VESSELS SPOKEN.

On the 12th May, the brig Ann, of and from Workington, of Miramichi, 39 days out, was spoken by the brig Ward of this port, having lost her bowsprit, fore-top-mast, and fore-mast sprung.

By the Montreal--May 23, long. 53, the Am. brig Globe, of Providence, bound to Rotterdam--all well.

By the Mary--May 6, lat. 48, 28, brig Rambler from Hull bound to Halifax, was hove on her beam ends and obliged to cut away her main-top-mast on the 29th April and lost three men overboard.

The Willington on the 6th May, boarded a French Ketch, mainmast and bowsprit gone; 6th, saw a brig under jury-masts--foremast and bowsprit gone; 9th, spoke the Mentor, of Hartley, with the loss of all her bulwarks and a boy; 12th, Isabella, of N. Shields, lying by the Northumbrian, who had lost her main-top-mast, main yard, and most of her sails--was informed that he spoke the Renovation, of Shields, who told him that the Hercules, of London, had lost all her masts; 14th, spoke the Mentor again, who was informed by the Britannia, of N. Shields, that they had passed the Henry, of London, with her masts gone, and no person on board; 15th, spoke the Seven Brothers, of Shields, all well--who informed that they had spoke a ship which told them that the James, of London had lost her main-mast, and that the Maria, of Shields, had both pumps going during the gales; 16th, spoke a Newfoundland Banker, from Teignmouth, who informed that he had passed a great deal of wreck, and picked up a topsail--out six weeks.

By the Amelia--The Rambler of Whitby running for England, on the 29th April, having lost her mainmast and four men in lat. 43, long. 26, W.--22d April, the ship John & Robert, of Bristol, laden for Montreal also running for England, with the loss of fore-top-mast in lat. 43, long 25. Same day, saw the Maria of Bristol, with her three top-masts gone.

The Mountaineer, (at Miramichi,) fell in with the Mantle, from Shields for that port, in a sinking state--took the crew from the wreck; and afterwards put them (with the exception of one man) on board a vessel bound for England. Also, fell in with brig Lydia of Miramichi, in distress, having experienced a heavy gale, April 18th, long 38, 47, in which she sustained considerable damage, and lost one man; supplied her with a main-yard which was all she then stood in need of.

The ship Ross, Huntley, (at Miramichi,) fell in with the crew of the Camillus of Quebec; which vessel had foundered April 18, long. 38, lat. 45, 4; took part of the people--the remainder got on board another vessel. The Camillus lost three men off the fore yard three days before she was abandoned--had spoke an Am. ship of Baltimore, which had lost the Capt. and one boy in a gale; also, a brig from Poole, for Newfoundland, in distress, but could not afford relief in consequence of a very heavy gale; she bore up for England--April 23, fell in with the brig ---, she had lost all her boats, bulwarks, stanchions, cook house, and every thing above the deck but the masts, and making a great deal of water ---After requesting to be reported, she bore up for England, with a heavy gale at N. W.

The brig Susannah, (at Miramichi,) fell in with the John & Joseph, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, in distress; but could not render any assistance.

The Loyalist, (at Halifax,) spoke May 1, ship Daedalus, from London, for Miramichi, with nothing but fore-mast standing, returned to England. She had the crew of the brig Henry on board, taken off the wreck; same day, Am. brig Telegraph, Parry, she had lost two men in a gale on the 28th April. 5th lat. 40, 23, long 31, Castlereagh, Gray, for Quebec--all well.

The Fair Lady (at Halifax) fell in with, May 1, ship Argo, dismasted and abandoned; 9th, spoke brig John, from London for P. E. Island, dismasted.

The John Dunn (at St. Andrews,) May 3, lat. 46, 40, N. 28, 30 W. spoke the brig Sarah, of and from Liverpool for Newf. Id. out 44 days, dismasted, then under jury masts, making for a port in Ireland, a large ship in company. 13th of May, lat. 46, long. 40, W. the brig Greenbow, from Cork, to St. Andrews, with Passengers, 32 days out.

The Wm. Thompson, (at New-York) spoke, April 30, lat. 46, long. 40, brig Herald of Greenock; the Capt. and two Seamen were washed overboard two days previous; her decks swept, main-yard, boom &c. blown away. May 7, lat. 43, long. 43, spoke brig Maid of the Mill, from Liverpool, had been 21 days under close reefed topsails, lying too.

In addition to those above mentioned, the following vessels are reported to have been abandoned at sea:--Providence from Dartmouth; Matthew and Thomas, Shields; Prince William, Shields; Margery, London; Cumberland, Liverpool; Fredericton, Shields; Jean, Irvine; Liberty, Whitby; Dowson, Aberdeen.
