

quence to wise and moderate men. They have conveyed no light of good principles or any right feeling into the monkish and cruel Cabinet of Ferdinand, though, in some particulars they may check its tendency to violence; they have done nothing to assimilate to their own projects, when moderate and somewhat liberal, the best of the Constitutional party, because they could command no confidence. Thus has a fine kingdom been hurled, by a wretched policy, into circumstances which admit of no hope but in the chance of a terrible convulsion. Whilst the Constitution remained, there was hope of its own improvement because it was under the influence of public sentiment, and because, under the Constitutional Government, many wise and virtuous men gave their talents and principles to promote the public welfare; there was also hope that the Constitution would amend, not only itself, but also the nation; and such must have been its operation, for Spain wants nothing to make her great but knowledge and industry, with public liberty, the source of both. As soon as the French touched the soil, these hopes vanished; and, certainly nothing now remains as to the lot of that unhappy country but a growing degradation, down to that point at which despair creates energy and effort, but energy and effort convulsive, indiscriminate, and destructive.

Halifax Oct. 22.

We have New-York papers to the 12th, and Boston papers to the 14th inst. inclusive.

On the 3d of July Lima is said to have remained in possession of the Royalists; but, according to a report brought via Santa Martha, the Patriots under BOLIVAR, had obtained a victory over the Royal forces.

Accounts from Gibraltar Sept. 4, say that forty four of the leaders in the late affair at Tarifa, had been massacred in cool blood; and that 22 others had escaped to the Barbary shore.

A brig from Halifax is said to have got into Pernambuco previous to the 17th of August: According to the last accounts from the squadron off that port, Sept. 7, Lord Cochrane had sent in two bomb vessels: which had done some mischief to a part of the town; but the wood of which the houses are built, is said to be rather of an incombustible nature—so that the damage was not quite equal to his Lordship's humane expectations.—W. C.

PIRATES. A letter from Matanzas Sept. 6; mentions 130 or 140 sailors having been lately sent there by a Colombian privateer, most of whom, it was supposed, would join the Pirates on the coast.—

Boston, Oct. 1. — Arr. last evening, brig Camel, Tate, of Salem, from Pernambuco. Left Aug. 17. Sperm, Clarke, of Nantucket from New York, arr. about a week before, and was discharging. The port was blockaded by a 74, frigate, gunbrig, and two schrs. under Com. Taylor. During the temporary absence of all the squadron, except the first named, the Sportac anchored off the port, in the night, inside of the 74, and ignorant of the blockade.—Early the next morning the American Consul repaired on board, and had her brought into port, before the ship could board her, her cables being cut or slipped. A brig from Halifax, had also got in. It was reported that no vessel would be allowed to leave the port after the 18th. The Camel sailed the evening previous, and was not boarded.

Spoke 5th inst. lat. 40, 21, long. 63, shr. Olive, Richards 56 days from Jamaica. St. John, N. B. with foremast disabled by lightning—supplied her with provisions, water and coal.

The Right Rev. the late Bishop of this Province, having in consequence of age and infirmity, been induced to resign, it affords great satisfaction to learn, that the Reverend Doctor John Inglis, has been appointed to fill that highly important office; and will be duly consecrated—Lord Bishop of Nova-Scotia, during the present month.—W. We have the pleasure in stating that S. G. W. Archibald, Esq. has been appointed Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island, and that His Majesty has been pleased to discontinue with his residence in that Colony; and that this appointment is not to interfere with his practice at the bar, or to prevent him from

holding his seat in the Legislature, or any other office in Nova-Scotia.—A. R.

If we can believe the accounts from Smyrna to the 5th of August, and Alexandria to the 4th of July, the Turks are making most enormous preparations for the subjugation of Greece. But the reports are evidently much exaggerated; from the former place we are told that 60,000 Asiatic troops (a savage horde, more properly) had possessed the environs on their route to Scala Nuova, for embarkation against the Island of Rhodus. The Alexandrian accounts inform us, for about the fiftieth time, of the Egyptian expedition. It is to consist we are assured, of 16,000 Infantry 4000 Cavalry, 5000 Albanians—a park of artillery—a rich military chest, and 200 transports to convey horses, provisions, &c. &c.—but not a word is said about the period fixed for its departure. As for the Asiatic Savages, in the first place we wholly disbelieve the numbers stated to be on their march, and with respect to the Pacha of Egypt we think him much too wise a man to exhaust his resources in prolonging a useless contest.
