We have much satisfaction in stating, it is in serious contemplation to erect in this Town a handsome Stone Church; the present one being found insufficient to accommodate the increasing population of the place--which, together with the other public buildings shortly to commence, will occupy a large body of workmen for five or six years, and will no doubt be the means of attracting mechanics of various descriptions, who will eventually take up their residence here.--Never did the Seat of Government bear so promising an appearance as at present; business is reviving in all its branches, and improvement is the order of the day--the scarcity of workmen is already severely felt, and strange as it may appear, Individuals have been compelled to send to St. John for articles of lumber, that have been supplied from this place--all building materials it is expected will be held up at a high rate, but the abundance with which the markets will be furnished, it is to be hoped, will keep down all exorbitant demands.--Every house in the town is now in requisition, and speculations in that line of building, will no doubt be very great.

Two handsome embossed Silver Plates have been generously presented to the Communion Service of Christ Church, by the Ladies of that Congregation, and were used for the first time on Trinity Sunday.

The Rev. GEORGE BEST, Rector of Fredericton, has been appointed Ecclesiastical Commissary of this Province.

An Inquest was held at Burton on Friday the 3d inst before Solomon Perley, Esquire, one of the Coroners for the County of Sunbury, on view of the body of a man found in the river, (name unknown to any person then present) he had on when found, boots and blue cloth trousers, dark spotted swansdown vest, and white flannel shirt.--Verdict--Accidental death by having been drowned.
