GEO. SHORE, Adj. Gen. M. F.

We have just received intelligence of a most deliberate and barbarous murder committed yesterday at the Parish of Westfield, by a man named Daniel Cunningham against Thomas Freeborn, a Constable of that Parish: It appears that there has been for many months past, a Warrant for the apprehension of Cunningham, for some offence or debt; and that he had threatened to kill any one who might attempt to take him; that Freeborn had been to his place about two months ago with the Warrant, but Cunningham was absent; that hearing on his return home, that Freeborn had been there, he declared he would shoot him if he came on his premises, and at the same time produced two bullets which he said he had got for the purpose; that Freeborn went yesterday to the place where Cunningham was about to raft Timber, but declared at the time, he had no Warrant against him, and no intention of taking him, of which Cunningham was notified, but seeing him coming on the road towards him, he had armed himself with a Gun and Hay Fork, and cried out to Freeborn as he was coming on the road towards him, to stop; that Freeborn not appearing to apprehend any danger from Cunningham, replied that he would walk on the road and continued on; that upon this Cunningham struck the Hay-fork in the ground and levelled the gun at Freeborn, and deliberately shot him; that as Freeborn did not immediately fall, the persons who were standing by, three in number, did not suppose he was much hurt, but that the gun was not charged with ball; and Cunningham passed on; Freeborn after walking a few paces, turned and said he was shot and groined loudly; Cunningham hearing the groan, set off as fast as he could towards the woods, and was not taken when the last accounts came away; Freeborn was carried to the adjoining house, where he lingered about half an hour and then died. Upon examining the wound, it appeared that two Balls had entered his breast, and one passed quite through his body.

We are happy to have it in our power to state that Daniel Cunningham, the Murderer of Thomas Freeborn, has been apprehended, and is in confinement in Burton Gaol. We understand that he had reached Mr. True's on the St. Andrews Road, on his way to the U. States.

**BOUNDARY LINE.**—We observe in the Eastport Sentinel of the 18th of Feb. an article copied from the Portland Advertiser, on the subject of the Boundary between this Province and the United States, so remarkable for its compound of truth and falsehood, that we deem it worthy of some notice.

It first charges as a solemn fact upon the British Government, the employment of some of the most scientific persons she could obtain upon the continent of Europe, and then pays a compliment to Dr. TIARKS, which he well merits, for his skill and science.

But the writer of this article seems to have forgotten that Mr. HASLER, the Astronomer employed by the American Government was also a European, and was selected by that Government for the same reason that Dr. TIARKS was employed, namely, because he well understood his business; and owing to the skill and ability, and, we may add, the integrity of these two gentlemen, the accurate ascertainment of the parallel of 45° which had been several times attempted, in vain, by American Artists, was accomplished.

The writer then states that, "by these means," namely, employing the most scientific persons in Europe; "taking care to insure a final disagreement between the Agents sensibly employed for adjusting the controversy, and to throw obscurity upon all the evidence which they (the Americans) had heretofore found sufficient in support of their possession, the English side of the question is ripe for reference to the ultimate arbitrament provided by the Treaty."—Now it is somewhat curious that the employing of persons of competent skill to ascertain a plain fact, not depending upon reasoning and argument, but upon astronomical observations, should be the means of insuring such disagreement, but, if so, it clearly proves that the Agent on the part of the American Government was fully prepared to disagree to every thing that should in any manner invalidate

upon the evidence which they had found sufficient in support of their possession it is simply this. American Artists had marked a line, which they considered, though, as it now appears, erroneously, to be the parallel of 45° and up to this line Americans took possession; but the skill and science of these disinterested European Astronomers, shewed clearly that this line at its intersection with Lake Champlain where American Fortifications had been erected was nearly half a mile too far to the north; and thus destroyed not obscured the evidence in support of this possession, the only possession which the Americans ever had of any part of the Territory in question under the fifth article of the Treaty of Ghent; for it is a well known fact, notwithstanding frequent assertions, by American subjects, to the contrary, that His Majesty has been always in quiet possession of all the rest.

It is then asserted that "among other specimens of scientific subtlety on this question, in tracing the Line on the northern frontier, the exact distinction has been resorted to which exists between the geocentric and the heliocentric latitude; terms which were hardly heard of by one half of their skilful Surveyors."—Now this is strictly true and we will venture to add, that it is the first time that such a subtlety was ever resorted to for determining Boundries upon the surface of the earth. But the fact is, and it is a well known fact, that it was resorted to, upon the present occasion, by the Agents of the American Government, in the hope that, in this way they might remove their northern Boundary to that quarter to the limit which they had claimed and occupied, and indeed far beyond it.

The next assertion is, that "in departing from the monument established at the settled head of Saint Croix, the British Commissioners insisted upon the magnetic north."—This assertion we are warranted in saying is absolutely unfounded.—It is well known, for there were witnesses enough of the transaction, that the first operation of the British and American Surveyors was, by a course of observations at the monument, to determine the true north line, which they there settled.

We do not think it necessary after exposing these gross misstatements, to follow this writer through the rest of his observations, further than to remark in general that he (like all our neighbors who discuss this subject in the newspapers,) seems entirely to forget, or wilfully to misrepresent the question at issue, namely, what is the Boundary intended by the Treaty of 1783? by which Treaty a portion of the ancient and acknowledged Territory of His Majesty was relinquished to the United States, and he talks of parallelograms of one hundred miles square and two thirds of the present Territory of the State of Maine as if the point in discussion was the taking away a portion of Territory which had been acknowledged as a part of, and had been possessed by that State.—We trust, however, that this question, whether settled by negotiation between the two Governments, or referred to a Foreign Power, will not be affected by these attempts, "to throw obscurity upon the evidence in support of" the claim and the hitherto undisturbed possessions of His Majesty. It may not, however, be amiss to notice the remark that the English side of the question is ripe for reference! What then becomes of the American side? and how do these politicians expect to bring this business to a close.
