PETER FRASER, Esquire, in the Chair. On this toast being drank, Mr. G. N. [Name] rose and said—“The present occasion, by association, conjured up so many

reminiscences of *auld lang syne* and given birth to some suggestions connected with the purpose of our meeting; that deeming it not unseasonable to lay them before you, I shall, with your leave Mr. President, proceed to do so. In all ages the love of Country has had a ruling influence on the actions and passions of man. The same enthusiasm which reigned supreme in the breast of the Greek—the same *amor patriæ* which almost extinguished every other sentiment in the Roman—leads the inhabitant of Lapland or Nova Zembla to prefer his waste of snows or subterranean dwelling to the myrtle groves of Hesperia or the splendid palaces of luxurious refinement. The Scotch are said to be greatly susceptible of this national predilection; and altho' modern heartlessness may sometimes regard it as a taunt, I shall ever respect the impulse which renders a man *jealous of national honor*, and *sudden and quick*, for the character of his native land. We have every cause to “plume the crest” at the recital of our Country's story. There the arm of valor was ever conspicuous in the pursuits of more enlightened times engaged the attention of our forefathers. Do not the names of Wallace and Bruce rush on your minds, and induce the recollection of a long train of heroes who have consecrated their Country's name?—In the literary field of the escutcheon of fame, behold Buchanan, whose admirable version of the songs of Israel is only matched by his inimitable dedication of them to our unfortunate Mary; and in its next compartment we see emblazoned the Baron Napier, whose genius cleared a way which has been pursued by all subsequent philosophers. But were I to pursue the numerous paths I now see expanding before me, I should institute a course of lectures instead of submitting the suggestions I proposed to bring under your immediate view. I shall endeavour, therefore, to come to the point—that concentrating point, where I should hope to find our affections bound more strongly to our native land, and our cordiality quickened towards one another. There are several gentlemen here, who on their arrival in this country, found its condition widely different from what it now appears to us; whose path, as it were has been strewn with flowers; and it is cheering to say that these gentlemen have shared in the benefits which they have contributed to produce generally.—In a few years hence, perhaps a similar assertion may be made of many who are seated at this fraternal board—but experience points to the uncertainties of life, and prudence bids us prepare against its vicissitudes. I propose therefore that we form a Society for the purpose of raising funds for the relief of indigence.”

Several gentlemen delivered their sentiments friendly to such an institution, and the proposal was unanimously agreed to.

Harmony prevailed throughout the meeting; many appropriate toasts were given and excellent songs sung.—The excellent band of the 52d (Light Infantry) conduced to enliven the hilarity of the evening by playing some admirable pieces as well as the appropriate Tunes.—The room was tastefully decorated and ornamented with transparencies.

On Friday a deputation waited on the Lieutenant-Governor Sir HOWARD DOUGLAS, when His Excellency was pleased to become PATRON of the Fredericton Society of Saint Andrew.
