LONDON, JULY 6.

We have received exclusively Brussels papers of the 30th June. They contain no political news of interest. One of them has some severe remarks upon the open distribution of wine and bread to the populace during the late fetes in Paris, and says "There is to be nothing of this sort at our fetes. Proper establishments will be formed for the succour of the poor by the distribution of food—bread here is given, not thrown, to the poor. Here we throw it to the dogs." Great preparations are making for the exhibition of the productions of art and industry at Haarlem, and some of the specimens are described as beautiful. The Madrid correspondence in these papers is not of a later date than what has reached us through other sources. There are several versions of the story of an attempt to poison the Royalist Volunteers at Madrid; and it appears that some of them had died after symptoms which justified suspicion. The physicians, however, declare that the diseases arose from the bad quality of the food—a circumstance by no means improbable, considering the state of the Spanish treasury.
QUEBEC, Aug. 15.
Some years ago Lower Canada was probably less visited by the wealthy inhabitants of the United States than England and the Continent of Europe. The existing facilities of conveyance and the reports of preceding Travellers, have produced an astonishing alteration in a short time. Every Steam-boat from Montreal is filled with respectable Americans on a tour of pleasure. They proceed from the southern and middle States to New-York, and thence to Albany by the Steam-boat, where they meet the travellers from New-England. The common route is by the Erie Canal to the Niagara frontier in the Passage Boats; thence in the Steam-boats across Lake Ontario to the head of the St. Lawrence by Coaches and Steam-boats to Montreal; thence to Quebec and back to Montreal by Steam; over land to St. Johns; thence across Lake Champlain to Whitehall in the Steam-boats, and by Coaches to Troy or Albany, where they meet the New-York boats, or proceed over land from Burlington to Boston. The voyage from New York by Niagara to Quebec and back, about 1700 miles, is performed at the rate of about six miles an hour, with little upwards of a 100 miles land carriage. The rate of conveyance is generally low and proceeding night and day. When the

Steam-boats will run from Quebec, through the magnificent scenery of the St. Lawrence below Quebec to Halifax and Boston, a period which cannot be far distant, the course of pleasure parties from the United States will be in this direction homewards.

The agents declared that they would not have another sale until the middle of October, and only then, should the demand appear to require it; when the prices at which the teas will be put up will not be lower. They also declared that they would not deal in Teas, either directly or indirectly, but confine their operations entirely, as regards this article, to the East India Company.

We understand that the Census of this Town under the late Act, is nearly completed, and that the population of the City amounts to about 22,000, without including the military and transient persons, which in the summer season probably exceed 8000. The Coves from *L'Ance des Mères* to Sillery, are a Town of four miles in extent. We should suppose that at this moment Quebec and an extent of a few miles round it contains about 140,000 souls.

The BARON of RENFREW finished loading on Thursday last, but it is probable her departure will be delayed to complete her complement of seamen, until about the 20th inst. The Baron is to be towed down the River by the Hercules Steam-boat as far as Bic.

EMIGRANTS.—Among the Emigrants which are arriving from the old country (particularly from Ireland) during the present season we are glad to observe more of them whose appearance bespeak wealth and comfortable circumstances than on former occasions. On Wednesday last we witnessed the embarkation of a large lot of them from the Steam Boat Canadian (now a regular trader from this port to Quebec,) although they had not been on shore from the time they had crossed the Atlantic, and could only appear as after a long sea voyage they were almost without exception comfortable clothed and exhibited a degree of cleanliness and neatness in their dress and persons, rarely to be met with in people under such cir-
