WAR WITH SPAIN.

There appears to be a probability of war with Spain; the infuriated monarch of that country, having demanded that the U. States should relinquish and surrender one of the first powers of a free people, namely, the right of making treaties, forming alliances, and recognising the independence of nations, and a refusal, on our part, is to be followed by a revocation of a solemn treaty, and a grant of territory transferred in compensation, for spoiliations on our own commerce. Not only have we suffered patiently, for twenty years, the numerous aggressions of Spain; not only have we seen her territory occupied by the enemy during the late war, and armaments arrayed against us, but we are actually suffering from piracies and murder committed on the lives and property of our unoffending people by Spanish subjects, and from Spanish ports; and while exhibiting the utmost moderation towards that government; while commiserating the unhappy condition of Spain, her sovereign calls upon us, with a naive arrogance, to revoke our recognition of South American Independence or take the consequences. There is but one voice: if Spain persists in the demand, we will take the consequences. The troops of France, and the protection of the Holy Alliance, will not move the American nation one inch from the ground of justice and natural rights.

There is more in this than appears on the surface. Spain, in the midst of her local troubles, would not venture to assume such ground, if not promoted to do so by some of the continental powers, who perceived danger in making the continent of America free. At all events, we must be prepared. [Noah's Adv.]

FROM PERU AND CHILI.

Lieut. Ramsay, of the Navy, who left Valparaiso, Oct. 28 h, in the Canada, of Baltimore, has arrived at Washington, with despatches from our Minister in Chili and Com. Hull.

The case now with Bolivar 12,000 men, and with an additional force, intended for the occupancy of Lima, have landed to leeward. La Paz, and the county formerly comprising a part of the Vice-Royalty of Buenos Ayres in Upper Peru, is occupied by O'Leary with 3,000 in the name of the Patria. This officer was a Spanish Commander in those Provinces, but an intrigue, to be proclaimed Vice-King, having been prematurely discovered, was obliged to adopt the course which he has taken. He has been of great service, as Valdez has been constantly opposed to him, thus neutralizing a large portion of the Spanish army. Since the success of Bolivar, the latter has received orders to join the Vice-Roy and Conterac at Cusco, where they may be enabled to raise 6000 men. The Patriot force now consists of 3000 Peruvians and 9000 Colombians. Bolivar having, in no instance, augmented his force by desertions from the enemy, he receives their arms and directs that they retire to their families, from whose bosoms they have been forcibly wrested, to rivet their own chains. This measure has proven of a character the most politic, and an astonishment would not be excited, was the Spanish army to be disorganized entirely by desertion. The war cannot be of much longer duration as the first shock must eventuate in the annihilation of the Royalists. Callao, it is thought, will be starved out in three or four months though a matter of no great moment, as there is a forte to windward and to leeward, differing in distance very little from Callao.

BUENOS AYRES.

By the Brutus, we have received our file of Buenos Ayres papers to December 2d, with a letter from our correspondent. ANTICIPATED RECOGNITION BY ENGLAND.

On the 30th of November, at a celebration of St. Andrew's Day, by the Scotsmen in Buenos Ayres, and a number of native citizens and strangers, the British Agent made a long and interesting speech, in which he stated the intentions of his King with regard to that country. He said he looked forward to the opening of the session of the Congress as a most important event for the Country, and for individuals as he only waited for it to make known, that the information received by His Majesty's

Government, had made him determine to recognize the United Provinces of Rio de la Plata as an independent Nation, and to form with them treaties of commerce and alliance. The Agent concluded his speech by expressing many friendly sentiments towards the country, and many good wishes for the power and happiness of the nation.

By the Canada, information is received that the ship Diamond, Captain Macy, from this part of Liverpool, was totally lost on the coast of Wales, and all on board, except a boy perished. There were 13 cabin and 15 steerage passengers on board. By referring to our files, we find that the Diamond left this port on the 13th December with the following passengers: John Bellerly, lady and daughter; William Walker; John Broadbent; Joseph Broadbent; William Wood; H. N. Gilbert; Robert Givan, junr; Dr. Street; Messrs. Walker, M'Donald, and Nicholson; and 15 in the steerage. The French Ship Jerome, Maximilian, from New York bound to Port au Prince, has been lost on Sand Key. Crew, and 28 passengers, perished.
