At three o'clock piecisely, the Lords Commissioners being seated on the Woolsack, the Deputy Usher of the Black Rod conducted the Speaker of the House of Commons to the Bar. The Right Hon Gentleman was attended but by very few of the Members, and after some routine business was gone through, and the Reval Assent given by Commission to several Bills; the Lord Chancellor delivered the following Speech on the part of His Majesty :-
