DIED.

At Woodstock, the 17th of this month, the Reverend FREDERICK DISBLE, Rector of that Parish, in the 73d year of his age, and 35th of his Ministry. On the 19th of the same month he was attended to the grave by the most numerous and respectable assemblage ever witnessed in that part of the country. Mr DISBLE was a native of Stamford, in the State of Connecticut, and received his education at King's College, New-York.--During the troubles consequent upon the Revolutionary War, his Family suffered deeply for their loyalty and attachment to the British Government. After receiving Holy orders from the Bishop of Nova Scotia in the year 1791. Mr DISBLE was appointed by the Society for propagating the Gospel, to Woodstock, and the adjacent Parishes of Northampton, Prince William and Queensbury. The zealous manner in which, as long as his health would permit, he performed the duties of a most arduous Mission, was such as to procure to him the approbation of the Society, and will long be remembered by those to whom he bore a pastoral relation. He had sincerely at heart the welfare and happiness, not only of those committed to his own spiritual guidance, but of Christians of all denominations, and was a warm friend to every Institution which promised to be of public utility, particularly the education of youth, to the furtherance of which most useful and momentous object, his efforts were unremitting and zealous to a degree seldom equalled. His private and social virtues were such as endeared him to all with whom he had intercourse, and long will be had in grateful remembrance; through a very extensive portion of the Community. His last illness although short, was very severe, he bore with exemplary fortitude and pious resignation, and expressed frequently to his sorrowing family, that although the loss would be great to them, the change to himself would be infinite gain. And thus he expired with a hope full of a blessed immortality. He has left a Widow and a large family to deplore the decrease of a tender husband and most affectionate friend.

LONDON, April 15.

Yesterday a ballot was taken at the East India house on the following question, whether the sum of 5000l. should be granted to Mr. Buckingham, as a compensation for the losses occasioned to him in India by the Bengal government. At six o'clock the glasses were closed and delivered to the scrutineers, who reported the question to be decided in the negative.

In Great Britain, the number of individuals in a state to bear arms, from the age of 15 to 60 is 2,744,847. The number of marriages is about 98,030 yearly; and it has been remarked that in 63 of these unions there were only 3 which had no issue. The number of deaths is about 332,708 yearly, which makes nearly 25,502 monthly, 6,398 weekly, 914 daily, and 40 hourly. The deaths among the women are in proportion to those of the men as 50 to 44. The married women live longer than those who continue in celibacy. In the country, the mean term of the number of children produced by each marriage is 4; in town the proportion is seven for every two marriages. The number of married women is to the general number of individuals of the sex as 1 to 3; and the number of married men to that of all the individuals of the male sex as 3 to 5. The number of widows is to that of the widowers as 3 to 1; but the number of widows who marry again is to that of widowers in the same case as 7 to 4. The individuals who inhabit elevated situations live longer than those who reside in less elevated places. The half of the individuals die before attaining the age of 17 years. The number of twins is to that of ordinary births as 1 to 65. According to calculations founded on the bills of mortality, one individual only in 3,126 attains the age of 100 years. The number of births of the male sex is to that of the female sex as 96 to 95.--Edinburgh Phil. Jour.

We understand that letters have been received in this town, stating that Lord Cochran has arrived in Greece. It is stated to be his Lordship's intention to carry the war into the enemy's territory.

FUNDING OF EXCHEQUER BILLS.
So eager have been the subscribers for the new stock to be created by the funding of Exchequer bills, that instead of three days, as at first proposed, one day was found sufficient for the subscriptions. The sum subscribed has been vigorously stored. At a late hour last night we learned from authority, that it was somewhat above 8,500,000l. but the precise amount had not then been stated by the Bank.

With the most sorrowful feelings we have this day to point the attention of the public, to such scenes of suffering as probably never before occurred in any civilized country. Ireland has been so governed as hardly to come within that description; but even Ireland itself, whether civilized or barbarous, did not suffer greater misery, even at that period when the sympathies of Englishmen were so strongly excited, than is now sustained by no inconsiderable portion of our fellow-subjects on British ground. In few words, the manufacturers of Blackburn in

Lancashire are perishing thro' hunger. Let any one reflect but for a moment, silently in his own bosom, what aggravated woes are contained in three short words, "dying of want;" and then he will not need much out-of-door eloquence to melt his pity, and to draw forth his charity, for the thousands who are in so dreadful a state, for the poor manufacturers of Blackburn in Lancashire, & the adjoining districts. We do not seek to provoke indignation, but to excite compassion. It was but the other day, and while the famine was raging among the poor manufacturers of Blackburn in Lancashire, that an attempt was made and even carried in the affirmative, to assign to the President of the Board of trade an annual salary of five thousand pounds. The project, however, was stopped: let Government, therefore, immediately send down to Blackburn only the amount of the first year's stipend thus rescued--(it will not be much when it comes to be divided among fourteen thousand starving persons)--and the humanity of individuals will do more. How lucky that the first five thousand pounds was saved for this work of charity. The President of the Board of Trade may have fifteen thousand a year for any thing we care, when trade flourishes; but let the plague of famine be stayed forthwith, by the application of the first year's salary. There is no time to lose.

Halifax, May 23.

The Lord Bishop arrived in the Mical from Bermuda. While in that Island, His Lordship confirmed upwards of twelve hundred persons, consecrated nine churches, and ordained two clergymen.

We regret to state, that fires are raging in the vicinity of Dartmouth and the north West Arm; and should the dry weather continue, such injury may be apprehended.
