

ness. The Greeks deeply and sincerely lamented the death of this valuable friend, and had a general mourning for 21 days. At their request, his heart was left with them as a precious relic, while his body was carried to England. His last thoughts were of his wife, child and sister. Lord B. wrote his life to a certain age, and gave it to Mr. Thomas Moore, who had sold it to Mr. Murray for 8000 dollars—but when he found his relations were averse to its publication, he redeemed it, and allowed it to be burned. His Lordship was in his 97th year, and is succeeded in his title by Capt. Byron of the Navy.

There are assertions pro and con, respecting Peace between England and Algiers, but these regarding the continuance of the War appear to be the latest and best supported. It was said there were six Algerine frigates at Alexandria, Egypt, and 15 British merchant vessels.

The late Emperor of Mexico, Iturbide, had sailed from England for that country, under an impression that his presence was necessary and wished for. He professes not to intend to attempt to re-establish the Imperial Government. He carries a printing office with him.

The King and Queen of the Sandwich Islands had arrived in England. They remained some time without accepting invitations or going abroad, because they intended to pay their first visit to George IV. and suitable costumes were preparing for them.

THE KING.—His Majesty, we are happy to state, is perfectly recovered, and will be present at the Drawing room to-day. Among the company, it is expected the King and Queen of the Sandwich Islands and their sister will be presented. These illustrious visitors are now residing at Osborne's Hotel, in the Adelphi, and by the singularity of their appearance, attract considerable crowds of spectators. To beggars and itinerant musicians who attract their notice from the windows, they are particularly munificent, and throw them dollars.

An insurrection has broken out in Lisbon—the King was confined in his Palace, and his Ministers sent to prison by order of Don Miguel and the Queen. It is said that the deposition of the King was intended, and would have been carried into effect but for the spirited conduct of the Foreign Ambassadors and Ministers, and that the Infant Don Miguel would have been proclaimed Regent. The insurrection took place on the 30th of April—tranquillity was not restored on the 6th of May—several arrests had been made.—The King's person was considered not to be out of danger—preparations were making for his reception on board the Windsor Castle, where alone it was said he could remain in safety.

A most violent thunder storm was experienced at Quebec on the 7th instant by which the Barracks were seriously injured, and 17 men, we understand, were killed. A young officer who was looking out of the window of his room, was struck by the lightning, which entering his shoulder, discharged itself at his hip, and he instantly expired.—Hal. 'Free Press,' 29th June.

Extract of a letter from Tunis, dated March 28 :—"This morning the Basha, Bey of Tunis, breathed his last at the Royal Palace. He is succeeded by his eldest son, Sidi Hassan Bey, without opposition, which has been announced by salvos of artillery from the Castle and Forts."

A letter from Paris states, that Sir Charles Stewart, our ambassador in that capital, has received instructions from home to facilitate the return to England of the English workmen now in France. In consequence of these instructions, Sir Charles Stewart has issued the following notice, which is expected to have all the effect desired :—"Notice is hereby given, that all British workmen employed in France will, upon application to his Britannic Majesty's Embassy, receive every facility to return to England."

DEATH OF LORD BYRON.

Greek Chronicles received in London, announce the melancholy intelligence of the death of Lord Byron on the 19th of April at Missolonghi, in consequence of a rheumatic inflammatory fever, which lasted for ten days. During his Lordship's illness, the most profound sorrow was universally expressed, and the account of his decease was communicated to the public by a proclamation of the provisional government of Greece, in which, orders were given to fire minute guns from the batteries equal to the number (37) of years which his Lordship had lived; to suspend all business in public offices and Courts of Justice, for three days; to shut up all shops, and to postpone the Easter Festivities, then celebrating, for the same period. A general mourning took place for 21 days, and funeral ceremonies were performed in all the Churches. The Greeks had requested and obtained his Lordship's heart, to be placed in a Mausoleum in the Country, the liberation of which, was his last wish. His body was to be conveyed to England. He has left one daughter now a minor.

The memoirs of Lord Byron's life, written by himself, and which had been transmitted to London for publication, have been destroyed.—N. Y. Daily Ad.

House of Commons, May 8.

FRENCH FLEET.—Sir J. Mackintosh wished to put a question respecting rumours which had gone abroad of the arrival of a French Fleet off the Coast of Brazil. He wished to know first whether the rumour was true, and secondly, if so, whether Ministers had asked or received any explanation.

Mr. Canning had no hesitation in saying it was true that French ships going to different destinations, had met in the harbor of Rio Janeiro, and that in consequence of some loose conversation amongst the French Officers, rumours had gone abroad for which he believed there was no foundation. From

such explanations as the French Ambassador could give on the spur of the moment, speaking from the general knowledge which he possessed, Ministers felt satisfied that there was no foundation whatever for the representations sent abroad. A communication had, however, been made to the French Government on the subject; and, he had no doubt, that a very few days would enable him positively to state that which he now believed to be the case.

LONDON, MAY 17.

Mejor-General Sir Howard Douglas, Lieut. Governor of N. Brunswick, and suite, have arrived at Portsmouth, to take their passage to Halifax, in the Samarang, 28, Sir Wm. Wiseman, which ship will shortly sail for the North American station.

Rear Admiral W. T. Lake, C. B. is expected to hoist his flag on board the Jupiter, in the course of next week, at Portsmouth, on his appointment as Commander-in-Chief on the Halifax station.
