

articulation of the elbow, which was completely bitten through by four of the animal's teeth. The medical attendant, anxious to embrace an opportunity of putting the Russian mode of treatment to the test, took advantage of this occasion, and impressed upon the affrighted parents the necessity of strictly adhering to his instructions. He in the first place made them minutely examine the under part of the tongue, in its then natural state, strictly enjoining them to repeat the examination several times every day, and if any alteration should appear to send the child immediately to him; he was also to see him every morning to dress the wounds and examine him in a more particular manner. Nine days passed, the wound having been treated in the manner usually prescribed in case of lacerated wounds in the joints; on the evening of the 10th day the mother perceived two large pimples (*gros boutons*) underneath the tongue—she acquainted Mrs. Bornais, in whose house she lodged, with the circumstances, and both of them recollecting the instructions which had been given, Mrs. Bornais immediately took the Boy to Dr. Painchaud, who found the *sublingual* glands exceedingly enlarged, and upon opening them a fluid was discharged much resembling vaccine virus, after the progress of the *arcola*; lunar caustic was applied, the wound in the elbow was at this time nearly cured—three days afterwards the same appearance of pimples or enlargement of the *sublingual* glands returned, the lancet and caustic were again employed, the wound to the elbow was now perfectly healed. Four days afterwards the patient met Dr. Painchaud at the house of Letatire, carriage maker, and informed him that his tongue had been incommoded by a swelling since that morning, and in fact the doctor on examination found the glands apparently in the same state as they were on the evening of the 10th day, and applying the lancet, a fluid similar to that first observed came from them; from that time the child has continued to enjoy perfect health, and attends his school as usual. Two months since the accident took place elapse on the 16th inst.

Gibson informed this Deponent of the hard usage his son received from the said G. W. Hartt, and that he, this Deponent heard the complaints of ill usage of the said G. W. Hartt towards the said Charles Brown, oftener from the said Wm. Gibson than from the said Charles Brown himself.
