**SINGULAR CASE OF SUSPENDED ANIMATION.**

A European Medical Journal relates the following case, communicated by M. Bourquet, head surgeon to the hospitale of Beziers; "I was called," says he, "to visit a boy nearly eight years old, who exhibited the following symptoms. As soon as the sun appears upon the horizon, I was told he dies, and at sunset he resuscitates. I wished to see this myself, and in consequence, I remained with him until six o'clock in the morning. He slept very tranquilly. I waked him, made him speak, and amused him until the sun began to rise. It was in the winter. The young invalid, who was up to that moment, very gay, then said to me—Now, Sir, the sickness seizes me; and he lay down upon the bed, when I saw him wearing all the appearance of death. He had no sensible respiration, no pulse, no motion of the heart, no feeling even though the child was pricked. The body remained extremely cold for at least two hours, after which the cold diminished, without, however, ceasing entirely, and the only apparent sign of life was a convulsive movement of the right eye led. I forcibly raised one of the arms, and it remained in the upright position; one of the legs, also; the members were like soft wax, that takes every impression. He remained thus without swallowing, till the sun had disappeared from the horizon when he recovered his senses by degrees, and rose without any symptom that could indicate his having been ill. This singular patient had already had ten similar paroxysms. His cure was effected by portions of kina and sublimate zinc."

**Fredericton Savings Bank.**

**A**T a Meeting of the principal Inhabitants of the Town of Fredericton, held at Government House, on Wednesday the 17th day of December, 1824, at the request of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, for the purpose of establishing and organizing a Savings Bank or Provident Institution in the said Town.

His Excellency was pleased to open the business by the following Address:

"Gentlemen,  
"I refer you to the reports which you will have read of the proceedings of a meeting held elsewhere; to take into consideration the expediency of establishing Savings Banks in this Province; on which occasion I brought forward the measures in an address, which you will probably have already perused: I shall not therefore take up your time, with any introductory remarks on the importance, the expediency, and the benefits of such Institutions.—These advantages are no longer speculative: these admirable institutions have realized, wherever they have been established, all the expectations entertained by their framers. The great leading principles upon which Savings Banks have been established, have been amply repaid by the confidence that has been placed in their utility and security—by the avidity and alacrity with which they have been adopted by all classes—by the happy tendencies they have of increasing the comforts of Society, by giving a spur to industry; furnishing a fund for the education and settlement of children, and of operating as a resource against the day of want, sickness, and old age.

"These admirable institutions have proved to encourage a new order of things in the common concerns of life, among the labouring classes of society; they have a direct tendency to produce order, regularity, temperance, and economy, and all those domestic habits and dispositions, which tend to increase human happiness, and to improve moral principle.

They create the pride of industrious independence, which by its honest exertions, in such a Country as this in particular, would soon place men above want, and enable them to meet sudden and unexpected calls, arising from sickness, or the contingent distresses of unfavorable times, and that without intrenching deeply on the hopes and expectations of a more favourable period, in a manner that would require the exertion of years to overcome.

"To consolidate all these interests here: Support and protection of these measures must be looked to elsewhere; but I am persuaded we may lay the foundation we are preparing, by these beginnings, with full confidence that they will meet the fostering care, which must be bestowed upon them hereafter, to secure the benefits which they have elsewhere produced."

IT WAS THEREUPON RESOLVED, That a Bank be accordingly established; to be called

"The Fredericton Savings Bank."  
And that His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, be respectfully requested to become Patron; to which His Excellency was pleased to signify his assent.

**TRULY DISTRESSING INTELLIGENCE.**

A letter from Cumberland, dated 2nd Dec. received by the Mail on Saturday, mentions the loss of a schooner from Prince Edward Island, bound to Miramichi, off Point Skiminac, with ten passengers on board, all of whom with the crew perished. It also states that about ten days before, two young men skating on the River Richibucto, fell through the ice, and four others who went to their assistance also fell in, when melancholy to relate all perished.

Important.—Cleared out from the Custom House here, in five days between the 6th and 15th instant, 27,534 quintals of Cod Fish, 93 casks of salmon, 344 tons of Oil, 45 barrels of herrings, and 20 barrels of Mackerel. Value £19,000.

Halifax, Dec. 15.

The Billow, which arrived on Monday evening last, brought Liverpool Papers to the 23d October and Boston to the 6th inst. from which we have made a number of extracts:

The Greek Government having discovered that Foreign Vessels were occasionally employed by the Turks in the conveyance of Arms, &c. issued a Proclamation, declaring that the said Vessels were not to be considered as Neutrals, but as enemies, and ordering the Ships of War of the Nation to attack, burn or sink, such as they might fall in with, "together with their Crews." Against this Proclamation a remonstrance was made on the part of Great-Britain by the Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands.—The Greeks however, persisted in the measure, and an order was consequently issued for the capture and detention of all Greek Vessels of War—subsequently, however, the obnoxious Proclamation was recalled, and the business amicably settled.

The Greeks, we are happy to state, appear to be gaining ground—they had been partially successful in a recent attack upon the Turkish Squadron.

Some disaffection had been exhibited by one of the Portuguese Regiments at Lisbon—but it appears to have been soon quelled.

The accounts from Spain are far from encouraging an expectation of the speedy return of tranquillity to that unhappy Kingdom.

From England the intelligence continues to be most satisfactory.—The Official Returns of the Revenue for the Quarter ending in October, presented the most gratifying proofs of the prosperity of the country.

HAVANA, Oct. 30.—"I am sorry to say that the Pirates have again appeared on this side of Cuba. The Laura-Ann of New-York, last from Montevideo, with jerked beef, has been taken, and all hands, except one, HUNG—the vessel burnt between this and Mantanzas; the Person who escaped, says a brig and a schooner were also taken and THE PEOPLE ALL MURDERED. If Piracy is to be suppressed, measures must be taken, more efficient than any yet adopted by our Government."

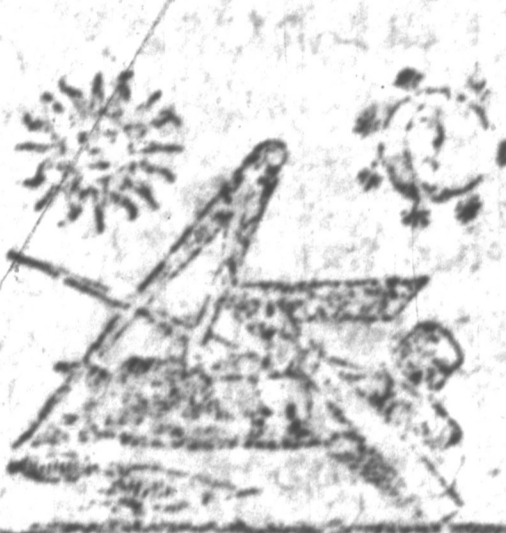
