 arts. Previously to that epoch whatever re-
 lated to learning was wrapt up in mystery,
 and it has since then been the study of wise
 and good men to convey useful knowledge
 by easy methods and perspicuous language.
 I am anxious to draw the attention of your
 correspondent *Brunswickus* to these matters,
 for I do not recollect ever to have met any
