

Neighbourhood within the last fortnight, in some of which the progress of the disease has been so rapid, that in four or five hours the powers of life have been exhausted to such a degree, that every effort to restore the patient has failed.

To show the rapidity of conveyance by steam, it may be mentioned that the packets are seldom more than eight hours in performing the voyage to Margate; and one packet (the Hero) has wagered 200 guineas to perform the voyage within six hours once in the season! It has already done it in six hours and a quarter.

A large parcel of Lord Byron's manuscripts, intrusted to Count Gamba, was thrown overboard when the Count was taken into Patras, on his way from Zante to Missolonghi.

The present King of Persia has 39 sons and 140 daughters.

It is not perhaps generally known that the house which now constitutes the entrance into the Inner Temple lane, from Fleet St. and which is at present converted into billiard rooms, was originally the residence of Prince Charles Stuart, son of King James I. of England.

It is stated that Carleton House is to be pulled down, and an elegant square built on its site, opening to the park, so as to form an agreeable termination to the new street. It is also mentioned that a new palace is to be erected for his Majesty at the end of the Mall, in St. James's Park—the present Queen's House, as it is called, to form one of the wings.

A new Society of Christians has been formed in Manchester, who profess, as one of their leading tenets, to abstain wholly from animal food, and to live entirely on vegetables. They have for some time rigidly followed this practice.

The letter carried by Sir H. Jones from the King of England to the King of Persia, was, during the journey of embassy through Persia, always placed in a *takht caravan*, or litter, which was escorted by ten Indian troopers and an officer, and was never taken out or replaced without the trumpet of the guard sounding a blast.—Whenever the train stopped it was deposited in the tent of ceremony, under a cloth of gold a sentry with a drawn sword was placed over it, and no one was permitted to sit with his back to it. The correspondence of Princes is an object of general reverence in the East; and the dignity which, by these observances, was attached to the letter of the Sovereign, raised among the people a corresponding respect towards his representative.

His Majesty, on the recommendation of Mr Canning, has appointed Lord Erskine Ambassador to the Court of Sturgard.

The reports from all quarters of the country give the most flattering accounts of the amazing increase of our commerce and manufactures. The iron trade was never in a more flourishing state.

The Discovery, in which, accompanied by the Resolution, captain Cook made his last voyage, and which, after his death, Feb. 4, 1779, at Owyhee, arrived at Sheerness, September 21, 1780, is now the convict ship at Deptford. The interior has undergone considerable alterations to adapt it for the purpose, but the hull and exterior remain in a state of perfect soundness in their original state.

An old man, named Crossman, died last week at Bridgewater, who had kept his coffin by him for the last fifty years, and used it as a cupboard.

Forty-nine thousand four hundred and forty-eight men were engaged in the Irish fisheries last year, during which a bounty was paid on 27,857 barrels of cured herrings.

Upon a valuation, the damage done to the growing crop, near Dunmow Essex, by the calamitous hail storm of the 14th July, amounts to 24,827/6/5d; and its effects were felt upon 3,187 acres of land, occupied by 97 persons.

On Tuesday last, one of the Bath coaches performed the journey, a distance of 108 miles (besides the distance from Hyde Park corner to the Inn) in 21 minutes under 9 hours. The proprietor of the coach very properly admonished the coachman, and cautioned him never again to attempt the same degree of speed.

It is a fact, that not one solitary epistle in the hand writing of George II. is known to exist. This circumstance is more remarkable, if we refer to his galantries and intrigues, severely commented upon and recorded by Walpole and others.

The stone Bridge of seven arches, across the Thames at Kew, with tolls arising therefrom, was lately sold by auction for £19,800.

Sir Charles Bagot is to succeed Sir C. Stuart, at Paris; Mr. Stratford Canning succeeds Sir Charles Bagot, at St. Petersburg; Sir William A'Court to be Ambassador to Lisbon, vice Sir E. Thornton, who goes to Madrid; Mr. Hamilton retires from Naples.

M. Dupin says, the number of our harbours, docks, piers, and lighthouses, extend over more than 600 leagues of coast; our canals in length 1,000 leagues; our roads 46,000 leagues; and that even the pipes for conveying gas and water through the streets of London reach 10,400 leagues.

A new society of christians has been formed at Manchester, who profess, as one of their leading tenets, to wear sky blue stockings and orange coloured shoes.

Letters from Egypt mention that the Pacha will raise 50,000 bales of Cotton. A late London paper remarks all this must come to that country in British bottoms, and consequently will not only be so much abstracted from American growth, but a larger proportion of freight deducted from American tonnage. The celebrated offensive and defensive treaty of Caharine with the Northern powers, first gave importance to the iron manufacture of England, and we shall not be surprised if the American Tariff, should it be persisted in, were to make the Mahometans the most extensive growers of tobacco and cotton.

There is too much reason to apprehend the worst, as Mr. Gibb's hat was found about 150 feet from the boat, and the same faithful dog which was the means of discovering the fate of Mr. G's father, who upwards of two years ago perished in the woods near Black River, was observed sitting on an Island contiguous—Star.

HALIFAX, Oct. 22

We received by the Billow, which arrived yesterday afternoon, a Liverpool paper of the 15th September, and Boston papers to Thursday last. His Majesty LOUIS XVIII. King of France and Navarre, died on the 13th September, in the 69th year of his age. He is succeeded by his brother Charles-Philip, Count D'Artois, who has taken the Title of Charles X. The Papers contain nothing of any moment from South America.
