LIVERPOOL, JULY 22.

SPAIN.—The Government appears to think that the most important thing for it to do at present, is to place at Lisbon, as quick as possible, a man entirely devoted to the Apostolic party. As soon as it had taken this resolution it cast its eyes on M. Andriaga, brother-in-law of M. Zea; and yesterday his Majesty signed the appointment of M. Andriaga to be Minister Plenipotentiary at that Court. The King having signed these documents M. Andriaga received this morning his passports and credentials. At four o'clock he received at the Treasury 6,000 doubloons (90,000 francs) for his journey to Lisbon, and at six o'clock he was on his road; with such precipitation was it thought necessary for the diplomatic to depart.

M. Andriaga was lately the minister for Spain to the United States.

A courier has just been despatched to Cadiz, carrying to the rich merchant Gargollo, his appointment of Treasurer-General, in the room of M. Soret; who has just died at Seville. M. Gargollo one of the rich merchants in Europe, is himself the artisan of his own fortune: it is said that it is a doubt if he can even read.

LISBON.—On the 5th of July, all was tranquil. The new constitution was not known. The British frigate Diamond had not arrived from Brazil, but a Portuguese corvette which left at the same time arrived at Lisbon on the 3d of July. The Regency, has published the amnesty—the cession of the Crown to the Emperor's daughter—the convocation of the Cortez, &c.

THE LIBERTY WEAVERS.

These unfortunate people, to the number of about 200, assembled on Monday on the bank of the Canal, near Leeson-street, and thence proceeded in mournful procession along Leeson-street, Stephen's Green, Grafton street, and Dame-street, to the Royal Exchange. When arrived opposite the Head Police Office, the attendance of some of the overseers was required before the Magistrates; with this they immediately complied, and having stated the object for which they had assembled, they pledged themselves, for their body that the peace should not be broken. They then proceeded to the Exchange, and presented a memorial to the Committee then sitting, requesting that the proposed reduction might not be made in their wages, but that 1s per day might be continued to them while funds lasted. The poor people without the Exchange waited in patient expectation of the decision until 6 o'clock when they departed peaceably. We have not learned that any positive answer was given to them.

We never saw a more melancholy picture than these poor people presented with their careworn countenances and emaciated figures; nor can there be any where a more deplorable sight than that of a people willing and able to employ themselves and yet unable to procure employment.—The weavers of the Liberty have besides, peculiar claims upon public bounty, for the patience with which they have borne their privations, in all the silent manliness of grief and from their never having engaged in those combinations which have disgraced so many other traders in the city.

The reduction proposed to be made in the wages of these poor people is from 1s per day to 10d. There are many ready to condemn any remonstrance on the subject of this reduction—and certainly "half a loaf is better than no bread," but when we consider that most of these men have families to support, and that when potatoes, the cheapest food that can be procured, are 9d. and 10d. a stone, we cannot think that a labouring man could preserve himself in a state of health and strength that would allow himself to work for 12 hours a day on such a pittance, even if he snatched the morsel from the mouths of his starving children.

We ask again as we did on Monday, what is to become of these people and their wretched families when the funds subscribed is entirely exhausted? This is the time for public exertion before all is gone! We call upon the Clergy of every persuasion to use their influence with their flocks to vaert the misery that awaits the unfortunate weavers.

We call upon the Clergy of the established Church, for they can afford it, to set the example of benevolence. As yet but few of them have subscribed for this object; the name of but one Protestant prelate stands recorded as having contributed to the funds, and that one felt himself called upon to come forward from holding a Deanery in the scene of misery. Let us hope that this appeal will not be made in vain.

LINENS.

The amount of Irish Linen exported from G. Britain to the U. States in the year ending, Jan. 5, 1826, is stated, in the official returns at 5,030,522 yards. The amount of the exports of

the same article, from Great Britain, to all parts of the world in the same year, was 18,801,251 yards.

It is a remarkable circumstance, that in Prussia a Jewish Rabbi has made an energetic appeal to his flock in favour of the Christians of the East, and his appeal has not been in vain, as subscriptions in aid of the Greek cause have been opened in several synagogues.

Lord Castlereagh has been chosen a Member of Parliament for a County in Ireland. He came of age while the election was pending—and is said to be a person of considerable talents. Many inheritors of a fortune would have marked their coming of age in quite a different manner.

INDIANS.—The Indians who trouble the Mexican provinces are Camanches. They are the most powerful and warlike tribe of Indians in America. Were they organized and brought together, they can bring into the field 15,000 fighting men, as has been ascertained by the Mexican Government.

An American officer who lately visited Tunis, states, on the authority of a lady resident there, that there are in that city in the course of the year not less than 100 apostacies from the Christian faith. Renegades who possess any talent are immediately taken into favor, and loaded with riches and honours. The whole number of Christians residing permanently at Tunis is 1500. They have Churches and a Convent.

It cannot be made too public that by the 5th Geo. IV cap. 188, sec. 70 spirits found floating on the sea, are not to be taken up if in casks less than 40 gallons, by any person meeting with them (not even with intent to deliver them to officers of the customs,) except by officers of the navy customs or excise, under forfeiture of the vessel or boat, likewise the penalty of three times the value of such spirits, or the sum of £50 at the election of the commissioners of His Majesty's customs; but by the 71st section of the same act, any person giving information to a person authorised to seize such spirits as may be floating, so that such seizure shall be made, shall be intitled to such reward as the commissioners of the customs direct.
