Hart of the same place, Tannery, (and who has since absconded) that on the 8th day of August in the year of our Lord 1825, William Gibson, also an Apprentice to the said George W. Hart, came to this Deponent's House and said he was sick, and stated that the said George W. Hart had told him to go to bed, and he would send for a Doctor, but that he (Gibson) had been sick one third of the time he had lived with him the said Hart, and this Deponent further saith that the said William Gibson also informed this Deponent, he had offered the said G. W. Hart, eighty Guineas to be released from his Apprenticeship, which he stated would terminate in February next but that the said G. W. Hart, had refused to accept the same.

And this Deponent further said that in a conversation with the said Wm. Gibson, on the day and year last mentioned, this Deponent informed the said Wm. Gibson, he had pursued his son Charles Brown, as far as Mr. Hart's on the Oromocto, in order to bring him back. That the said Wm. Gibson replied, it was well I did not overtake him and bring him back, as he was confident he never would be able to serve the remainder of his time out with the said G. W. Hart, for that he the said G. W. Hart, put more (meaning work) upon the said Charles Brown, than he was able to bear, and stated also that he the said Wm. Gibson, had broken his constitution in working for the said Geo. W. Hart, and would never be the same he was before he commenced his Apprenticeship with the said Hart, and never could give his Master satisfaction, and this Deponent further saith, that the said Charles Brown often complained to him, this Deponent, of the ill treatment he received from his said Master, and that at different times previous to the going away of the said Charles Brown, the said Wm. Gibson informed this Deponent of the hard usage his son received from the said G. W. Hart, and that he, this Deponent heard the complaints of ill usage of the said G. W. Hart towards the said Charles Brown, oftener from the said Wm. Gibson than from the said Charles Brown himself.

YORK GENERAL SESSIONS, JUNE 1825.

RULES and REGULATIONS made and established by the Justices of the General Sessions of the Peace in and for the County of York in General Sessions assembled, for the lading and unlading of Vessels or Boats and for the government of all Carmen, Waggoners and Truckmen within the Parish of Fredericton, and for establishing and fixing the Rates and Fares to be taken for the Truckage of Goods, Wares, Merchandize and other articles within said Parish, between the Creek next below the Rev. Mr. BEST's, Southward, Phillis' Creek, Northward, and the Alms House Westward, in pursuance of the power and authority vested in the said Justices by an Act of the General Assembly made and passed in the present year of His Majesty's Reign intituled "An ACT to authorize the Justices of the Peace in the County of York, to make regulations respecting Carmen and Waggoners, and the lading and unlading of Vessels or Boats in the Parish of Fredericton."

I. That every Carman, Waggoner, or Truckman who Carries Goods for hire, shall cause to be marked or painted, on the near or left hand side of every Cart, Waggon, Truck, Sled, or other Vehicle used by him in his said occupation a certain number, which he shall cause to be recorded by the Clerk of the Parish, (which shall be different from any previously recorded number) and which shall be marked or painted in fair and legible characters, of not less than two inches in length; and every person who shall follow the occupation of a Carman, Waggoner, or Truckman, and who shall neglect to mark his Carts, Waggon, Trucks, Sleds or other Vehicles as is herein direct-

ed, shall for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Twenty Shillings.

II. That every Carman, Waggoner or Truckman shall be entitled to demand and receive for the Truckage of any articles, and for carefully housing the same when necessary, the several rates and fares set forth in the Scale hereunto annexed; and any person who shall demand and receive a greater rate or fare than is therein allowed, shall for every offence forfeit and pay the sum of Ten Shillings.

III. That all Carmen, Waggoners, and Truckmen, shall be ready with their Teams at all reasonable times, to convey such Goods, Wares Merchandize, or other articles within that part of the Parish of Fredericton as aforesaid, as may be required of them, and any such person who shall refuse or neglect upon the first requisition to attend and convey Goods, Wares, Merchandize, or other articles within the Parish of Fredericton aforesaid, (not being actually employed elsewhere in his said occupation) shall for each and every offence, forfeit and pay the sum of Ten Shillings.

IV. And whereas great delay frequently happens in the unlading of Vessels or Boats, by reason of the Carmen, Waggoners and Truckmen not remaining to complete the unlading of such Vessel as they have commenced with, It is therefore ordered that whenever any Carman, Waggoner or Truckman shall have commenced to unlade any Vessel or Boat he shall continue, and shall not proceed to any other employment until the Cargo of such Vessel or Boat be discharged (unless it can be shown that the Master of the Vessel was in fault) under the penalty of Twenty Shillings for each and every offence.

For Salt do do	2s.
For a Load of Household Goods	2s.
For all Loads not above described	1s. 6d.

The above are to be considered as Waggon Loads drawn by two Horses. For Cart Loads drawn by one Horse, two thirds of the above fares may be taken.
