A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS His Majesty hath been pleased, with the advice of His Privy Council, to disallow two Acts passed in this Province, the one intituled 'An Act to encourage the Commerce of the Province by granting Bounties on the exportation of certain articles;' the other 'An Act to amend an Act intituled an Act to provide for and maintain an Army of Cutter for the protection of the Revenue of the Province;' and by an order of His Majesty in Council to declare the said Acts to be void and of none effect; which Royal disallowance has been duly signified to me by one of His Majesty's principal Secretaries of State: I have thought fit to publish this Proclamation, that all persons whom it may concern, may be duly notified of the premises, and govern themselves accordingly.

GIVEN under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the twenty-fifth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five, and in the Sixth year of His Majesty's Reign.

MILITIA GENERAL ORDERS.

With reference to the General Order of the 25th October 1824, by which arrangements were made for incorporating the three Battalions of the St. John Militia into one Corps under the Command of Lieutenant Col. Drury: The Commander-in-Chief has good reason to believe will be attended with much inconvenience to a great portion of the Inhabitants of the County of St. John, which would unavoidably arise by assembling the whole Militia force of the County for Inspection in the City, many of whom would have to travel from the most remote and distant parts of the District. His Excellency therefore deems it expedient to relax from the above-mentioned Order of the 25th of October last, the 2d Battalion of St. John Militia, and directs that it be in future called 'The Regiment of Saint John County Militia'; and His Excellency is further pleased to confer the Rank of Lieutenant-Colonel-Commandant of that Corps to Major Charles Simonds.

CANADA.

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT

OF LOWER CANADA.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Wednesday, 23d Feb. 1825.

The messengers appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, with the addresses of the House of Saturday last, praying His Excellency would be pleased to cause to be laid before the House, copies of such parts of the Royal Instructions relating to the Civil List of this Province, as are referred to in His Excellency the Governor in Chief's speeches to both Houses of the Legislature, on the 16th Dec. 1820, and 11th Dec. 1821; and also such communication as may have been received in answer to the humble address of this House to His Majesty, of the 21st January, 1821, relative to the demand of a permanent Civil List during His Majesty's life; reported that the said address had been presented to His Excellency, and that he had been pleased to say he would send an answer by my message.

An Address was voted to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, to inform His Excellency that the House had voted an humble Address to our Sovereign the King, praying His Majesty will be pleased to order that the Estates of the late Order of Jesuits be applied, according to their original destination, to the Instruction of the Youth of the Country, and to that end be placed at the disposition of the Legislature of this Province; and praying His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the said Address to His Majesty's Ministers; in order that the same be laid at the foot of the Throne; and it was ordered that the said Address, and also the Address to His Majesty, be presented to His Excellency by the whole House.

Saturday, 26th Feb. 1825.

Mr. Assistant-Secretary Montizambert delivered the following Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor:

'The Lieutenant-Governor regrets that he has to state, in answer to the Address of the Assembly, of the 19 instant, that after the most diligent search, no instruction containing the Royal Command to call upon the House of Assembly, to make a proper and permanent provision for the necessary expenses of the Civil Government, is to be found in the Office of the Governor's Secretary, and he is consequently led to conclude that the dispatch containing such instructions has been carried home by His Excellency the Governor in Chief, with other papers likely to be useful in any deliberation with His Majesty's Ministers respecting the Government of this Province.'

'The Lieutenant-Governor further informs the House, that no Answer can be traced to the Address of the Assembly to His Majesty, of the 21st Jan. 1822, relative to the demand of a Permanent Civil List during His Majesty's life.'

'Castle of St. Louis Feb. 26th, 1825.'

A Communication was received by Mr. Speaker, from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, through Mr. Assistant-Secretary Montizambert, informing the House that in consequence of an indisposition which now confines him to his room, his Medical Attendants are of opinion that it will not be in His Excellency's power to receive the House of Assembly on Monday next, with their Address, to His Majesty, relative to the Estates of the heretofore Order of Jesuits in this Province; but as soon as he can do so, it shall be intimated to the House.

QUEBEC, MARCH 1.

There is now before our House of Assembly a plan for establishing a Steam Packet, intended to navigate between this Port and Halifax, and to perform several trips in the course of the summer, touching at the principal Ports in the maritime District of Gaspe; as well as those in the Provinces of New-Brunswick and Nova-Scotia, which are intermediate to Quebec and the capital of the latter Province. The duration of the Voyage being thus reduced to a comparative certainty, a personal intercourse between the Inhabitants of the respective Provinces will probably ensue, which cannot fail of materially promoting the ends proposed. A Committee of the Lower House is now employed in taking evidence on this subject, a copy of the minutes, when complete, we shall endeavour to obtain, and shall publish them at length in an early number for the information of our friends in the Provinces most interested.

QUEBEC, Feb. 19. 1825.

Last night the Estimate for 1825, was sent down, and delivered to the House by Mr. Secretary Mentizambert. The local distinction is not observed. The estimate is £72,002 1s. 10d. cy. to meet which the growing revenue, applicable to the discharge of the permanent and ordinary expences of the civil government of the province, amounts to £40,545 15s. 10d. cy. leaving a balance of £31,455 6s. cy. to be provided for, from the unappropriated funds of the Province. This balance therefore is about £11,000 under what it was in 1818.

The shape in which it has come down we understand is popular.

THE LARGE TIMBER SHIP now building at the Island of Orleans is very far advanced, and might be launched as soon as the river is free of ice, but we understand, it is not probable that this will be done earlier than the end of May next; she will sail about the middle of July; her rigging & materials are chiefly in this country, and will be proportioned to those of the Columbus; her admeasurement, is about a third more than that of the Columbus, or 5000 tons. If we add to this number that of 9000, which it has been correctly estimated is the tonnage of the vessels now on the stocks in the Province, we shall have ready for sea, about the end of May, vessels of 14,000 tons burthen, which is one half more than was registered during the last year: all of them have been built since Nov. that is in the space of seven months.

NEW YORK, MARCH 16.

LATEST FROM ENGLAND.

The packet ship Columbia, Captain Lee, arrived at this port yesterday from Liverpool, which place she left on the 16th Feb. By this arrival, the Editors of New York Daily Advertiser have received their regular files of London papers to the evening of February 14th, and Liverpool to the 16th.

The papers contain but little political intelligence of importance. Parliament were engaged in discussing the state of Ireland, with a particular reference to the Catholic Association. The debate of the House of Commons had been continued through two days, and was adjourned to a third. It was extremely animated, and called forth a great proportion of the talents of the House. By the numbers on subordinate questions, there appears to be a very large majority in favour of the ministerialists, and for putting down the Catholic Association.

Accounts from Greece are, as usual, very contradictory, some of them representing Colocotron's faction as suppressed, and himself as having submitted to the government, and others as being still at the head of a considerable force.
