Arrived at the Port of St. John on Friday the 25th ultimo, the brig Juno, Kay, from London, 38 days, in ballast, to R. Ranken, & Co.

On Saturday last, an Inquest was held in the Parish of St. Mary, before WM. TAYLOR, Esq. Coroner for the County of York, on view of the Body of JAMES YOUNG, of that Parish, who was unfortunately killed on Thursday the 1st inst. by the starting of a Brow of Timber. It appeared upon evidence, that after supper, he, and another man went out for the purpose of cutting off some pins, in order to be ready to start a tier of Timber in the morning—he went on the Brow, and at the first stroke he gave into the Pin, the Brow started, and he fell with the Timber and was instantly killed. About 40 Tons went over him—he was not got out until late the next day.

DIED] At his house at Oak Point, Miramichi, on the 22d of March last, after a short, but severe illness, Mr. JAMES DAVIDSON, aged 61 years, —a man loved and respected by all who knew him.

HIBERNIAN SOCIETY—MIRAMICHI.

The Members of this Society, celebrated the Festival of Saint Patrick, by meeting together, at New-Castle, on the 17th instant. Nearly 60 persons, including public and private Guests, sat down to a sumptuous dinner, in MITCHELL'S best style, at 7 o'clock: WILLIAM END, Esq. President, and JOHN HENRY, Esq. Vice-President. After the cloth was removed, the following toasts from the Chair were drunk in bumpers, and appropriate airs were successively played:

- The pious memory of Saint Patrick—Tune, Patrick's Day.
- George the Fourth, our Patriot King—(3 times 3)—God save the King.
- Duke of York and Army—(3 times 3)—Duke of York's March.
- Duke of Clarence and Navy—(3 times 3)—Rule Britannia.
- Sons of St. George and Old England—Roast Beef.
- Sons of St. Andrew and Scotland—Bruce's Address.
- Sons of St. David and Wales—Ap Shenkin.
- Sons of St. Patrick all over the world—Sprig of Shesleah.
- Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, Sir Howard Douglas—Moirs's Welcome.
- The Hon J. M. Bliss, President of the Province—The Pilot that weather'd the Storm.
- The fair Daughters of Acadia (by the Vice-President)—3 times 3—Green grow the rushes O.
- The Land we live in, and prosperity to it—3 times 3—Meeting of the Waters.
- The Timber Trade—3 times 3—Off she goes to Miramichi.

After which, Liberty Hall.

In the course of the evening several volunteer toasts were given, and many national and truly comic songs sung, and the enjoyments of the meeting occasionally enlivened by the liltings of the Irish pipe.

JAMES ABBOTT, Esquire, having proposed the health of the President, (which was drunk with enthusiasm) Mr. END rose and addressed the meeting, nearly as follows:

"GENTLEMEN,
"I beg leave to return you my most hearty thanks, as well for your kindness in drinking my health, as for this signal instance of your partiality—your choosing me to preside at this most respectable board. The approbation of our fellow men, is, in all cases, a powerful incitement to human action; but it is heart-exciting indeed, to be approved of by those to whom we are bound by that holy spell—Country. As I cannot reduce to words the overflowings of my heart upon this occasion, I must be silent upon it; but I think this a proper time to draw your attention to a subject, which is,

in my opinion, of vast importance, not only to this Settlement, but to the Province in general—I mean the encouragement and settling of Emigrants.

"I see around me gentlemen of England, Scotland, and Ireland, members of their respective National Societies, and to them I would now be understood to address myself. We are all aware of the false colours hung out by several interested persons at home, to induce unfortunate people to emigrate to these shores. It is, Gentlemen, little short of the Slave Trade—it is, in fact, a legalized Slave Trade. Destitute Emigrants are thrown into this country, ignorant of its manners and customs, and incapable of supporting themselves by this country work, knowing nothing of the use of that powerful engine of improvement—the axe. Their situations are consequently extremely miserable; and after drudging on board of vessels in the river, or suffering the privations produced by want of employment, they become disgusted with the country, and most commonly migrate to the United States. This, Gentlemen, is no imaginary case: many a cargo of muscles and sinews has this Province lost in the manner I mention. This, Gentlemen, is an evil that cries aloud for remedy. I think we can remedy it, and you will all agree with me, that we are under a weighty obligation to do so: let us give it serious and deliberate attention. We may fix that loyalty which is too often wavering; we may, by advice and a little pecuniary assistance judiciously applied, line the banks of this magnificent river, with good subjects and industrious settlers, and prevent emigrants from our respective countries, from becoming weapons in the hands of those who may one day wield them as our enemies.

"I shall leave it to you, Gentlemen, who are better informed, to propose means for carrying these laudable objects into effect, and I conjure you to give them your serious attention.

"I shall conclude by proposing a bumper toast,
"May the Sons of the Three Kingdoms never forget, that Charity is the cement of their Associations."

Which was drunk with 3 times 3.
Doctor KEY next arose, and addressed the Chair, as follows:—

"As President of the Society of Saint Andrew, I beg leave, on the part of our association, to state, that we perfectly concur in your sentiments, and will go hand in hand with our brethren of Saint Patrick, in the matter you propose. We have had this subject, indeed, for some time in contemplation, and I am happy it has now been mentioned, and hope that your Committee, St. George's, and ours, may fix upon a day for the consideration of this subject, the great importance of which must be obvious to every man of sense and feeling."

After an eloquent and impressive speech by the Revd. ARCHIBALD McQUEEN, upon the same subject, and concurring remarks from members of the Society of St. George, a day was fixed for the further discussion of the matter.

The room was tastefully ornamented with transparencies upon classical and national subjects, from the pencil of Mr. G. N. SMITH.

The wines were as excellent as the Province could afford, and were done ample justice to. The utmost harmony and conviviality prevailed, and the company broke up at 4 in the morning, truly feeling the force of the Bard of Erin's lines,

"Joy so seldom weaves a chain
"Like this to night, that oh! 'tis pain
"To break its links in vain."
