

on board, and convey to Messolonghi, the troops of Tino, which are in the Morae, and was then to cruise on the coast of Western Greece.

"A corps of the enemy's troops, commanded by the celebrated Mustapa Bey, endeavouring to penetrate into the western part of Livadia, was beaten on the 22d and 24th April by Gouras, who repulsed it to Zeitoni and took many prisoners.

"The most complete union prevails throughout all Greece—A commission of eight members has been ordered to present to the Government, in eight days, a plan for the organization of a corps of 10,000 or 12,000 regular troops. Olyseus has surrendered himself to the Government.

"It is said that General Roche has been very well received by the Government; and that he immediately proceeded to the camp from Patras."

"PARIS, JUNE 10.

"The following is the speech addressed to the King by the Duke of Northumberland, on delivering to his Majesty the Order of the Garter.

"With the good pleasure of your Majesty, I have the honor to have been chosen by my Gracious Master, and to be placed at the head of a Commission charged to invest your Majesty with the habit and insignia of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, an Order which was worn, Sire, by Henry IV. of France, of whom your Majesty is so legitimate and worthy a descendant.

"The wish of the King, my Master, Sire, is, that by the inscription of your Majesty's name on the list of this most ancient Order, the bonds of friendship may (if it is possible) be drawn closer between you, and that, conjointly with the political relations and the ties of private friendship, your Majesties may be equally united by the mutual obligations of fraternity and knighthood."

"CADIZ, April 28.—Yesterday came in from Quilca, in 118 days the Sp. sloop of war Yea. Lt. Hull, (an Anglo American) with dispatches, and many passengers, belonging to the Troops which capitulated with Bolivar. No individual was allowed to come ashore, except Hull, who went to the Isla, and thence, it is believed, to Madrid. Orders have been given to fire upon any one that shall go near the ship—which measure has given rise to many idle reports.

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor returned from his tour through this and the neighbouring Provinces on Sunday last—and we are happy to observe in good health and safety. His Excellency, we understand, is highly gratified with the general appearance of this rising Province, and expresses himself delighted beyond measure at the truly beautiful scenery it presents in many parts, to the eye of the traveller.—His Excellency has visited several remote Districts which have never before been honored with the presence of a Governor; the effects of which, from one who has the good of the country so much at heart will, we are convinced prove highly beneficial to them, and tend most materially to their rapid improvement.

Every marked attention and respect as was most due was paid to His Excellency wherever he went, and his return to the Seat of Government is hailed by all classes, with the most sincere pleasure and satisfaction.

Major-General Sir J. Garmichael Smyth and Major Sir George Hope, of the Royal Engineers, arrived here on Saturday evening from Canada, and left this morning in the Steam Boat for St. John, from whence, we understand, they will proceed to Europe via Halifax.

A few days since a Cask of Wine was stolen from the Steam Boat Bridge in this Town, which has been traced to some Raftsmen lying near the spot; it appears they enticed some of the Soldiers of the 52d regt. to drink the Wine with them, and it is hoped the proprietors of the Raft will have spirit enough to prosecute the offenders.

The Pews on the ground floor of Saint John Church, lately built in the City of St. John, were disposed of on Monday the 1st instant, and produced the sum of £2,934, besides reserving one for His Excellency the Lieut. Governor and Suite, and another for the Hon. Ward Chipman.

From the Albany Daily Advertiser.
We are indebted to a Gentleman of this city, who left Quebec on the 30th inst. for the following commercial intelligence.

Arrived at Quebec on the 10th July inst. ship Moffit, burthen 321 tons, with 10,000 chests Tea and on the 11th ship Juhana, 643 tons, with 7000 chest of Tea. Both of the ships left Canton on the 24th February last and arrived at Quebec within twelve hours of each other, consigned to the East India company, and Forsyth, Richardson & Co. of Montreal. The above ships being the first vessels which ever arrived at Quebec from Canton, and the first Tea ever imported into the Canadas, caused considerable excitement at Quebec.

The annual consumption of teas for both

Provinces is estimated at 12,000 chests leaving a supply from the arrivals of 5000 chests for another market.

YORK GENERAL SESSIONS.

JUNE 1825.

RULES and REGULATIONS made and established by the Justices of the General Sessions of the Peace in and for the County of York in General Sessions assembled, for the lading and unloading of Vessels or Boats and for the government of all Carmen, Waggoners and Truckmen within the Parish of Fredericton, and for establishing and fixing the Rates and Fares to be taken for the Truckage of Goods, Wares, Merchandise and other articles within said Parish, between the Creek next below the Rev. Mr. Best's, Southward, Phillis' Creek, Northward, and the Alms House Westward, in pursuance of the power and authority vested in the said Justices by an Act of the General Assembly made and passed in the present year of His Majesty's Reign intituled "An ACT to authorize the Justices of the Peace in the County of York to make regulations respecting Carmen and Waggoners, and the lading and unloading of Vessels or Boats in the Parish of Fredericton."

I. That every Carman, Waggoner, or Truckman who Carries Goods for hire, shall cause to be marked or painted, on the rear or left hand side of every Cart, Waggon, Truck, Sled, or other Vehicle used by him in his said occupation a certain number, which he shall cause to be recorded by the Clerk of the Parish, (which shall be different from any previously recorded number and which shall be marked or painted in fair and legible characters, of not less than two inches in length; and every person who shall follow the occupation of a Carman, Waggoner, or Truckman, and who shall neglect to mark his Carts, Waggon, Trucks, Sleds or other Vehicles as is herein directed, shall for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Twenty Shillings.

II. That every Carman, Waggoner or Truckman shall be entitled to demand and receive for the Truckage of any articles, and for carefully housing the same when necessary, the several rates and fares set forth in the Scale hereunto annexed; and any person who shall demand and receive a greater rate or fare than is therein allowed, shall for every offence forfeit and pay the sum of Ten Shillings.

III. That all Carmen, Waggoners, and Truckmen, shall be ready with their Teams at all seasonable times, to convey such Goods, Wares, Merchandise, or other articles within that part of the Parish of Fredericton as aforesaid, as may be required of them, and any such person who shall refuse or neglect upon the first requisition to attend and convey Goods, Wares, Merchandise, or other articles within the Parish of Fredericton as aforesaid, (not being actually employed elsewhere in his said occupation) shall for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Ten Shillings.

IV. And whereas great delay frequently happens in the unloading of Vessels or Boats, by reason of the Carmen, Waggoners and Truckmen not remaining to complete the unloading of such Vessel as they have commenced with, It is therefore ordered that whenever any Carman, Waggoner or Truckman shall have commenced to unload any Vessel or Boat he shall continue, and shall not proceed to any other employment until the Cargo of such Vessel or Boat be discharged (unless it can be shown that the Master of the Vessel was in fault) under the penalty of Twenty Shillings for each and every offence.
