To Howard Douglas, Governor of the
Province of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia.

The members of the Religious Society of
Friends in this city, commiserating the state
of the inhabitants of New-Brunswick, who
have suffered from the recent desolation by
fire in several parts of that Province, believed
it incumbent upon them to contribute
toward the relief of those afflicted people.

In accordance with these views, Two
Thousand Four Hundred and Ten Dollars
were collected and this sum is deposited in
the branch Bank of the United States at
New-York, subject to a draft at sight in
thy quantity as Governor of New-Brunswick.

The undersigned, to whom the arrange-
ment of this business is entrusted, being in-
formed of thy personal, and official exertions
in the administration of succour to those
who survived the calamity, which has awak-
ened such general sympathy; feel themselves
warranted in asking thy offices to apply
this donation for the benefit of the sufferers,
without distinction of colour.

To Sir Howard Douglas, Governor of the

New-Brunswick, many of the citizens of
Philadelphia, deeply sympathized with the
afflicted inhabitants of that Province, and
on the Twenty-second of the last month a
meeting was held, and resolutions were
adopted for collecting donations in money
toward the relief of the sufferers.

Charged with the duty of corresponding
on this occasion, the undersigned derive
pleasure in being enabled to inform you,
that there will be deposited in the office of
Discount and Deposit of the Bank of the
United States in the city of New-York,
Eighteen hundred dollars which will be paid
on your draft at sight. A further remittance
will be made when the collections shall
have terminated, and although the amount
is comparatively small, it may serve to testify
the feelings of those who have contributed
and afford another humble proof, that the
obligations of christian benevolence, are ac-
knowledged to be as unlimited, as the domi-
nion of its great author is to become universal.

DEAR SIR,

I have the pleasure of inclosing a letter
from the Mayor of Philadelphia, informing
you of the result of the benevolent exertions
of the Philadelphians, for the relief of the
Sufferers in New-Brunswick, I yesterday
had the honor of inclosing a similar letter
from Mr. Robert Vaux, of the Society of
Friends in Philadelphia, acquainting you
with the amount of the collection made among
that class of people, whose activity and zeal
upon such occasions are always conspicuous.

On the second and third of November,
I transmitted to you the original and dupli-
cate of a letter informing, you that five thou-
sand dollars had been deposited to your
credit, in the Bank of the United States, of

the collections made in New-York.—Not
having received any answer to that letter or
to any other sent by the Mails on those days,
I am apprehensive that the two have become
united upon the road, and that both original
and duplicate have suffered the same fate—
a circumstance that I should greatly regret,
as I acted as Chairman of a very zealous
Committee, who entrusted to me the duty of
conveying to you the intelligence they con-
tained.—My other letters on the same sub-
ject, have I doubt not reached their destina-
tion: as they were sent by water.

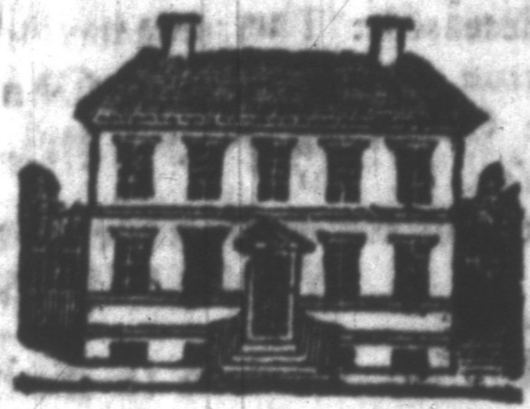
