On the 17th arrived the Hope from Trimity, 1470 gils. new fish, which I have disposed of at Rs. 4350, all round on board; at Oporto, arrived three cargoes of new Bank and Shore Fish---Rs. 5,800 Bank Rs. 5,600 small, and Rs. 4,000 for Refuse was obtained --- Exchange 521 per mileris."

Copy of a dispatch from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, to His Excellency Major-General Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, Bart., Lientenant-Governor of New-Brunswick. &c. &c. &c.

Halifax, 26th October. 1825.

HAVE had the honor, to receive your Excellency's letter, of the 15th instant, communicating to me (as Governor of a Sister Colony) the particulars of the dreadful conflagration which has destroyed the fine settlements at Miramichi in New-Brunswick, and appealing to me for assistance to the unfortunate sufferers by that great calamity.

Your Excellency will however have learnt by my dispatch of the 19th instant, that I was previously informed of that most distressing event; and as miseries, such as have befallen a portion of our fellow subjects in a Sister Colony, could not be known in this community for a moment without exciting the liveliest feelings of compassion, and ardent desire to afford them instant relief. I had the honor of informing your Excellency in that letter, of the steps taken by the Government of this Province, and the Inhabitants of Halifax, to send supplies of Clothing, Food and Medical comtorts to Miramichi, and of the prompt and cordial. co-operation of Admiral LAKE, in dispatching His Majesty's Ship, Orestes, at the shortest notice upon this service.

I now transmit for your Excellency's further information a second report, which I have received from the Committee of His Majesty's Council, detailing the proceedings of the Town Committee, in promoting the objects for which they were appointed, and it is very gratifying to me, to find that the Inhabitants of Lunenburg, and other parts of this Province, are quickly following the example which Halifax has set them upon this occasion,

MIRAMICHI, 31st OCTOBERS

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On Thursday the 27th inst. the Inhabit tants were literally assonished to had beloved and most excellent Governor among them. His Excellency with his Aid de Camp, Capt. Douglas, arrived at the Reverend Mr. Bacon's in Chatham at 11 0-Clock. Overjoyed at a visit so unexpect. ed, the inhabitants hastened to call upon His Excellency to express their gratitude for this instance of most condescending benevolence. When we take into considera-Trion the season of the year, and the state in which His Excellency must have left his own numerous family, not yet, as we understand, lodged in their winter habitation, after having been so recently unhoused by that most destructive element, Fire, our admira. tion is excited to its highest pitch at the disposition of mind, which prompted this truly charitable visit. - He came "to visit the " Fatherless and Widows in their afflic. " tion :" and we cannot doubt of his meeting with the reward promised to those whose conduct is thus influenced by principles of " pure Religion." Arrangements were immediately made for His Excellency's visiting, the next day, the back Settlements in rear of Douglas Town, and on the River Napan; but a violent storm of rain prevented this being carried into effect. On Saturday His Excellency attended a meeting of the inhabitants (assembled at his request) and feelingly addressed them in the following words ?---

O soon as the arrangements necessary for the most immediate relief and succour of the destitute sufferers in the late calamitous conflagrations had been completed, I has ened hither to do all that might further be in my power, to relieve and encourage this afflicted population, and to dispel those apprehensions, with respect to want, during the approaching long winter, which there was at one time too much reason to entertain.

The extreme lateness of the Season, limiting my stay here to a very short period. I have caused this meeting to be announced to give to the afflicted and the distressed an opportunity of access to their Governor, and to enable me to address to them, a few words of comfort, condolence and encouragement. But I feel I have undertaken what I shall not be able properly to perform. For the awful traces of havoc and devastation which I see in this once flourishing settlement; that charred, blackened forest, and scorched bank, the vast suneral pile, in whose slames great numbers of our fellow creatures have perished; the direful, heart breaking tales of woe, which I hear related, of whole families and whole settlements annihilated, or the still more afflicting accounts of fragments saved to mourn in misery The presence, too, of persons, (and such persons!)-whom this awful calamity has put in mourning, or reduced from affluence, to want and difficulty; -- these altogether overpower me, and I cannot proceed in speech as I purposed.

The impressions made upon me when I visited you, in your prospertty, have created feelings, whose impulses, on this melancholy occasion, I would not, nor could not resist, to revisit you in your calamity; How awaful is the contrast! you have experienced one of the most dreadful visitations, that ever fell upon the earth, ... If the whole Globe had been in combustion, not more of terror, and little more in effect could have been accumulated, on that desolated part. Where late, I witnessed prosperity, plenty, comfort and hilarity their abodes are prostrated into ruins. There, in the foundation of a sacred edifice, about to be raised, I recently placed the Inscriptions and the Coins which were designed to convey to remote ages, how long that edifice had stood; and, as I fondly hoped, how greatly this settlement had flourished; What a lesson, this, for human presumption; What a subject for reflection and meditation;of thankfulness from those who have escaped, and of charity and benevolence towards the sufferers.

I am very sensible that the language, which such reflections have prompted, is not that which is calculated to excite exertion: But I came not hither to indulge in - despondency. My tears have alreedy fallen at the recital of your sufferings, and I have poured the tribute of fresh affliction upon viewing those: dismal scenes, where the untimely ashes of the dead, and the cinders of their late habitations, lie in pro-
