Alms-House and Work-House.

COMMISSIONER FOR THE WEEK,

On Tuesday last, the roof of a building occupied as a Store-house, in King Street, belonging to Mr. Roberts, was discovered to be on fire, but by timely attention it was extinguished; and the next day we were again alarmed with the cry of fire, which proved to be in the same building. The rain at the time preventing the fire from spreading very rapidly, it was soon got under.

On Thursday, about 2 o'Clock in the morning, a large fire was seen from this place, which appeared to be some distance down the river, but not having heard of any nearer than Saint John, there can be no doubt, but that it was the flame occasioned by the following distressing occurrence at that place:
St. John, April 8.

This morning between 1 & 2 o'Clock, the Town was alarmed by the call of fire, and the ringing of bells, and by the time the Inhabitants had generally got to the spot, the blaze was bursting from the fine range of buildings belonging to Mr. Nehemiah Merritt, on his Wharf. The heat soon became so excessive, as to compel the persons working the different Engines, to retire from that Wharf, when the fire began to communicate with those buildings on the North and South of Mr. Merritt's range, and also set fire to his Store on the East of Water Street.

At this Period, the wind blew fresh, and in such a direction as to render all the attempts to save the adjoining properties of no avail, and the Stores of Mr. Disbrow having got on fire, the whole of his range was soon level with the ground—fortunately no other Water properties of any consequence, were consumed, but the flames having communicated from East of Water Street with the houses butting on those which front on Prince William street, the whole range of houses from Mr. Wheeler's on the South to Mr. Johnston's on the North, were soon in flames—also the Houses from Mr. Lovett's to Dr. Boyd's on the opposite side of the street.

Mejely to state that no exertions were left untri- ed to put a stop to the fire, would be doing injus- tice to those who so fully exerted themselves—Eve- ry thing was done, and promptly done, which could be expected.—At one time serious fears were entertained that the fire would have spread more widely—sparks and flakes of fire, were carried to a considerable distance back into the Town, and set fire to some of the roofs of the Houses, but the proprietors had men stationed on the tops of them, with water to prevent any serious mischief.—At no period has such a fire taken place in this Province, and property to a great amount has been consumed, independent of the houses.

We subjoin a list of the buildings destroyed, and by whom they were occupied—and amidst the dis- tressing feelings which we experience in giving this account, have only one slight consolation to offer, namely, that the season of the year is such as to prevent the evil from being so severely felt as it would have been in the fall of the year.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

The Packet Ship CORTES, Capt. De Cost, arrived yesterday morning from Liver- pool, whence she sailed on the 25th ult. to which date, inclusive, we have received pa- pers, with London dates to the 23d.

The King of Portugal has taken the un- necessary precaution of telling the Hamburg capitalists, that he will consider any pecuniary engagements entered into with the Brazilian Govt. null and void.

The sum of £2,500,000 in specie, be- ing the amount of the Austrian loan, has been landed at Dover.

It is said several native South Americans have arrived at Manchester for the purpose of purchasing goods for the interior of Co- lombia.

WAR WITH ALGIERS.

The following notification of hostilities having commenced against the Regency of Algiers appeared in the Gazette of Saturday night:

“Admiralty office, Feb. 21, 1824.

“Despatches dated the 31st of last month and 1st instant, have this morning been re- ceived at this Office from the Hon. Capt. Spencer, of His Majesty's ship Naiad, (who

had been directed to proceed to Algiers, to make, in conjunction with His Majesty's Consul at that Regency, a remonstrance against some late proceedings of the Dey,) stating that his negotiation had ended un- satisfactorily, and that the Consul was oblig- ed to strike the British flag, and embark on board His Majesty's ship.

“Capt. Spencer further reports, that having met an Algerine corvette, he felt it, under his instructions, his duty to attack her, and that she was laid on board, and captured in the most handsome manner, by His Maje- sty's brig Chameleon, when Captain Spen- cer had the satisfaction to find, that he had rescued 17 Spaniards, whom the Algerines were carrying into slavery.”

“Admiralty Office, Feb. 21, 1824.

“This is to give notice, that the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty will im- mediately appoint convoys, to afford protec- tion to the trade through the Straits of Gib- raltar, and within the Mediterranean, until the differences with the Regency of Algiers shall be adjusted.

“J. W. CROKER.”

The causes of this warlike declaration, on our part, are, it appears two fold—one, the refusal on the part of the Dey, to make re- paration for an insult offered to the British Consular flag, of what nature, does not yet appear; the other, a declaration, that he was resolved no longer to observe the term of a treaty made with him, nor to retain any christian captives, of any nation, in a state of slavery. Capt. Spencer's exploit, re- corded above, was the immediate consequence of the latter determination.

We subjoin, from the Royal Cornwall Gazette, some further particulars of the oc- currences that preceded and followed the commencement of hostilities with Algiers:

“On Thursday evening (the 19th inst.) the Chameleon, brig of war, Lieutenant Burton, arrived at Falmouth from Gibraltar, with despatches for Government, which were forwarded express to London, by Lieut. Church, of His Majesty's ship Astrea; the Chameleon having been put under quaran- tine. The Chameleon left Portsmouth with secret orders, a short time since, and joined the Naiad frigate, Hon. Capt. Spencer, at Gibraltar. They proceeded in company to Algiers where they arrived on the 24th ult. to demand restoration of some christian cap- tives.

The Dey refused to admit Capt. Spencer to a private conference, unless he would consent to come without his sword, a condi- tion to which that gallant officer would not submit. Having made his propositions, he gave the Dey till the 31st to consider them, and in the mean time embarked the British Consul, with his family, and the merchants on board his ship. When the time expir- ed and no favorable answer having been re- turned, the men-of-war stood out to sea, and at 3 p.m. (in sight of the town,) fell in with an Algerine corvette, of 18 guns and 160 men standing in for the bay. She was or- dered to, but having refused compliance, a fire was immediately opened upon her, which she returned, and in a short time the Cham- eleon ran her on board, and carried her in a gallant style. On board her were found 17 Spaniards (prisoners,) who, with the Algerine Capt. were taken out of her. Capt. Spen- cer then suffered the prize to drift on shore, she being too much damaged to bring away. The Chameleon had some men wounded in the action, but the particulars had not yet transpired. The Naiad parted company for Malta on the 1st inst. and the Chameleon after calling at Gibraltar, sailed from thence on the 6th.”
