes in the County of Northumberland.

A Bill to extend the powers of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, of the City of St. John, for preventing the encumbering and filling up of the Harbor of the said City, to the waters and places of anchorage in the vicinity thereof.

A Bill further to continue and amend the Acts for more effectually repairing the Streets and Bridges in the City and County of St. John.

A Bill for erecting a part of the Parishes of St. Marys and Queensbury, in the County of York, into a separate and distinct Town or Parish.

A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue to provide for the ordinary services of the Province.

A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the services therein mentioned.

A Bill to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province.

A Bill to alter and amend an Act, intitled, “An Act to repeal all the Laws now in force relating to the establishment, regulation and improvement, of the Great Roads of communication through the Province, and to make more effectual provision for the same.”

A Bill to repeal an Act passed in the sixtieth year of His late Majesty's Reign, intitled, “An Act to regulate the rates at which certain Gold and Silver Coins shall pass current in this Province.”

And that His Honor was then pleased to deliver the following Speech:—

“Gentlemen of the Council

“and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

“The business of the present Session being now finished, I have the satisfaction of dispensing with your further attendance in General Assembly. The unprecedented dispatch with which, by your assiduity, the public business has been conducted—the liberal grants which you have made, and the harmony and unanimity which have prevailed through the whole of the Session, demand my thanks, and will, no doubt, meet with the approbation of our most gracious Sovereign.”

After which, His Honor the Chief Justice, said,—

“Gentlemen of the Council,

“and Gentlemen of the Assembly,

“It is His Honor the President's will and pleasure, that this General Assembly be prorogued to the first Wednesday in June next, and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued to the first Wednesday in June next.”
