His Excellency dined at Somerset Vale with a select party at Judge Munro's at 5 o'clock, and in the evening embarked on board the Chebucto, and immediately got under way for Richibucto.

(in the presence of a very numerous assemblage of people) was laid the Corner-Stone of this Church, by His Excellency Major Gereral Sir Howard Douglas, Barronet, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c. &c. (then at Miramichi on his tour through the Province,) at the particular request of the Committee appointed to erect the Church. After the solemn form of laying the Corner Stone of this Hallowed building, with the usual ceremonies, were gone through, His Excellency was leased to express himself as follows;—

"I have much Pleasure in laying the Corner-Scone of that foundation upon which is to be raised, a Church, in Communion with the established Church of Scotland, according to that ecclesiastical constitution which is recognized by Law: - Long may it tear its sacred roof over a Congregation of moral, religious and loval People; may it ever remind them of the Land of their Sires; Keep them in Connection with the national Church with which it is in Communion and retain them in allegiance to the illustrious, Empire, of which our Country (Scotland) forms so important a part: - may God favor all endeavours to these effects and bless you, and your Descendants."-

In a small champer or depository in the Corner-Stone; made for the purpose, were deposited several bottles, containing British and Provincial Newspapers, Gold and Silver Coins of the present reign, and several other antique and curious Coins. A small metal Tablet was also deposited, on which is engraved the following inscription:---

NORTHUMBERLAND AGRICULTURAL
AND EMICRANT SOCIETY.

At the particular request of His Excellency Major General Sir Howard Douglas, a very numerous meeting of the Members of the Northumberland Agricul-

tural and Emigrant Society, was held at Mitchell's Hotel, Newcastle, on Thursday the 14th instant; when His Excellency was pleased to honor the Society with his presence. The Secretary having briefly reported to His Excellency, by his request, the proceedings of the Society, and the amount of the Agricultural and Emigrant Subscriptions respectively, &c. His Excellency was pleased to lay before the Society the communications from Lord Bathurst, relative to the assistance and encouragement of Emigrants to this Province, and after expressing his high satisfaction at seeing a Society of this nature, so promptly formed, after the organization of the General Provincial Agricultural and Emigrant Society at Fredericton, and zealously supported by the Gentlemen of this extensive County, rose, and with great ability pointed out in a very forcible and impressive manner, the various and important advantages to be derived from the establishing of Institutions of this nature, in the respective counties throughout the Province; both as respects agriculture and emigration from the Mother Country; and particularly alluded to the encouragement and assistance that must thereby be afforded to Emigrants, as well on their first arrival, as in their subsequent career, and the consequent reduction of the price of labour, the high rate of which had hitherto so greatly retarded the progress of Agriculture, and the general improvement of the country. His Excellency was also pleased to remark upon the great utility of Saving Banks, and pointed out the permanent advantages that might be expected to ensue from such an establishment at Miramichi, especially to the lower class of people, inasmuch as it would at once afford them a safe and advantageous depository for all the money they can spare from their earnings upon interest, and at the same time be holding out such a strong inducement to economy, as to refrain from habits of dissipation, as must be attended with effects highly beneficial to the community at large. His Excellency after earnestly recommending the immediate formation of a Bank of this description at Miramichi, or two of them if found necessary, for the convenience of the public in so extensive a county, concluded with a few appropriate observations upon the imperious necessity there is, upon the Inhabitants of the county at large, to turn their attention more to the improvement of the public roads, as one of the grand objects to be particularly attended to in the settlement of a new Country. His Excellency then added a liberal Subscription to the Emigrant Society, and Savings Bank, when formed, and withdrew.
