By the Halifax Papers we find that our Governor embarked on Saturday week on board the Nieman, Capt Wallace, and sailed the day following for New-Brunswick.—We have St. John papers to the 15th inst.—at which date the Niemen had not arrived.

St. John, Aug. 10.

We are sorry to state that the master of the brig Dispatch, of this port, lately from Ireland, shot one of his sailors this morning while with others of the crew were in the act of going on shore against his will. He underwent an examination before His Worship the Mayor, and was committed to prison. We understand the ball, which perforated his head, has been extracted, but faint hopes are had of his recovery.

A short time since, a villain, named Corney Redney, went to the house of Wm. Breen, living near Tullo, county of Onondaga, in the absence of Mr. B. in search of money; not finding any, he put a griddle over the fire, and placed Mrs. B. upon it, to extort from her a confession of where the money was secreted, and burnt her in such a shocking manner as to cause her death the next day; a neighbour, hearing of the outrage by a child who had escaped from the house, going to her rescue, received a blow upon the head with a spade, which caused his immediate death. The murderer is now in confinement.—Ogdensburg Gazette.

COMMERCIAL.

A letter from a respectable House in St. John's Newfoundland, says; The Collector and Controller, of H. M. Customs here, have come, we are told, to a determination to seize any British Plantation Rum, Molasses, Sugar, Cocoa, or Coffee, which may be brought here from any free port, into which foreign West-India produce can be imported; unless the same can be shipped from a free warehouse, or forwarded in the identical vessel in which it was brought from the West-Indies, accompanied by its original Cockets and Plantation Certificate; but they will admit the Importation and Entry of those articles from Liverpool, or any other out port of Nova Scotia, free from foreign duty; under the impression that foreign produce cannot be imported into such Ports, or carried coastwise there for exportation to Newfoundland.

WINDSOR July 19. On Friday last, the schr. Friendship, 75 tons, Frost, master, being becalmed drifted on the Black Rock, near Partridge island, and was entirely lost,

being forced by the flood tide over the rock, turned bottom up and dashed in pieces. The sight and the crash were awful to the spectators on shore; but by the humanity of Capt. Loran Fox, of the schr. Mary Stubbs, the master and crew, 5 persons, were happily saved; as was also about £100 value in sails, rigging, &c. &c. Capt. F. lost about £40 in Province Notes and some other property which he had on board the schr.

PICOU, JULY 25.—During a thunder storm which occurred on Sunday last, accompanied by a squall of wind, a boat was upset and sunk in the harbour. Unfortunately John McMillan and his wife perished—the others who were in the boat were either picked up or swam to the shore; the sufferers have left five small children to lament their loss. This dispensation of Providence is an awful warning to those who go a pleasure sailing upon Sunday—a practice which has become quite too frequent here of late.
