

of Parliament, several Peers entered the House shortly before three o'clock, but the attendance was by no means so numerous as might have been expected, if His Majesty had been present on the occasion. The Lords Commissioners were, the Lord Chancellor, the Earl of Westmoreland, the Earl of Harrowby, the Earl of Liverpool, and the Earl of Shaftesbury. — These Noble Lords, and some others, appeared in their Robes; and on the Benches of the Opposition side were observed several Ladies of distinction, who seemed to regard the imposing scene with earnest curiosity. At three o'clock precisely, the Lords Commissioners being seated on the Woolsack, the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod conducted the Speaker of the House of Commons to the Bar. The Right Hon. Gentlemen was attended but by very few of the Members, and after some routine business was gone through, and the Royal Assent given by Commission to several Bills, the Lord Chancellor delivered the following Speech on the part of His Majesty: —

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*  
The business of the Session being now brought to a conclusion, we are commanded by His Majesty to express the great satisfaction which he feels in releasing you from your labourious attendance in Parliament.  
His Majesty returns you his warmest acknowledgements for the zeal and assiduity with which you have prosecuted your enquiries into the state of Ireland, which he recommended to you at the opening of the Session.

It is a particular gratification to His Majesty, that the tranquillity and improved condition of that part of the United Kingdom have rendered the extraordinary powers with which you had invested His Majesty no longer necessary for the public safety.

His Majesty is happy to be able to announce to you, that he receives from all foreign Powers the strongest assurances of their friendly disposition towards this country, and of their desire to maintain the general peace.

While His Majesty regrets the continuance of the war in the East Indies with the Burmese Government, he trusts that the gallant exertions of the British and native forces employed in operations in the enemy's territory may lead to a speedy and satisfactory termination of the contest.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*  
We have it in command from His Majesty to thank you for the Supplies you have granted to him for the service of the present year, and at the same time to express the satisfaction he derives from the reduction you have found it practicable to make in the burthens of his People.  
*My Lords and Gentlemen,*  
His Majesty has commanded us to assure you, that he is highly sensible of the advantages which most from the measures you have adopted, in the course of this Session for extending the commerce of his subjects, by the removal of unnecessary and inconvenient restrictions, and from the beneficial relaxations which you have deemed it expedient to introduce into the Colonial system of this country.

These measures his Majesty is persuaded will evince to his subjects in the distant possessions the solicitude with which Parliament watches over their welfare. They tend to cement and consolidate the interests of the Colonies with those of the Mother Country; and His Majesty confidently trusts that they will contribute to promote that general and increasing prosperity, on which His Majesty had the happiness of congratulating you on the opening of the present Session, and which, by the blessing of Providence, continues to pervade every part of this Kingdom.

The Lord Chancellor then prorogued Parliament to Thursday, the 25th August.

**YORK GENERAL SESSIONS,**  
JUNE 1825.  
RULES and REGULATIONS made and established by the Justices of the General Sessions of the Peace in and for the County of York in General Sessions assembled, for the lading and unlading of Vessels or Boats and for the government of all Carmen, Waggoners and Truckmen within the Parish of Frederick, and for establishing and fixing the Rates and Fares to be taken for the Truckage of Goods, Wares, Merchandize and other articles within said Parish, between the Creek next below the Rev. Mr. Best's, Southward, Phillis' Creek, Northward, and the Alms House Westward, in pursuance of the power and authority vested in the said Justices by an Act of the General Assembly made and passed in the present year of His Majesty's Reign intitled "An ACT to authorize the Justices of the Peace in the County of York, to make regulations respecting Carmen and Waggoners, and the lading and unlading of Vessels or Boats in the Parish of Frederick."  
I. That every Carman, Waggoner, or Truckman who Carries Goods for hire, shall cause to be marked or painted, on the near or left hand side of every Cart, Waggon, Truck, Sled, or other Vehicle used by him in his said occupation a certain number, which he shall cause to be recorded by the Clerk of the Parish, (which shall be different from any previously recorded number) and which shall be marked or painted in fair and legible characters, of not less than two inches in length; and every person who shall follow the occupation of a Carman, Waggoner, or Truckman, and who shall neglect to mark his Carts, Waggons, Trucks, Sleds or other Vehicles as is herein direct-

ed, shall for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Twenty Shillings.

II. That every Carman, Waggoner or Truckman shall be entitled to demand and receive for the Truckage of any articles, and for carefully housing the same when necessary, the several rates and fares set forth in the Scale hereunto annexed; and any person who shall demand and receive a greater rate or fare than is therein allowed, shall for every offence forfeit and pay the sum of Ten Shillings.

III. That all Carmen, Waggons, and Truckmen, shall be ready with their Teams at all reasonable times, to convey such Goods, Wares Merchandize, or other articles within that part of the Parish of Frederick as aforesaid, as may be required of them, and any such person who shall refuse or neglect upon the first requisition to attend and convey Goods, Wares, Merchandize, or other articles within the Parish of Frederick as aforesaid, (not being actually employed elsewhere in his said occupation) shall for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Ten Shillings.

IV. And whereas great delay frequently happens in the unlading of Vessels or Boats, by reason of the Carmen, Waggons and Truckmen not remaining to complete the unlading of such Vessel as they have commenced with, It is therefore ordered that whenever any Carman, Waggoner or Truckman shall have commenced to unlade any Vessel or Boat he shall continue, and shall not proceed to any other employment until the Cargo of such Vessel or Boat be discharged (unless it can be shown that the Master of the Vessel was in fault) under the penalty of Twenty Shillings for each and every offence.
