lost about eighty habitations or stores, and property to the value of at least thirty three thousand pounds. On the Rivers Oromocto and Rushigunish tributaries of the St. John, several lives and many habitations have been lost and destroyed, and some of these ravages accompanied by terrific circomstances. On the Miramichi River, the loss of life cannot, I fear, be estimated under three hundred souls. Great numbers of the destitute survivors had collected in the village of Chatham for relief, and as so many of the provision stores of the merchants had been consumed (the settlement depending almost entirely upon imported food), serious apprehensions were entertained of approaching famine. So soon as I learnt this, I assembled His Majesty's Council to consider what measures it would be expedient to adopt, and an agent has been sent to Quebec to purchase supplies, and to proceed with them to Miramichi.

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In a calamity so extraordinary and extensive, I feel that I am called upon to depart from that brevity, with which the most momentous operations of my own profession are commonly reported, and if I have trespassed too much at length in doing so, it is to shew amply the grounds upon which I ought to apply and appeal for succour.

I have done all in my power to afford and extend relief upon this melancholy occasion, and I have been most nobly supported by the liberality of the country.

For he benefit of the sufferers in the fire which has taken place at Fredericton, a subscription has been raised, which will be suffior no for the supply of its immediate wants. The subscription in Miramichi has been most liberal; the city of St. John has come and I have just learnt by a dispatch from his Excellency Sir James Kempt, that our sister colony, was about to send prompt and considerable succours from Halifax; but ef fermal relief beyond averting the horrors of want, in the approaching long winter, of seven months' duration, is not within such

In promoting subscriptions, I have on me own responsibility paid, two hundred prinds from the King's finds for the benefir of each of the two suffering places. kniw well en nigh His Gracimis Majesty's b-nevolent disposition, and your Lord hip's, to do be of receiving sanction for this ap-

propriation.

The succours to which the people here naturally look, are those which the abundant charry and benevolence, of the mother countries usually contribute, on such calamitous occasions; and should any funds be so raised a him , they would be effectually and proapplied by Committees here, to many cases of very great distress, brought upon there who will endure it silently, but severely and to re establish in business many pers ns who have entirely lost their little capitals, invested in the beginnings of a productive trade in the prosperity of which the matter countries participate, and to aid others who are reduced more partially to difficulty. Should, funds so considerable be contributed as to be applied further to restore buildings that would be carefully regulated by measures to render the recurrence of such dangers less likely, in a way which could not be effected, if the sufferers are constrained, from insufficiency of funds, to rebuild in the cheaper, but more perilous manner and material of the country. Means for immediate subsistence and succour being thus provided, I shall to morrow open a subscription here for those latter important purposes, and to this fund, instead of that for repuilding the Government House, I crave vour Lordship's grant in aid from the King's revenue. To this too I invoke the benevolence of the moher countries, and I trust some measures may be adopted to excite it. The subscription for this purpose will be commenced tomorrow, and immediately afterwards I shall proceed to the site of the greater calamity, leaving my family in their difficulty here, to a continuance of those kindnesses and protection which they experienced, when driven from their own residence.

The following Letter from Major-General Sir Howand Douglas, Barronet, Lieut - Gov. of New-Branswick, to I hn Bainbridge, E.q Agent or the Province, and whi h though a private comm in cation, Mr B in ridge at the request of the New-Brimswick Committee has felt himself exous d in p blishing, will convey a m re authenand meresting account of the sufferings of

that devoted Colony, and, we trust, excite the benevolence of the public to aid the Subscription for their relief .---

" Miramichi, 26th October. " My dear Sir, --- I have no doubt that the public journals will soon announce the awful calamity which has befallen the province. I have not time to enter into any of its terrific details. I shall confine my communication to purposes of succour and relief.

" So soon as I had completed those arrangements which I considered it proper for the Government to make, and had despatched an agent to Quebec to purchase provisions and clothing to the amount of between five and six thousand pounds, I set off for this afflicted place, where I arrived last night; and I shall only say, that I could form no conception of misery and desolation so deep as that which has occurred here : other parts of the province have greatly suffered. Frederiction is more than half destroyed, and there has been a loss of property to a great amount,

My. Government-House was the first to fa'l, and we have sustained severe loss; but in the greater which others have suffered, we lose all consideration of our own. Here the loss of life cannot be estimated under three hundred souls !!! Newcastle, and all the settlements for twelve miles in continuity. are consumed. The subscription in the province, and in Nova Scotia, have been most liberal, and I hope there is nothing to fear for want in the winter; but effectual succour is beyond such means; and I write this to urge all-your influence into action for promoting a general subscription. Your in. fluence with the leading men in Liverpool, and other ports, as well as in London, would be most useful to this effect, and never was forward with a great degree of liberality, there a fitter or stronger claim upon the abundant charity and benevolence of our country.

> " Al hough we may arrest the strides which famine threatened to make, and fluid immediate relief, yet without such succours this country will be thrown back for years in the progress, it was miking, and the mother country feel inconvenience from, langour in those operations which her wants. have excited so much.

" But you will be fully inform I of all that has occurred here; and the mean trible whosenher wishes mexoress his thanks sure I allude to will be suggeste laby your own feelings for the case and fire the colony. Pray, then, do what you gave consider right in this very afflicting case. My letter is written in histe and in affliction, amilst scenes which I have considered it right to visit, to do what may yet further be in my power to confort, succour, and restore. I cannot stay long. for the weather I have experienced on my journey hither warms me to lose no time. Believe me, my dear Sir, your's, very sincerely.
