Although the successes of the Greeks on land have been less decisive. they have no less contributed to divert the forces of the Pachas, and to exhaust the resources of the Porte. The spirit of sedition is fermenting at Constantinople ; different parties agitating their private interests, while the enemy is at the gates. Fortune is now dealing out so just a measure to the city of Constantine, that it presents very nearly the same spectacle as in the time of the last Emperors of the East, when it was besieged by Mahomet II. The Turks are also divided into factions.


SPAIN.---A letter from Bayonne. of the 14th of Nov. states that the French army was expected to arrive almost immediately at that place, on its return from Spain.
