A Proclamation.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province, stands prorogued to Wednesday the first day of September next, I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to the first Wednesday in December next ensuing.

Fredericton, the twenty-eighth day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-four, and in the fifth year of His Majesty's Reign.

MILITIA GENERAL ORDERS
His Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to make the following arrangements and promotions in the Militia of the County and City of Saint John:—

1st. The three Battalions, together with the Artillery Companies attached to them, whether for Field or Garrison Gun duty (to both of which they should be drilled) to be considered one Corps.

2d. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief is pleased to become Colonel of the Saint John County Militia.

3d. Major Drury of the 1st Battalion, to be Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of St. John Militia, consisting of Three Battalions.

4th. Captain Benjamin L. Peters to be Major of the 1st Battalion.

5th. His Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to appoint Lieutenant Colonel Drury to be His Excellency's Provincial Aid-de-Camp.

6th. In making these arrangements and appointments, His Excellency has been guided by a desire to mark, by some public proof, the satisfaction and approbation which His Excellency entertains of the condition, public spirit and example manifested by the Militia of the County and City of Saint John; and His Excellency sought an occasion to convey further, an honorary compliment to the Militia generally, by selecting, for a distinguished Post, an Officer who has devoted himself with so much zeal and ability to bring the Militia of Saint John to that condition which His Excellency hopes will prove exemplary in effect.

If the office be held by a Military or Naval Officer whether upon full or half Military or Naval pay, the total amount of pay and allowances of every kind actually received by him in addition to the Profits of his Office.

Periods during which the officer has been absent on leave from the Colony.

Whether the Principal or his Deputy enjoy any and what other advantage or profit, not required to be stated in the preceding columns.

Remarks in explanation of the duties of the office and of such subjects as require elucidation.

GLASGOW, August 21.

The independence of Brazil must be considered as still precarious. The people are likely to have cause to repent the creation of an Emperor to rule over them. Accounts from Augsburg mention that Austria is at present using her influence to bring about what is called a reconciliation between Portugal and Brazil. Whether this interference succeed or not, the Brazilians can never be regarded out of danger till they have a native executive.

By the kindness of a commercial Friend we have been favored with the following extract of a letter, dated Calcutta, 10th March, 1824:—"The war with the Burmese is going to be more serious than was at first expected. They not only fight well, but have been successful in one or two skirmishes. They have really threatened to send 100,000 men to Calcutta, and we could not at present command 10,000, if so many, to oppose them. Our soldiers are dreadfully scattered all over India. Coming to Calcutta, however, is out of the question. There is also a report to day that government intend to make every Englishman in Calcutta take arms for the defence of the place; but these are just reports, and we pay no attention to them. At the same time look at the map and you will see that the Burmese are not far from us; but we will soon, I have not the least doubt, have all these barbarians under our feet. They have been allowed to insult us too often without feeling the weight of our power."

LONDON, August 30.

We received, on Thursday, Bombay papers to the 25th April. The total force under orders for the expedition against the Burmese, amounted to 20,000 men, viz. 12,000 from Bengal, 6000 from Madras, and 2000 from Bombay. Captain Catting was to accompany the expedition as political agent. He was to embark at Calcutta, in the Company's yacht Nereid, on the 12th April. The Diana steam boat had been purchased

by the Government for 80,000 rupees, in order to proceed with the expedition. Sir Edward Paget, the Commander-in-Chief, arrived at Calcutta on the 22d March from the interior, and had been unremittingly employed from the day of his arrival in making the necessary arrangements for the expedition.

LIVERPOOL, SEPT. 15.

The newest on dit in the fashionable circles is the approaching nuptials of an Irish Earl of large fortune, (who has lately attained his majority,) and the lovely daughter of a celebrated senator and statesman (Mr. Canning.) The young nobleman in question is the representative of one of the most ancient and illustrious families of the sister kingdom; the young lady is, we believe, in her 18th year, and, independent of her personal attractions, is reported to possess a refined and highly cultivated understanding.

Sir Hudson Lowe is appointed Governor of Antigua, and is about to proceed to such station forthwith.

The house, offices, and types of the John Bull news-paper were seized last week, by virtue of an execution out of the Court of Exchequer, for £1300, amount of a fine and costs imposed on the paper for a further libel on Lady Wrottesley. Singular to state, the money had been paid two years ago! The officers kept possession twenty-four hours. The proprietors mean to seek reparation at law for this outrage. Mr. Lushington, Master of the Crown office, has published the following statement:—"The fines were paid into my office about the time mentioned, and their receipts were regularly returned to the Court of Exchequer, with the other estates, at the proper time in Trinity Term, 1822."

MADRID, August 23.

The fortress of Tariffa was taken by storm on the 19th, at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, by the French and Spanish troops. The rebels, who retreated into the Island, were attacked next morning at day break by the landing of the French troops of the 24th regiment of the line. One Chief only escaped in a boat, the rest were killed or taken. The prisoners have been delivered up to the Spaniards, to be tried according to the Laws.

The Portuguese Ambassador, in a recent interview with Mr. Canning, announced, that his Most Faithful Majesty was no longer of opinion that any aid whatever from this country would be necessary.

We hear that Mr. Moore intends to write the life of his illustrious friend, Lord Byron.

A terrible fire has destroyed above 100 houses in the town of Kyritz in Prussia.

A letter from Gottenborg of the 28th of July, that the greater part of the town of Marstrand is burnt to the ground.

It is a remarkable circumstance, but not generally known, that neither the small pox, measles, hooping cough, nor scarlet fever, have ever been known, either in New South Wales, Van Dieman's Land, or the Sandwich Islands.

Several sudden and severe cases of Cholera Morbus have occurred in Leeds and its
