**HALIFAX, July 12.**

**LATEST NEWS.** The only addition to our foreign news since our last number is a London paper of the 26th May, received by the Transport *Borodino*. The principal items of intelligence it contains are the following: A rumour was afloat at Madrid, May 11th, that the Cabinet of London wish to take possession of the Havannah. This originated from a M. Cook having arrived there to demand Forty Millions due to English Merchants. Ferdinand had not recognised the new regency of Portugal. Advices at London from Constantinople, dated the 5th May, state, that the differences between Turkey and Russia have been arranged, the latter having acceded to the demands made by the former. Orders had been dispatched for the evacuation of Moldavia and Wallachia; and plenipotentiaries were at the same time appointed to proceed to the Frontiers, for the adjustment of the minor points at issue. The prorogation of Parliament was positively fixed for Tuesday the 30th ult. It would be prorogued by Commission, as His Majesty was unable to go through the ceremony in person. In consequence of the news as given above, relative to Russia and Turkey, the funds rose a little in value. Consols advanced to 79½ for the Account and 79 for money. A Haywood, a factory belonging to Mr. Chadwick was burned; supposed to be set on fire by some incendiary. The crowd would lead no assistance to extinguish the flames. Of 8000 inhabitants in Haywood, it is said one half, before the fire took place, were nearly destitute of employment, and his misfortune has deprived at least 300 more of the means of subsistence. Application has been made to London for a second remittance. It is said that there had been held a large meeting in the neighbourhood of Bury, but the result was not known.

The Menai at Quebec on the 30th. ult. and was to leave on the 2d, or 3d. inst. The schr. Lark, from St. John's N. B. for Quebec, with a cargo of West India produce, has been lost in the River St. Lawrence.

A letter dated *Brantford* June 20, states that May 29, lat. 47° 50', long. 48° 30', ½ past 10, A. M. The brig General Brock, of Jersey, Captain P. Lands, bound for Gaspe, was run down by a brig unknown 3 of the crew got on board the strange brig, one went down with the wreck, and 14, including the master, and P. Duval, clerk to the house of Messrs. Janvier, took to the long boat, without water or food, excepting a small Dutch cheese; saw the vessel founder instantly. In this truly dreadful situation, the unfortunate survivors were compelled to sustain themselves on the bodies and blood of those who fell victims to fatigue and hunger, until the 9th of June; when the master, mate, and six seamen, were taken up by the brig Ann, of Liverpool, Capt. Forbes, subsequent to which, the master and three seamen unfortunately perished. Notwithstanding the kindest attention. The mate and three remaining seamen were landed in a most deplorable state. Poor Duval expired on the 5th day after quitting the vessel, and the surviving wreckers suffered his body to remain for twelve hours. Capt. Forbes treated the unhappy sufferers with the greatest attention, whilst on board his vessel; and the mate has nearly recovered, and proceeded from hence to Antichar; but the three poor seamen are not yet able to walk. The vessel that ran them down was a stout brig, steering about E. S. E.
