

Dr. Church is a silent modest man, who makes no comments on his own invention, but merely exhibits the result, and leaves others to judge. He is now engaged in completing his new method of setting types, which is to be effected by melting and recasting the metal at every impression. He remarked, that his greatest difficulty was to prevent the loss of material by frequent fusion; but this he has obviated by a chemical process which prevents the formation of dross. He is on the whole a very clever man, possessing much scientific research and mechanical skill, united with inventive genius and natural acumen.

LONDON, MAY 24.

Yesterday the most alarming rumours prevailed in the City, but without seriously affecting the funds. An insurrection had taken place at Constantinople, in the course of which the Russian and English Ambassadors had fallen victims to the rage of the Janissaries, for which tale of horrors private letters from Frankfort were quoted as an authority. This notable expedient to depress the market and agitate his Majesty's loyal subjects having failed, the alarmists shifted their ground, but their success did not correspond with their versatility, as no one could be found to believe that a serious cause of quarrel had arisen between France and England. The ground work of the dispute was Cadiz, against the further occupation of which our Government had earnestly and even angrily remonstrated, though a month had scarcely elapsed, since Mr. Canning had stated in the House of Commons, that the French Government was as anxious as any other power could be to leave Spain to herself, if it could be done with safety. The resource, however, of setting France and England by the ears, shews the desperation which the agitators are reduced, as otherwise they could not have hit upon so blundering an expedient. In the wide range of the political world it would be difficult to find two Powers, whose views upon general interests are less discordant, or whose influence clashes less, whenever any question, affecting directly or indirectly, the peace of Europe, is brought under discussion. It would not even be an easy task to decide which of the two labours with the greater zeal to preserve the good understanding between the members of the great European family. As to their interest to cultivate relations of amity with one another, as with the rest of the world, it is so equally balanced, that we defy any one to say on which side it is strongest at this present moment. The policy of France, under her actual Government, is of necessity pacific; and those who have contributed to the restoration of the Bourbons, may take their stand here, as upon an unassailable ground, whenever their proceedings are impeached. She can never swerve too from this course, but under the controul of circumstances, to which all ordinary considerations must give way, such as may affect the very existence of her own domestic tranquillity, or that of her reigning family. We presume it may be safely said, that it is the ardent desire, as well as the obvious advantage of England, to cherish peace at this time with all her neighbours; and in this concurrence of views and interests on the part of two such powerful States, there is one of the best of all guarantees, that their united efforts will not be unavailing. The attempt therefore to palm upon the Public a belief that they were involved in an angry discussion, was a palpable blunder; and the result was derision. In the mean time the French Rentes remain firm; and the public securities of every other European State maintain their ground, which is a triumphant reply to all the sinister rumours that have been circu-

lated of late with so much industry. We may say without vanity that we have contributed not a little to put down one of them, namely, that of an immediate rupture between Russia and the Porte; and we can only say, that if it had the slightest solidity, it would have frightfully depressed the value of funded property every where. No man in his senses can believe for example, that England would be tranquil spectators of any attempt on the part of Russia to occupy Constantinople, and thus established her power permanently, on both shores of the Bosphorus. Any English Statesmen, worthy of the name, would not hesitate even for an instant to call forth all the warlike energies of the country in order to defeat its execution; and no Minister could upon such an occasion, advocate neutrality and maintain his place. We are speaking now of a contingency, which we are persuaded, will not happen in our time; but should it, contrary to all rational calculations occur, our Government would meet it half way, and by this energy, and promptitude prevent Russia from extending her limits to the manifest danger of the rest of Europe.
