

Sailing of the Great Ship.—The Baron of Renfrew weighed anchor, and was towed from the place which she occupied near the Falls of Montmorency, on Tuesday last, at noon, by the steam boat Hercules. The tide was about half flood, when she got under weigh, and she proceeded slowly round the west point of the Island of Orleans, and disappeared behind Point Levi at a quarter before two o'clock. She was accompanied beyond the Point by the Malsham Steam Boat, and the Lauzon steam ferry boat, with parties of Ladies and Gentlemen from town. The Malsham had on board the Band of the 68th Regiment, which, as well as the parties in both steam boats, went on board the Baron, the decks of which were crowded with people. The steam boats having again taken their company on board, left her behind the Point, proceeding in tow of the Hercules, which will only leave her at Bic.

The wind was up the River during the whole time the Baron was in sight, from her leaving her anchorage ground. She however hoisted her sails, hauled close to the wind, and several times seemed to gain on the Hercules. The sight was grand as she came abreast of the point of the Island; her whole length, about three hundred feet, being then seen from town and her four masts crowded with sail. The Hercules ahead, and the Malsham alongside, with the Lauzon steam appeared little better than long boats. Several sailboats in company were hardly discernable. When they arrived in the rear of the rock of Point Levi, the Baron's masts and sails still towered above the rock, and were visible at each side of it. In the foreground there were about forty or fifty Indian wigwams, and numerous Indian Canoes, one of which, after landing three passengers, an Indian was carrying on his head up to high water mark; thus offering in one view the largest ship in the world, the perfection of the application of steam to navigation, and the first, and certainly a most ingenious effort of Man in the savage state, for water conveyance. It is not probable that any other vessel of the size of the Baron of Renfrew will be built for some time. The public interest taken in this ship has been nearly as great as in the Colubus.

Part of this Cargo, as oars and staves, is estimated from the stowage they require, and not from the cubical contents.

If the measurement of the Baron is about 5000 tons, and taking the usual Quebec allowance of 5000 feet in the stow for every hundred tons measurement, there will be upwards of 600 Tons of Timber wrought up in the construction of this floating fabric.

The Baron was at anchor east end of Crane Island, at 11 o'clock last night; had twice touched, but without injury.—*Quebec Gazette.*

A large rattlesnake was some time since presented to the Alexandrian Museum. Its favourite food is the frog. A number of these animals, quite young, were one day put in the cage to the snake, of which he devoured all but one. Though others were frequently given to the snake, he always spared this one—until cold weather set in, when they both became dormant, and were thus stowed away in a close cellar for the winter. On the return of warm weather they were taken from the cellar, and on being exposed were soon resuscitated—and their familiarity renewed without any abatement. This was the case again another winter and spring. The frog however died. The snake did not long survive.

Corn.—From a statement of the supplies of grain, &c. for the corresponding nine months of the three past years, it appears that most articles have arrived in the port of London in greater plenty during the last nine months than in the former periods; but in making up these accounts, we find that a large proportion of such increase as to Wheat and Oats, has consisted of Foreign or Irish Corn; and it is worthy of remark, that the article of wheat from the three wheat counties of Essex, Suffolk, and Kent, is about 70,000 quarters short of the supplies from those counties in each of the two last years; and that the arrivals of English oats have fallen considerably short of those of the previous seasons. The stocks of English grain in granary in London are considered to be smaller than at this period of any year since 1821.

Fire.—On Tuesday the 16th inst. the House owned and occupied by Mr. Jared Betts, on Barnaby's Island, in the Parish of Nelson, County of Northumberland, was destroyed by fire, with most of the Furniture.

An Inquest was held on the 14th inst. at Lincoln, in the County of Sunbury, before Solomon Perley, Esq. on view of the body of ——— Conner, a native of Ireland, Verdict, accidental death, by drowning.

DIED.

On the 15th inst., Mr. Daniel Higgins, in the 27th year of his age.
At St. George's, N. B. Capt. Dominicus Milliken, aged 28. The circumstances of

his death are truly melancholy. They are these, as far as we have learnt them. At a company training two men got into a quarrel, in which the deceased and others engaged as seconds to "see fair play." The magistrates finally interfered and had the combatants, with Milliken, arrested and confined in a room and two men placed as sentries at the door. Milliken got out at a window and went to his house after his pistols, swearing vengeance on some one who had injured him. The pistols, however, were concealed from him. He returned to the house and entered it, and when his father and one other person was trying to get him out, a scuffle ensued, and one of the guard, Rich. Rogers, who had a loaded musket put into his hand by a person who must ever lament the rash act, discharged his piece, and the contents entered Milliken's head and killed him instantly, and two shot went into his father's arm, who himself very narrowly escaped being killed. Rogers has been committed for trial. Captain Milliken has left a wife and one child. The quarrel, which terminated in the death of an active and enterprising ship master, had its origin in the trifling sum of two cents!—*E. Sent.*
