

Although the successes of the Greeks on land have been less decisive. they have no less contributed to divert the forces of the Pachas, and to exhaust the resources of the Porte. The spirit of sedition is fermenting at Constantinople; different parties agitating their private interests, while the enemy is at the gates. Fortune is now dealing out so just a measure to the city of Constantine, that it presents very nearly the same spectacle as in the time of the last Emperors of the East, when it was besieged by Mahomet II. The Turks are also divided into factions.

SPAIN.—A letter from Bayonne, of the 14th of Nov. states that the French army was expected to arrive almost immediately at that place, on its return from Spain. A corps of observation, 10,000 strong, is said to be stationed between Bayonne and the Bidusca; the head quarters to be at Bayonne. On the 13th three couriers from Madrid, and two from Paris, passed through Bayonne.

It is said in the Journal du Commerce, that after the departure of the French garrison from Badajos, the populace rose, a great number of persons were assassinated, & several houses pillaged. Bloody scenes have also taken place at Corunna.

MISCELLANEOUS.—The city of Schiraz, on the Persian Gulph, has been almost entirely destroyed by an Earthquake.

The German papers contain many particulars of damages by inundation. The Rhine rose, at Cologne, 27 feet. On the 19th Nov. the water was stationary.

Several arrests had taken place in Germany. The Editor of the German Observer, and several students, accused of revolutionary intrigues, had been imprisoned.

Part of the College of St. Omer in France had been burnt.

The visit of His EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR to this City, has been, not only, highly gratifying to every class of its inhabitants, but also calculated to do essential benefit to the community, by giving a stimulus to the Conductors of several useful Institutions promoted or patronised by him. LONDON, Nov. 24.

The letters from Constantinople of the 23d Oct. confirm all we have heard of the decline of the Turkish power. One of the latest acts of the Porte indicates the extremities to which the Sultan is reduced. He will no longer pay the expense of maintaining the garrison of Patras. This is regarded as an abandonment of Morea, on account of the hopeless subjugation, or as an act of absolute necessity, from the exhaustion of the Imperial Treasury, it equally reveals the fact of conscious weakness. Not a vessel is seen on the Levant under the Crescent. The Greek squadrons are everywhere. There seems no doubt that the Captain Rangos, acting on the offensive, has penetrated as far as Mount Chimeria, and summoned Arta to surrender. He addressed in address to the Turkish inhabitants that Omer Vrione was blockaded in Corfu, by Prince Manroverdato.

The case of Mr. Faunieroy had been referred to twelve Judges. A poster in the last paper announces that they had decided against him, and that he was to be executed on the following Tuesday. It is said the petitions in his behalf obtained but few signatures.

The King of Prussia had just been married to the Countess Augustas, of Harnburg. The Countess is 26 years old, and is very handsome. The King is 54 years of age.

It is said that Sir Charles Stewart, lately appointed Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has received Advices from Cape Coast Castle of the 7th state that the Ashantees had disappeared, but great mortality had prevailed in the garrison.

PARIS, NOV.

The German papers contain extracts of letters from Constantinople to Oct. 21st, which it appears that the Turkish Government is determined to abandon the city after the present campaign.

The Journal des Debats contains a report of the trial and conviction at Verdun of a man charged with the horrid crime of murdering a girl of twelve years of age by eating her flesh and heart. The man confessed the crime, and declared he was induced to commit it from an irresistible thirst for human blood. It appeared on the trial that he had indulged this cannibal appetite in the most barbarous and shocking manner.

FROM LAGUIRA.—We have received (says the New-York Gazette) by the schooner Trimmer, Caracas papers to the 13th inclusive, and a letter from our correspondent, dated the 14th at Lagaira. We had been received from Bogota of the 6th Oct. which confirms the news of the capture of the Asia, off Callao, and adds, "A squadron entered the port of Callao, by the frigate Ceres, and captured seven or eight vessels.—Six hundred horses, which the enemy possessed in the neighbourhood of Lima, have fallen into our hands.—In consequence of these disasters, the Spaniards have evacuated Lima. The Peruvian campaign is

be said to be concluded, since a happy commencement must produce a favorable issue.
