The Commissioners sensibly feel the responsibility, which dwells upon all concerned in this distribution, to dispense the bounsy, for the purposes contemplated by the Donors. Alibough the Law has authorized the Commissioners to ascertain all the losses which were sustained from the calam. itous fires that caused such sweeping desolation, it does not follow that every individual who came forward, to prove a loss, is therefore either entitled to, or wished to obtain a pertion of the charity.

"There can be no doubt indeed that many persons proved their losses principally with a view of showing the amount of loss sustained.

The ruling principle in the distribution of every donation, must be the intention of the donor; and in the present case, it is conceived, that there are many persons whose losses have been proved before the Commissioners, who are not of a description of sufferers that any of the donors intended to relieve by their contributions. The Commissioners think that the actual and individual distribution of the charity can only be made, upon a knowledge of the circumitances and condition of each sufferer, and thereo fore must be performed by local Committees who possess, or may easily obtain this know-
