LONDON, JULY 20.

We received last night, by Express, French Papers to the 18th inst. with the Etoile of Monday. Accounts from Syria state that most of the foreigners who had enlisted in the service of the Pacha of Egypt, finding that, contrary to his promises, he was directing his forces and their abilities against Greece, had taken the first opportunity to effect their escape. They had entered into engagements with him, because they considered him a liberal man, who was more disposed to assert his own independence, than to bend to the dictates of the Porte. Indeed, it is said that he had assured them that his policy was to let the GRAND SEIGNIOR exhaust his means, whilst he strengthened himself, and that whatever aid he might promise to give, he was too sensible of his own interest to afford it more than verbally. The dilatory nature of his conduct during the last two years, was considered as a proof that he meant to maintain a disguised neutrality. From the moment, however, that he took an active part in the contest those officers conceived themselves deceived if not betrayed, and hastened to quit his dominions and service as opportunities of doing so presented themselves. Among those who have abandoned the Egyptian cause, are the two Counts of LANTOSCA, Piedmontese, and a great number of French and Italian veterans. Those who have remained, complain loudly of the manner in which they have found in Egypt "abundance of promises, but few effects, and a total want of good faith, and that envied, hated, and constantly menaced, there was no situation more deplorable than their own."

In order to prevent the Austrians from reiterating their complaints, or threatening to take hostile measures, the Greek Government has issued a Decree, ordering the establishment of a Commission of five members at Napoli di Romania to examine strictly the merchant vessels sent in by the Greek fleet as having violated neutrality before proceeding to condemnation.

The French Consulate in Spain has sent notice to the French Government that the permission to import foreign grain into that country, was prolonged from the 30th of June to the 30th of August.

Brussels Papers to the 18th instant, and German Gazettes to a late date, have also arrived. It is stated, on the authority of a letter from Trieste, of the 1st instant, that the Greek General GOURAS, has defeated a body of 6,000 Turks at Salona. The Turkish Commander is said to have surrendered on capitulation, which, however, the Greek General declared null, because the Turks had previously massacred some of the Greek prisoners; and in retaliation put the whole of the Turkish prisoners to the sword. A letter from Zante, of the 21st ult. states, that in the Morea, ISRAHIM PACHA, after having burned Calamata, had suffered reverses, and was in great danger from the Greeks

under COLCOTRONI. The CAPTAIN PACHA's fleet, which had sailed from the Greeks, was said to have joined the Egyptians at Suda, in Crete, where it was observed by the united Greek fleets of SACROURIS and MANTONIS.

The Austrian Observer contains extracts from the Hydra Gazettes, giving an account of the operations which preceded the capitulation of Navarino. These add nothing material to the statements before given in the same Paper; and the whole of the intelligence merely resolves itself into a confirmation of the fall of Navarino, and the successful irruption of the Turks, with rather a flat contradiction of the alleged destruction of Modon and the Egyptian fleet.

His Majesty George the Fourth.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of his MAJESTY'S Coronation, the Royal Standard was hoisted on Westminster Abbey, St. Martin's Church, and the Public Offices. The morning was ushered in by the ringing of bells, which continued their merry peals during the day. At one o'clock the Park and Tower guns were fired.

In the annals of British history, among the Sovereigns who have wielded the sceptre of this country, the reigning MONARCH of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland has justly acquired a celebrity which will remain until the pillars of this world are shaken to the centre and time shall be no more. Never did the Bohemian plume, placed by the third EDWARD upon the head of his gallant son, designate the Black Prince, never did it appear so resplendently beautiful as when waving upon the head of the late HER APARENT (to, and now the possessor of the Crown of these Kingdoms).

His most Gracious MAJESTY, when Prince Regent, during the long protracted illness of his Royal Father, our late revered Sovereign, covered the country with glory. The successful and brilliant termination of the war in the Peninsula by the matchless heroism of the British arms under the command of the immortal WELLINGTON—the hurling of the Tyrant of Europe from his usurped throne—the restoration of the legitimate Sovereign of France to that Crown worn by his ancestors, but wrested from him by a regicide Democracy—those illustrious deeds will ever render pre-eminently glorious the Regency of his present MAJESTY.
