HALIFAX, June. 6.

The government armed brig Chebucto, Capt. Potter, sailed on Saturday with the Right Reverend Lord Bishop of Nova-Scotia, his Lady, and Family, for the different parts of the Diocese on the western coast of the Province.

The schr. Two Brothers returned on Sunday from Sable Island, with 95 of the Survivors from the Ship Nassau; from 20 to 30 still remain on the Island; we are happy to hear that none of the passengers were lost, but the 7 who perished in the first boat which left the Ship.

On the 17th May last, H. M. Sloop Rifleman, fell in with the wreck of a vessel, in lat. 42, 55, N. long. 62 47, W. supposed to be the Susan, of St. Andrew's, N. B.—She was completely water logged—with her stern and decks stove in—the main mast and bowsprit were standing—the foremast appeared to have been cut away. She was laden with timber and staves.

His Majesty's ship Menai, Capt. Stewart, has been ordered to Quebec, for the purpose of conveying hither His Excellency the Earl, and Her Ladyship the Countess of DALHOUSIE, whom, we are happy to find, have determined on again visiting Nova-Scotia.

 We are happy to state that His Majesty's Government has, at the earnest solicitation of His Excellency Sir JAMES KEMPT, been pleased to grant the sum of £400 per annum, towards the support of the humane Establishment on the Island of Sable. The Legislature of New-Brunswick, will probably in their next Session contribute liberally to the same object.—The additional means now placed in the hands of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor will enable him to extend the establishment, and to provide additional comforts and better accommodations for those who may unfortunately be cast ashore on that Island.

A number of Letters, addressed to Merchants in Canada, were received by the Brothers, from the Island of Sable, on the Superscription of which appear the words "Per the Hermit."—On referring to our File of last year, we find that in the latter end of May, the Lucretia, arrived at Pictou, fell in with a water-logged deserted Brig, bearing on her stern the name of the "The Hermit of Glasgow."—This vessel probably soon after grounded on some part of the Island, and, going to pieces, the Letters addressed to must have drifted on shore. They

will be transmitted by this day's Post to Quebec.
