

At a Meeting of the "Ship Owners Society," in London, Mr. Canning, in addressing the Society, referred to the removal of the restrictions on commerce, among others, made the following remarks—"The seat of our prosperity is to be found in the indistructible energies of the British people, and in that spirit of enterprise which is beyond all controul, extending their commerce to the end of the world, and exciting the surprise of all mankind. Here are the elements from which our prosperity springs, and therefore we feel an interest in widening the sphere of their operation. But this would be a solid interest, if it ended with our own aggrandizement. We are anxious that other countries should share the advantage with our own, satisfied that in every new field of enterprise, the British flag will triumphantly wave while commerce is to be pursued, or where, should necessity ever require it, naval valour and superiority might be exhibited."

It was reported at the Stock Exchange, London, on the 12th of Feb. that the Emperor of Russia had resolved to send out Consuls to South America. There did not appear, upon enquiry, to be any foundation for this news, but the Globe remarks that letters had been received by way of the Netherlands, leaving room to believe that the recognition of the Independence of S. America by England would not produce such an effect upon the Russian cabinet as ought to alarm persons most interested in the funds.

In Spain it appears that the high ultras have turned their views towards Russia, and flatter themselves that Alexander will soon arrest the march of England. It is also mentioned that since a rumour has prevailed that Portugal affords a favourable reception to such of the Spaniards as are disposed to flee from persecution, the emigration in that direction has become so great as to excite the attention of the government.

The Spanish Government is said to persist in its former course towards South America.—Four regiments more of troops are to be embarked for Cuba, to be thence directed according to circumstances. King Ferdinand was suffering under another most painful attack of the gout.

From the N. B. Courier, 2d April.

The Columbia, which lately arrived at New-York, brought the Officers of the Arctic Land Expedition, a detachment of the same having gone by way of Hudson's Bay. They consist of Capt. FRANKLIN, the commander; Lt. KENDALL, Astronomer; (this Officer was on board the Griper, during her late disastrous attempt to Repulse Bay); Dr. RICHARDSON, who rendered such eminent services on the former occasion, Surgeon and Naturalist; Lieut. BACK, who also distinguished himself so highly, will make the survey and continue throughout the voyage with Capt. FRANKLIN; and Mr. DRUMMOND, Botanist. They will proceed through Canada, to the

mouth of M'Kenzie's River, there resume the canoe navigation, and sail westwardly towards Icy Cape. Should they, not meet with Captain PARRY, as anticipated, the Blossom, of 28 guns, which lately sailed to the South Seas, will proceed to Behring's Straits to receive them should they be so fortunate as to reach that point. They were to leave New-York in few days for York, Upper Canada, and the whole party will assemble at Bear Lake; and in the Spring of 1826, will descend M'Kenzie's River, and again embark on the Polar Sea, in July of the same year.

We understand from Mr. Wood, passenger in the Glasgow, that a vessel had arrived at Madeira from Lisbon, which left there about the 8th of Feb.: she brought accounts, that in consequence of the remonstrance of the British Admiral commanding in the Tagus, against the conduct of the Portuguese Ministry, and a threat made by him in person, to the King, if they persevered in their measures, he would withdraw his ships, his Majesty had made an entire change in that Body. *Halifax Journal.*

In warm weather, when it is not convenient to forward your Hides and Skins immediately to market, in place of drying them, as is the most common and ruinous custom, let them be salted, folded together and rolled up; the benefits derived from this mode will be very great; it is nothing less than preserving the life of the Hide.

In purchasing Leather, the following kinds may be enquired for at the Subscriber's Factory, (head of King Street, Fredericton,) namely, Sole-Leather, stout and light wax'd Leather, wax'd and grain Calf-Skin, coarse and fine mag'd Leather, coarse grain Leather, Cordivan, buff'd Horse Leather, &c.; coarse and fine Harness Leather, black and brown Bridle-Leather, Serr-Leather, &c. &c.

Sole Leather to be good, must be very firm, and thoroughly tan'd; curried Leather to be good must be firm yet pliable. In replenishing Leather with Oil, always make the application when the Leather is in a damp state; and let moderation be exercised in drying it; always after it having been unavoidably wet, before it gets dry, make an application of oil or tallow, or a composition of both; thus keeping the pores of the Leather full, the pervasion of water will be obstructed, and consequently the Leather preserved from rotteness. If those directions be observed by the consumer, & his manufacturer be an Artist, his Leather will wear twelve months.

College of New-Brunswick.

DESIGNS for a new College Building, to be erected in the vicinity of Fredericton, will be received at the Office of the Subscriber in Fredericton, until the first day of June next.—The Building to be of the rough Stone of the Country, with Hewn Coirns for the Corners, Windows and Doors; Slatd Roof, to project over the Wall—and not to be more than two Stories in height besides the Basement story, which is to rise four feet above the surface of the Ground; and the whole to be sufficiently large to afford accommodations for a President, a Vice President, one or two Professors, Twenty Students, a Steward and Servants; also Rooms for a Chapel, Public Exercises, a Dining Hall, a Library, Philosophical Apparatus, and Lectures—Allowing to the President two handsome Sitting Rooms, and two Bed Rooms, with Kitchen and Servants Rooms, so as to accommodate
