ST. ANDREWS SEPT. 21. His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor's visit to Charlotte-County.

His EXCELLENCY and Suite left Saint John Tuesday the 13th instant, and left that night at St. George, that His Excellency was on the Saint John Road, and approaching the village, the Magistrates and Militia Officers of the Parish, met His Excellency two miles from the Lower Falls, and escorted him to the Settlement. On his Excellency's arrival, a salute of 17 guns was fired. After receiving addresses from the Magistrates and principal Inhabitants and from the Rector, Wardens, and Vestry of the Parish, and visiting the Falls and several Establishments in the neighbourhood, His Excellency proceeded to Suther Hall, where he dined with a select party at Col. Mackay's. His Excellency was pleased to express himself highly gratified with his reception at Maguadavick, and with the general appearance of that section of the County. His Excellency and Suite left Maguadavick next morning at 10 o'clock, for St. Andrews.

I thank you for the congratulations you are pleased to offer on my arrival in the County of Charlotte. I have long looked forward with much pleasure to make this visit, that I might become personally acquainted with a County which forms so important a part of the Province, whose interests and welfare are intrusted to my Government.

The Loyal attachment of the Inhabitants of this fine County to our beloved Sovereign, and to our Glorious Constitution is well known. I shall not fail to present to our Gracious Sovereign the fresh tender of these obligations, the assurance of which comes in so appropriate a manner from the distinguished Loyalty who has presented this address.

I thank you Gentlemen, for the good wishes you are pleased to express for the happiness and prosperity of myself and Family—Both wishes will be accomplished, by my exertions, I can succeed in promoting the interests of the Province, with the happiness and prosperity of which, myself and family feel we are identified.

His EXCELLENCY'S REPLY. To the Rector, Church-Wardens, and Vestry, of the Parish of Saint George. Gentlemen, I thank you for the address you are pleased to present on my visit to a Part of a County which in every respect forms so important a portion of the Province whose interests and happiness are intrusted to my Government.

I am well assured that your attachment to his most Gracious Majesty, to the British Constitution in Church and State, and of our Parent Country, will ever lead the Ministers and Members of our Religion in the exercise of their Holy Offices and Duties, to inculcate Loyalty and Patriotism together with the other obligations they enforce, and I shall ever be ready to extend my paternal protection and fostering care in a peculiar degree to establishments of the Church.

His EXCELLENCY stopped on his way from St. George, at the House of James Allan Shaw Esq at Digbywash, when he partook of some refreshment. He was met at Seaboard, by a number of the Magistrates and Principal Inhabitants of St. Andrews. At Chamcook an Escort of Militia Cavalry, under the Command of Captain BARTON, was in waiting to attend his Excellency. About 3 o'clock His Excellency arrived at the entrance of the Town and was saluted with 17 guns from the Garrison the same number from the Militia Artillery, under the command of Capt. WYER, and an equal number from the Revenue Cutter Elizabeth, Captain MACMASTER, and was heartily cheered by all ranks and descriptions of the people. So easy is it for a good Ruler to gain the affection and esteem of a faithful and loyal community. The 1st Division of the 1st Battalion Charlotte County Militia, under the Command of Lieutenant-Col. CAMPBELL, was drawn up at the distance of eight paces between each file, His Excellency and Suite, as they passed through the line were cheered by the Militia, and the countenance of each man plainly indicated the gladness of the heart and the warmth of his Excellency's reception.

His Excellency arrived at his Quarters (Mrs. HUTCHINGS, at half past three o'clock, and shortly afterwards proceeded to the Parade Ground—He was received with Military honours; the line after breaking into open Columns, passed in review, when his Excellency was pleased to express his high satisfaction at the appearance of the men, the correctness and precision of their movements, and their soldier like conduct; their efficiency if required in active service, and the loyalty evinced by the numbers who had on that day appeared to do honour to the Representative of our Most Gracious Sovereign. His Excellency was pleased to allude particularly to the troop of Cavalry, under the command of Captain BARTON, the Artillery, Commanded by Captain WYER, and the Rifle Corps, under the Command of Captain BOYD, these Companies, with the Grenadier Company, Captain GARNETT, His Excellency was pleased to say merited his particular approbation.

At six o'clock he dined with the Militia Officers at the Masons' Lodge, at which Colonel CAMPBELL presided, and retired about half past nine o'clock. We regret that we have not been furnished with a list of the Toasts. But our informant states that the evening was most agreeably spent, and we have good reason to say, that no public dinner at St. Andrews, was ever got up with better taste or judgment; great credit is due to the Committee of management, for their attention and industry.

His Excellency appointed twelve o'clock on Friday to receive the respective addresses at the Court-House.
