in consequence of the sentence of Courts Martial, or of circumstances prejudicial to their character, to be excluded from the benefit of this arrangement ; or, if it be thought ft to relieve the Half-pay List from them (as they cannot be called into service) to receive a sum not exceeding the value of their annuity.

It is to be understood, that no officer on the retired or Half-pay List, who may hold a garrison situation, will be permitted to retain it, if he should sell under this arrangement.

Further, that the general arrangement shall be limited to those actually on the Half-pay or Retired List; and the time a!lowed for its operation shall be limited to one year for Officers at home, and to one year and a half for officers residing in distant Colonies or countries.

Those officers who have purchased halfpay commissions, as unattached commissions, would, after serving on full pay in the rank so purchased, be as admissable to the permission to sell what they may have purchased as any other officers on full-pay, under bis Majesty's regulations. The purchasers of the half-pay commissions, above the rank of Ensign, shall be invariably officers on full-pay. No officer shall be allowed to purchase two steps on Half-pay, without having served in the intermediate time two years on Full pay, it being of course understood that his general period of service would otherwise entitle him to the promotion.

Having read your letter of the 25th March last, inclosing one from the Chamber of Commerce, Halifax, together with an opinion of the Attorney General. as to whether, by the Act 4, Geo. 4. c. 80, a Trade direct from the Colonies with the East Indies is authorised.

We acquaint you, that the above mentioned Act allows a Trade direct between the British Colonies and the East Indies in all articles, with the exception of Tea, and does not confine that Trade to the Free GEO. SHORE.

Remarkable Temerity of a Bear.

On the night of Monday the 4th instant, Mr. Foster of Ludlow, being in Miramichi, his wife (who was left alone) went to a neighbour's house to stay all night .--- A Bear broke open a window in his house, entered it, de stroyed about half a barrel of Pork, did some other damage, and went out the same way he came in : Mrs. Foster being afraid to stay in the house next night, put the remainder of the barrel of Pork in the Cellar, and again went from home ; on Thursday night he entered by another window, broke the window to pieces ; entered the room, and broke a small chest in pieces ; he also attempted to open a large chest which he knocked about and turned upside down in the middle of the flour after taking several farge pieces out of it with his teeth ; he also strewed a large basket of wearing apparel over the room, leaving nothing untouched except the bed and curtains (which stood in the room) .--- He then proceeded to pay a visit to Mr. Murphy who lived about thirty rods below ... broke into his milk-house (which stood about three rods from the dwelling house) by ripping up the shingles, eat several pieces of salt beef, which finding rather lean, he made use of a jar of butter that stood handy to soften them ; drank three pans of milk to quench his thirst, and then took his departure after solling himself in the grass a few feet from the dwelling house. Mr. Murphy prepared to welcome his new guest the next evening, by setting a gun in the Milk-house, pointing to the breach he had made the night before; he returned about sun set and received the full contents of a Musket in his head, the just reward of his temerity, he was a remarkable large Bear and very fat.

If this were the result of the labours of consummate wisdom, it was high time to see what folly could achieve. Even from the long delay in bringing forward the Report of the Commissioners, he anticipated the time would be hastened when this matter would be thought a fit subject for the consideration of the Legislature, and a remedy be applied by legislative enact-
