A PROCLAMATION. WHEREAS the Right Honourable Intl BATHURST, one of this Majesty's minipal Secretaries of State, has transmiled to me, the following order of His Maysty in Council: -viz:

At the Court at Carlton-House, 22d March, 1825. PRESENT, The King's most Excellent Majesty,

IN COUNCIL. WHEREAS it has been represented to His Majesty at this board, by Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Trastry, that they have given directions, that His Majesty's Troops, serving in the menal British Colonies and Possessions should, should in certain cases be paid in British Silver, and Copper Money, and that with a view of securing the circulation of such Money in those Colonies it would be expedient that an order in Council should tessued, declaring that in all those Coforable Earl Bathurst, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions, herein as to them may respectively appertain.

(Signed,) C. C. GREVILLE. I do sherefore hereby make known the same to all His Majesty's loving subjects in this Province, and all persons concerned,

accordingly.

And I do also hereby further make known that the holders of British Silver Money, may demand from the Officers in charge of the Commissariat Department .--Bills upon the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury at thirty days sight, in Exchange for whatever sums may be sendered by them in British Silver, not less in amount than one hundred Pounds at the fixed rate of a Bill for one hundred Pounds, for every one hundred and three Pounds of British Silver Money, so tendered.
