LONDON, JUNE 5.

Mr. Hume obtained, on Friday night, a

pledge from the Chancellor of the Exchequer, that a bill should be introduced, forthwith, to permit the transmission of newspapers to and from the British Colonies on the same terms as to and from Ireland.

JUNE 12.

By Express, French Papers to the 9th inst. with the Etoile of Thursday have been received. The Chambers have resumed their Sittings but have yet transacted no business of importance. The only intelligence in these Journals relates to the decisive advantages gained by the Greeks over Reschid Pacha and the Egyptian fleet, as all the accounts hitherto received from different quarters agree, scarcely any doubt can be entertained of the truth of those successes, and certainly none of their importance. The battle of Vlochos, fought on the 17th of April, seems to have been bravely contested; for it began at the dawn of day, and it was not till three o'clock in the afternoon that the Turks gave way and dispersed themselves, leaving 3,000 killed and 500 wounded on the field, and twenty standards and all their artillery in the hands of the victors. Many of the fugitives were afterwards killed by the peasants, and the few whom Reschid had succeeded in collecting, were attacked and defeated a second time about the end of April. As to the advantages gained over the Egyptian fleet, they consist, we are now told, in the burning of a frigate, the sinking of eight other vessels of war, and the capture of thirteen, by Admiral Miaulis, who was in pursuit of the rest.

In the House of Common, Friday night, the Bill for granting an increase of income to the Duke of Cumberland for the due education of his son, was read a third time and passed, by a majority of 58—the numbers being 179 to 121. The only amendment made to was one moved by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, for adding these words to the grant:—"during the will and pleasure of his Majesty, and in such manner and form as his Majesty shall see fit."

In the committee of the House of Commons on the Colonial Postage Bill, on Friday night, Mr. Hume suggested that the postage of newspapers sent to the colonies should only be one penny, as was the case with respect to papers sent to Ireland. The Chancellor of the Exchequer observed, that there was a great difference in the distance between England and Ireland and that between England and the Colonies; however, he had no objection to split the difference, and make it three half-pence, which was agreed to.

In the House of Commons, on Friday night, the Smuggling Preventive Bill (one of those excellent measures introduced by Mr. Herries) was recommitted. In explanation of the principle of this bill, Mr. Herries stated, that it was intended to comprise all the customs laws, particularly relative to the prevention and punishment of offences connected with that subject. The labour of doing so was of course very great; for the laws now intended to be compressed, including the Irish statutes, were not less than five hundred and ten; and the honorable Secretary to the Treasury well merited the applause so liberally bestowed by the house upon his indefatigable labours in reducing the whole of this immense mass into so few as twelve acts.

The Commander-in-chief has directed that the future marches of recruits may be so regulated as to make Sunday a halting day, excepting only in cases of pressing emergency.—The London Gazette of Thursday week announces, that the King has appointed Lieutenant-General Sir H. Turner, K. G. and K. C. H. to be Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Bermudas, or Somers' Islands.

The valuable and extensive collection of coins and medals belonging to the late King

which his present Majesty has, with such munificence, bestowed, along with the library, has been removed from Carlton house to the British Museum. This magnificent collection fills near 1,500 drawers.

Every body knows that within the last fifty years, a great revolution has been effected in the political situation of India; but it is not quite so notorious, that, within the last fifteen years an equally great revolution has been silently effected in its commercial situation. Formerly we imported from that country its muslins and its procelain; now we are exporting to it our muslins and our procelain.

It is stated that there is no probability of the English Government acknowledging the political independence of St. Domingo, nor of interfering between France and that colony, with which France has shown a frank disposition to enter into suitable arrangements. The President of the Mexican republic, Don Guadalupe Victoria, has addressed the subjects of the Mexican Government, through the medium of the paper called the Mexican Sol; in which address he congratulates his fellow subjects upon the recognition of the independence of their Government by Great Britain, as the incident which (preceding only by a little priority the like act of other liberal European Governments) marks the arrival of the Mexicans, as a people, at the summit of good fortune. This document is dated Mexico March 14.

JUNE 13.

CITY, two o'clock.—The English and Foreign Markets are equally inactive; the nearest price of Consols has been 90 7/8 all the morning with scarcely a transaction having taken place worthy of notice.

ZANTE, May 10.—An express arrived last night from the Morea. The Turkish fleet, from 80 to 100 sail, are now in Modon, and are continually attacked by the Greeks, by day and by night. There seems to be but little doubt of the Greeks succeeding in taking or destroying some of them eventually.

MAY 12.—Sir Charles Sutton has just arrived in the Sybille. We have certain intelligence that the Greeks have burnt 30 of the Turkish fleet in the port of Modon. The captain of a Genoese vessel has just come in; he was obliged to cut his cable and fly on account of the fire. The Greeks are highly elated, for they considered Navarino as lost.

The garrisons in the different great towns of Spain have begun a system which must soon put an end even to the shadow of Government in that unhappy country. Receiving no pay from the national treasury they have begun to intercept its supplies, and to help themselves in the first instance, before they allow any money to be transmitted to Madrid. The troops at Seville began this practice, and their example has been followed at Burgos, Santander, Salamanca, and other places. Yet in the midst of this state of disorder and anarchy, the ministers of Ferdinand still dream of sending out expeditions from Cadiz and Corunna for the reconquest of America. The court would seem to wish it to be thought that it was on good terms with the French, by ordering salvos of artillery and illumination to take place at Madrid in honour of Charles X's coronation.

The Numa, transport, Lieutenant, W. P. Wentworth, agent, arrived yesterday from Plymouth brought 10 officers 165 men of detachments for regiments in the Canadas.

His Majesty's Ship Menai sailed on Tuesday morning for Bermuda, with a Detachment of the 74th Regt. under the Command of Major STEWART.

Rear Admiral LAKE, promoted to the rank of Rear Admiral of the Red, changed his Flag on Friday morning last, upon which occasion a Salute was fired by His Majesty Ships in this Harbour.

LONDON, JUNE 2.

The Etoile of Tuesday gives an account of the Coronation of Charles the Tenth, at Rheims, on Sunday last.—As a spectacle it is much inferior to the splendid ceremony of a Coronation in England; and it does not appear to have excited half so much interest as was expected. The Coronation is usually attended with an act of grace, and the Moniteur of Monday contains a Royal Ordinance, granting an amnesty to 51 condemned persons, and the first two names in the list are Guillaume de Vandoucourt and Drouet d'Erion; and to 72 deserters.

JUNE 8.—EAST-INDIES.

By the Prince Regent, arrived from Bengal, we have papers and letters to the 19th of February. The accounts from Chittagong are as late as the 6th February; they state the army still in march, but the progress was slow. The Buames appear to retreat without fighting. The Calcutta Papers, according to custom, are very flourishing in their predictions, but we are sorry to state that many of the letters are of the most desponding description: they state that the King of Ava was taking the most vigorous measures to defeat the English army, ordering every man, in his dominions, from 15 to 50, of repair to the army. In the mean time, the English forces made slow progress, and the time suitable for the campaign was rapidly expiring. Little more than six weeks remained, before all operations must necessarily cease. There is no news whatever from the army at Rangoon.
