A COMET.

SIR.—I beg through your paper to call attention to a Comet which I have lately observed. The horizon having been clouded, has prevented its rise being seen, but its magnetical azimuth last night at 9h. 40m. was taken at N. 77d. E. It reached our meridian this morning at 4h. 10m. The nucleus was then 1 d. 30m. from the small star α towards ν in the right leg of Taurus, from which its luminous train extended nearly to the stars σ and τ in the same constellation.

Those who wish merely to gratify curiosity, may easily perceive the Comet about 11 o'clock, nearly in the east, at a middle distance to the right, between the pleides and the bright star Aldebaran. Its tail will be distinctly perceived, by the naked eye, extending upwards to two small stars situated nearly together.

Charles Brown ran away from my service

on the first of August, he was brought back by his father, and was kept by his under pretence of Ill Health; I was summoned to appear on Monday last, before Henry Smith and George Minchin, Esqrs. to answer the complaint of Abraham Brown, the father of the said Charles W. Brown, of the Cruel Usage his son received from me; accordingly I attended Mr. Brown produced all the evidence in his power, but did not substantiate the charge of Ill Treatment; on the contrary, was proved by Gibson, an indentured apprentice of mine, that the boy Charles W. Brown, had no cause to complain of the treatment which he received, and the Court having heard the evidence adduced, did give no opinion thereon, but advised the parties to compromise the matter. Knowing the boy would be more trouble than profit to me, and from no other inducement, I voluntarily gave up his indentures, and I hereby challenge any person or persons to prove Cruel Usage from me, to the said Charles W. Brown, whilst in my service.

Hamilton, Bermuda, Aug. 27.
A heavy gale from the N. E. commenced this morning about half past 4 o'clock. A number of houses in this town and its vicinity have sustained considerable damage. When our paper went to Press the wind had in a great measure abated.

Extract of a Letter from St. George's dated Sept. 1, 1825.

We had a severe Gale on the 27th, which unroofed a number of Houses, destroyed a great many Cedar Trees, and injured several Vessels. The Am. Brig Elaira, belonging to Portland (Maine) was driven from her anchorage off the Tanks; and

totally lost. The crew saved themselves by jumping from the stern of the Vessel upon the rocks at the Cut in Millet Bay. Part of the materials were saved. She had discharged her cargo at the Dock Yard previous to the gale."
