On the following morning His Excellency proposed meeting the Gentlemen of the Settlement at Mr. Dumaresq's, and receive their Address at 12 o'clock, which was then presented to His Excellency, by Hugh Munro, Esquire, attended by the Magistrates and a numerous assemblage of the Inhabitants.

To His Excellency Major General Sir Howard Douglas, Baronet, Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief over the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

May it please your Excellency,
We the Magistrates and principal Inhabitants of Saint Peters, most respectfully beg leave to congratulate your Excellency on your safe arrival at this distant part of your Excellency's Government, and with the most lively satisfaction, receive this visit as a distinguished mark of your Excellency's attention; and rendered particularly interesting as being the first instance, in which these shores have been visited by a resident Governor of this Province.

We observe with great satisfaction that the judicious views of improvement so strongly recommended by your Excellency before, are now seconded by the precautionary measure of becoming personally acquainted with the local state, means, and resources, of each section of your Excellency's Government, and that such a general interview must lay the foundation of great and prosperous results.

We present to your Excellency in this quarter of your Government, a sober, industrious, and loyal class of settlers; struggling with the difficulties of a country yet in a wilderness state, and striving to settle and improve it with as much diligence as our means will possibly permit.

We anticipate great and lasting benefits as the result of such well digested measures of administration, and are fully satisfied, that their effects will be calculated to extend to all parts of your Excellency's Government.

We feel greatly relieved in this instance by your Excellency's well known affability, and ready acquiescence in sharing in the privations common to new settlements, and dispensing with formalities more properly due from higher circles.

We have to regret the privations which your Excellency must have necessarily been exposed to in such a lengthy journey, which must have imposed an additional weight on the duties of such an arduous undertaking.

We will not trespass upon your Excellency's time any longer, but beg leave to say, that your Excellency has our warmest wishes for your safe return, and happy sight of your amiable family.

To which His Excellency was pleased to make the following reply.

To the Magistrates and Inhabitants of Nipisiguit in the County of Northumberland.

I receive with great satisfaction your congratulations on my arrival in this remote part of the Province, and I beg to assure you that the circumstance of its never having been visited before by a Governor of the Province, adds, largely, to the interest with which I now discharge this duty, because it may afford me opportunities of being useful, in a way which I might not otherwise so distinctly see.

I am happy to perceive here, the most satisfactory proofs that I am amongst a sober, industrious, and loyal class of people, who have struggled already through the difficulties of a first settlement, and are improving with great rapidity, a very fine tract of country.

I anticipate great and lasting benefits to this part of the Country, from the great exertions you are using in agricultural pursuits; and I must dwell with great satisfaction on the fact, that this, and some adjoining settlements, are already made productive to an extent nearly to satisfy your own wants.

Proceed, I earnestly entreat you, in this way; intersperse your industrious pursuits, with exertions on your extensive coasts in cultivating the Fisheries, and be assured that a steady and judicious cultivation of these natural sources of wealth, co-operating with a proper degree of enterprise in the staple

trade of the Country, will soon raise this quarter of the Province to a high degree of prosperity and importance.

The attentions I have experienced in every quarter; the good feeling which I everywhere discover; the progress I remark, and the results I anticipate, are so gratifying, and so full of interest, that they would supercede all sense of privation, were I even enduring such in the progress I make, but I feel none, and shall return to my family with the pleasing retrospect of the interesting time that I shall have passed, and with the best wishes and desires for your prosperity.

After which His Excellency proceeded to recommend in very forcible language the immediate adoption of an Agricultural and Emigrant Society, to be combined for the present with the county Society lately established at Miramichi, and concluded by a liberal subscription for its encouragement.

His Excellency dined at Somerset Vale with a select party at Judge Munro's at 5 o'clock, and in the evening embarked on board the Chebucto, and immediately got under way for Richibucto.

ST. JAMES'S CHURCH, Newcastle.

On Thursday the 14th inst. at 5 o'clock p. m. (in the presence of a very numerous assemblage of people) was laid the Corner-Stone of this Church, by His Excellency Major General Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, Barronet, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c. &c. (then at Miramichi on his tour through the Province,) at the particular request of the Committee appointed to erect the Church. After the solemn form of laying the Corner-Stone of this Hallowed building, with the usual ceremonies, were gone through, His Excellency was pleased to express himself as follows:—

"I have much Pleasure in laying the Corner-Stone of that foundation upon which is to be raised, a Church, in Communion with the established Church of Scotland, according to that ecclesiastical constitution which is recognized by Law:—Long may it rear its sacred roof over a Congregation of moral, religious and loyal People; may it ever remind them of the Land of their Sires; Keep them in Connection with the national Church with which it is in Communion and retain them in allegiance to the illustrious, Empire, of which our Country (Scotland) forms so important a part:—may God favor all endeavours to these effects and bless you, and your Descendants."

In a small chamber or depository in the Corner-Stone, made for the purpose, were deposited several bottles, containing British and Provincial Newspapers, Gold and Silver Coins of the present reign, and several other antique and curious Coins. A small metal Tablet was also deposited, on which is engraved the following inscription:—

The Corner Stone of the Foundation of this Church of St. James Dedicated to the Worship of Almighty God, According to the Forms of the established CHURCH OF SCOTLAND,

Was laid on the XIV Day of July, Anno Domini MDCCCXXV. By His Excellency Major General Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, Baronet, F. R. S. & Lieutenant-Governor and Commander in Chief of the PROVINCE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK, &c. &c. &c.

Miramichi, 20th July, 1825. NORTHUMBERLAND AGRICULTURAL AND EMIGRANT SOCIETY.

At the particular request of His Excellency Major General Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, a very numerous meeting of the Members of the Northumberland Agricul-

tural and Emigrant Society, was held at Mitchell's Hotel, Newcastle, on Thursday the 14th instant; when His Excellency was pleased to honor the Society with his presence. The Secretary having briefly reported to His Excellency, by his request, the proceedings of the Society, and the amount of the Agricultural and Emigrant Subscriptions respectively, &c. His Excellency was pleased to lay before the Society the communications from Lord Bathurst, relative to the assistance and encouragement of Emigrants to this Province, and after expressing his high satisfaction at seeing a Society of this nature, so promptly formed, after the organization of the General Provincial Agricultural and Emigrant Society at Fredericton, and zealously supported by the Gentlemen of this extensive County, rose, and with great ability pointed out in a very forcible and impressive manner, the various and important advantages to be derived from the establishing of Institutions of this nature, in the respective counties throughout the Province; both as respects agriculture and emigration from the Mother Country; and particularly alluded to the encouragement and assistance that must thereby be afforded to Emigrants, as well on their first arrival, as in their subsequent career, and the consequent reduction of the price of labour, the high rate of which had hitherto so greatly retarded the progress of Agriculture, and the general improvement of the country. His Excellency was also pleased to remark upon the great utility of Saving Banks, and pointed out the permanent advantages that might be expected to ensue from such an establishment at Miramichi, especially to the lower class of people, inasmuch as it would at once afford them a safe and advantageous depository for all the money they can spare from their earnings upon interest, and at the same time be holding out such a strong inducement to economy, as to refrain from habits of dissipation, as must be attended with effects highly beneficial to the community at large. His Excellency after earnestly recommending the immediate formation of a Bank of this description at Miramichi, or two of them if found necessary, for the convenience of the public in so extensive a county, concluded with a few appropriate observations upon the imperious necessity there is, upon the Inhabitants of the county at large, to turn their attention more to the improvement of the public roads, as one of the grand objects to be particularly attended to in the settlement of a new Country. His Excellency then added a liberal Subscription to the Emigrant Society, and Savings Bank, when formed, and withdrew.
