NOTICE is hereby given, that upon the application of David Wortman of Fredericton in the County of York and Province aforesaid, Carpenter, and Asa Coy and Thomas Stewart of the same place, Merchants, to me duly made according to the form of the Act of the Assembly in such case made and provided, I have directed all the Estates, as well real as personal, within this Province, of Matthias G. Valentine, late of Fredericton, in the County of York, in the said Province, Carpenter, (which said Matthias G. Valentine is departed from and without the limits of this Province, with intent and design to defraud the said David Wortman, Asa Coy and Thomas Stewart, and the other Creditors of the said Matthias G. Valentine, if any there be, of their just dues, or else remains concealed within the same to avoid being arrested by the ordinary Process of the Law as it is alleged against him) to be seized and attached; and that unless the said Matthias G. Valentine do return and discharge his said debt or debts within three months from the publication hereof, all the Estates, as well real as personal of the said Matthias G. Valentine, within this Province, will be sold for the payment and satisfaction of the Creditors of the said Matthias G. Valentine.

## Market Regulations.

AT a Court of General Sessions of the Peace of our Lord the King holden at the County Court House in Fredericton in and for the County of York on the second Tuesday, being the 14th day of June, in the sixth year of His Majesty's Reign.

The following Rules and Regulations are made and ordained, for the better Government of the MARKET established in Fredericton:—

1st. The regular Market Hours shall be from SIX in the morning, until TWO in the afternoon of every day in the week, (Sunday excepted) and on Saturday the Market shall be open in the afternoon from Three o'Clock until Sunset.

2d. That no Fish, Fresh meat, or Poultry, of any kind, or Butter, shall be sold in any private Stall or Shambles, or in any part of the Town of Fredericton, until the same shall have been regularly exposed for

sale in the Market-House for the space of Two Hours, under the penalty of Twenty Shillings for each and every offence.

3d. That no person shall purchase any Fish, Fresh Meat, or Poultry, of any kind, or Butter, in the said Market, for the purpose of selling the same again, until after the same shall have been exposed for sale in the Market House for at least two hours, under the penalty of Twenty Shillings for each and every offence.

4th. That the Clerk of the Market be directed to have some safe place in the Market-House for the lodgement of articles brought in the evening, and that he further be directed, to employ a person to keep the passages inside and outside of the Building, in decent order.

## SCHEDULE OF DUTIES

Alleged to in the Act Published in our last for regulating the Trade of His Majesty's Possessions in America and the West-Indies, and for Warehousing of Goods therein.  
A Schedule of Duties payable upon Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, not being of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of any place under the British Dominions in America or the West-Indies, or within the limits of the East India Company's Charter, imposed into His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations or Islands in America, or the West-Indies.

Barrel of Wheat Flour, not weighing more than 196lbs. net weight. Barrel of Biscuit, not weighing more than 196lbs. net weight, 2s. 6d. For every hundred wt. of Biscuit, 1s. 6d. For every 100 lbs. of Bread made from wheat or other grain imported in bags or packages, 2s. 6d. For every barrel of flour, not weighing more than 196lbs. made from rye, peas, or beans, oats, or barley, 2s. 6d. For every bushel of wheat, 1s. For every bushel of peas, beans, rye, calavances, oats, or barley, 7d. Rice, for every 100 lbs. net weight, 2s. 6d. For every 1000 shingles, not more than 12 inches in length, 7s. For every 1000 shingles being more than 12 inches in length, 14s. For every 1000 red oak staves, £1 1s. For every 1000 white-oak staves, or headings, 15s. For every 1000 feet of white or yellow pine lumber, of one inch thick, £1 1s. For every 1000 feet of pitch pine lumber, £1 1s. Other kinds of wood and lumber, per thousand, £1 8s. For every 1000 wood hoops, 5s. 3d. Horses, seat cattle, and all other live stock, for 100l. SPIRITS, viz: Brandy, imported into Canada, Nova-Scotia, New-Brunswick, or Newfoundland, for every gallon 1s. Wine, imported in bottles, the tun, containing 252 gallons 7l. 7s. And further, for every 100l. of the true and real value thereof, £7 10s.

And for every dozen of foreign quart bottles in which such wine may be imported, 1s. Wine, not in bottles, (except wine imported into Newfoundland,) for every £100 of the true and real value thereof, £7 10s. Coffee, cocoa, sugar, molasses, and rum, imported into any of the British possessions, in North America, viz:—Coffee, for every cwt. 5s. Cocoa, for every cwt. 5s. Sugar, for every cwt. 5s. Molasses, for every cwt. 3s. Rum, for every gallon, 6d.

And further, the amount of any duty payable for the time being on coffee, sugar, molasses, and rum, respectively, being the produce of any of the British possessions in South America.

Alabaster, anchoives, argol, anniseed, almonds, brimsone, botarga, boxwood, currants, capers, cascabe, cantharides, cummin seed, coral, cork, cinnabar, dates, essence of burganot, lemon, roses, citron, orange, lavender, and rosemary; emery stone. Fruit, viz: dried, preserved in sugar, and wet, preserved in brandy; figs; gum arabic,

music, myrrh billy, and ammoniac; honey, jallaps, juniper berries, incense or frankincense, Lava and Malta stone for building, lentils, marina, marble rough and worked, Mosaic work, medals, musks, macaroni, nuts of all kinds, oil of olives and of almonds; opium, oris root, ostrich feathers, ochres, orange buds and pearl olives, pickles in jars and bottles, paints, pozzolana, pumice stone punk, parmesan cheese, pickles, prints pearls, precious stones (except diamonds,) quicksilver, raisins, rhubarb, rice, sausages, senna, scammony, saraparilla, saffron, safflower, sponges, vermillion, vermicelli, and wheat-stones, for every £100 of the true and real value thereof, £7 10s.

Clocks and watches, leather manufactures, musical instruments, wifes of all sorts, and books and papers, for every £100 of the true and real value thereof, £30.

Glass manufactures, soap, refined sugar sugar candy, and tobacco manufactured, for every £100 of the true and real value thereof, £20.

Goods, wares, or merchandize, not being enumerated or described, nor otherwise charged with duty by this Act, for every £100 of the true and real value thereof, £15.

And if any of the Goods hereinbefore mentioned, shall be imported through the United Kingdom, having been warehoused therein, and exported from the warehouse, one tenth of the duties herein imposed shall be remitted in respect to such Goods.

And if any of the Goods hereinbefore mentioned, shall be imported through the United Kingdom, not from the warehouse, but after all duties of importation for home use therein, shall have been paid thereon, in the said United Kingdom, the same shall be free of all the said duties.

## THE ARMY. GENERAL ORDER.

Home-Guards, May 2, 1825.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased to approve the accompanying Regulations for the sale and purchase of Commissions of unattached retired full and half-pay Officers, they are now promulgated to the Army: and his Royal Highness the Commander-in-Chief enjoins the strictest compliance therewith.

## Regulations for the Sale of Retired Full pay and Half-pay Commissions.

APRIL 25, 1825.

Half-pay officers, and those on retired full-pay shall be permitted to dispose of their commissions as unattached half-pay commissions, in the manner, and upon the terms hereinafter described.

To include the officers actually serving in the Veteran Battalions, who may be considered as belonging to both lists, but who cannot now sell; as also General Officers, who may be in the receipt of the half-pay, only of that regimental rank on which they retired.

That the officers on the retired full-pay, and those serving in Veteran Battalions, shall receive the prices for their commissions, established by his Majesty's regulations in 1821.

That the officers who were reduced to half-pay, having purchased or served twenty years, and the officers obliged to retire upon half-pay, in consequence of wounds, or health impaired by climate, shall also receive the same price for their commissions.

That officers having retired to half-pay at their own request, not in consequence of wounds, or health impaired by climate, although they should have purchased, shall receive only the old price, as established by the regulation in force previous to 1821.

The Officers selling out shall receive the sum to which they may be respectively entitled under these regulations, as may be directed by the Commander-in-Chief.

And in order to avoid the possibility of communication between the parties, the purchaser will be directed simply to lodge his money for his promotion to the higher commission, the seller being afterwards selected by the Commander-in-Chief, from the lists registered in his Royal Highness's office; nor will any other than an unconditional resignation, nor any application which adverts to any expected vacancy be admitted.

The surplus, if any, in all cases, be held at the disposal of the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, for the public use.

The price paid and received, shall, in all cases, be that of the Infantry commissions, as in the cases of unattached commissions which have been hitherto sold, whether the individual selling shall be on the half-pay of cavalry or infantry, and the purchaser shall, in all cases, be placed on the half-pay of infantry.

The individuals disposed to avail themselves of this arrangement, upon the terms specified, shall make application to the Commander-in-Chief, through the Military Secretary, when their claims will be investigated and determined upon, and their names will be registered accordingly.

The purchasers will be recommended to his Majesty by the Commander-in-Chief, from the lists kept in his office.

The sales to take place under the following restrictions:—

No person to be allowed to sell at either rate who has passed the age of sixty years, or who cannot produce the certificate of the Army Medical Board; if in a foreign colony, the certificate of a Medical Board; or, if no Board can be assembled, of the Senior Medical Officer, showing that his retirement does not result from impaired constitution threatening earlier dissolution than a person of his age may expect in the common course of nature.

No officer to be allowed to sell, unless he shall have purchased his commission, or unless he shall have served twenty years in the whole, if a Lieutenant-Colonel, Major, or Captain.

Fifteen years if a Lieutenant.

Twelve years if an Ensign, of which, at least, one half on full pay, or in the discharge of active professional duties, except he should have been placed on half-pay in consequence of incapacity, from wounds or infirmity, not now affecting his general health and constitution.

Those having purchased whose services do not amount to the above periods, or who have not been placed upon half-pay on account of incapacity produced as above stated, to receive the value only of the commissions they may have purchased, or have retired at their own request.

Those who have taken the difference, and who may be otherwise circumstanced as above stated, to receive the value of their Commissions at the old rate, minus the amount of the difference previously received by them.
