REGIMENTAL ORDER, 1ST YORK MILITIA.

Fredericton, 1st October.

No. 1.—The yearly Muster and Inspection of the Battalion, having been ordered by His Excellency The Lieutenant-Governor, to take place on Saturday the 23d of October, Captains and Officers commanding Companies will give the necessary orders for the parade of their Companies at 9 o'clock A. M. of that day, on the Church Square in Fredericton, at which time they will have muster rolls and returns of their Companies for the Commanding Officer, in which lists they will name all Exempts, Absentees, Aliens, &c. within their several Districts.

No. 2.—The particular attention of Officers is called to the 1st, 8th, 17th, and 41st Sections of the Militia Law; for nothing can be effected creditable to the Battalion unless the Officers strictly cooperate in the execution of their duty.

In issuing the above orders, the Commanding Officer cannot but confidently hope that the York Militia will be actuated by the same laudable zeal and exertion which so happily pervades all ranks of the Militia throughout the Province; and that on the 23d instant the most general attendance will be given by a class of Men who are proud of having been born in a British Colony.
